fter here has notified to the Ministers of the other Princes of the Empire, That the King of Den-mark having entred in an Hostile manner the Duke of Holstein's Territories, and besieged Ton-ningen, and the Duke of Cell being called upon to perform what he is obliged to by the Treaty of Altena; In pursuance thereof, and in discharge of the Trust reposed in him as one of the Directors of the Circle of Lewer-Sazony, to prevent the Troubles in the faid Circle, which the taking of that Place might occasion, he has caused his Forces, jointly with those of the King of Smeden and the Elector of Hanower, to pass the Elbe, and to march to the Relief of that Town. That his Highness has no intentions of entring thereby into a War with the Crown of Denmark, but that his desire being only to maintain the Treaty of Aluna, as he is under an obligation to do, he hopes all the Princes of the Empire will approve of these his Proceedings.
