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Hampton-Court, June 27.

THE King was pleased this day to declare in Council, That the Publick Affairs requiring His Majesty's going over to Holland for a short time; He has appointed *Thomas Lord Archbishop of Canterbury*; *Sir Nathan Wright Kt. Lord Keeper of the Great Seal of England*; *Thomas Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery*, Lord President of the Council; *John Viscount Lonsdale*, Lord Privy-Council; *William Duke of Devonshire*, Lord Steward of His Majesty's Household; *Edward Earl of Jersey*, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household; *John Earl of Bridgewater*, First Commissioner of the Admiralty; *John Earl of Marlborough*, Governor to his Highness the Duke of Gloucester; and *Ferd Earl of Tankerville*, First Commissioner of the Treasury; to be Lords Justices of England for the Administration of the Government during His Majesty's Absence.

Madrid, Jun: 18. N. S. The King and Queen of Spain returned hither the 3d Instant from *Aranjuez*. The Bull-Fest is put off to the 21st Instant; And the Queen has ordered, that Preparations be made for entertaining the Court with an Opera. There is a discourse, that the Almirante of *Castile*, and several other Persons of Quality, who have been under Disgrace, will shortly be sent to Court. Considerable Sums of Money have been sent to the Kingdom of *Navarre* and to *Catalonia*, to be employed in repairing the Fortifications in those Parts. We expect to receive an account of the departure of the eight Men of War lately fitted out at *Cadix*, which are to carry a Supply of Men and Ammunition to the Spanish Garrisons in the *West-Indies*. Our last Advices from *Cadix* bring the News of *Monsieur Pointu's* Arrival there with several French Men of War from *Brest*, and that he expects to be shortly joined by several Gallies from *Marseilles*, and divers Men of War from *Thoulon*, after which 'tis said he intends to bombard *Saltee*.

Venice, June 25. There is Advice, that the Knights of *Malta* have lately lost another of their Gallies, on board of which were 4 Knights, and in all 160 Men. The Pope has made *Signior Struzzi* Archbishop of *Florence*. They write from *Rome*, that the Differences between the Cardinal *d'Este* and the *Venetian* Ambassador are wholly accommodated, and that several Villits have since passed between them.

From the Saxon Camp near *Riga*, June 20. N. S. Duke *Ferdinand of Courland* arrived here the 17th Instant from *Mittaw*, and took upon him the Chief Command of the King of *Polonia's* Forces in *Livonia*. He reviewed the Forces here, and went yesterday to the *Dunamund* Fort, otherwise called *Augustinsberg*, where three Danish Frigates are arrived with Clothes, Arms, and Ammunition for the use of our Troops. We are in great expectation of Reinforcements from *Poland* and *Saxony*; The King of *Poland's* Horse-Guards are come so near, that we believe they may join us to-morrow, and the other Succours we hope will arrive in few days. In the meantime the Swedish Army being reinforced by about 5 or 6000 Men under Command of Count *Wedling*, are removed to a Place 3 miles distant from *Jonsrenkoff*, where 'tis said they intend to pass the *Dwina* in order to attack us. General *Wedling*, and Count *Dahlberg* Governor of *Riga*, sent a Trumpeter yesterday with Letters to our General, but the Contents are not yet known.

Mittaw, June 21. A Company of Bombardiers passed by here this week, going to the Saxon Camp near *Riga*. Our Advices from thence say, three Danish Frigates were come to the *Dunamund* Fort with a Supply of Ammunition for the Saxon Forces, and that they expected with great impatience the arrival of their Succours from *Poland* and *Saxony*, which are coming by Sea to *Mittaw*. In the mean time the Swedes have received a Reinforcement of 6000 Men under the Command of Count *Wedling*, whereof their Army being increased to above 20000. (besides the Garrison of *Riga*, which is about 6000 strong,) they

intend to pass the *Dwina*, and attack the Saxons before the Succours above-mentioned join them; They are marched with this design to a Place 3 miles above *Jonsrenkoff*, where they are preparing to lay two Bridges of Boats over the River, and have fitted out a Fla-borcom'd Boat with a Breast-work in the manner of a Block-house, and have mounted some Cannon to play upon the Saxon Troops that shall appear to oppose their Passage.

Warsaw, June 20. The time of the King of *Poland's* departure for *Mariembourg* is not yet fixed; He intends to go from thence to *Saxony*, and 'tis said, that in his Journey through *Prussia* he will have an Interview with the Elector of *Brandenburgh*. Commissioners are gone from hence to *Lithuania*, to enquire into the Differences between the Houses of *Sapicha* and *Oginsky*, and to endeavour to compose them.

Copenhagen, June 26. The English and Dutch Squadrons are at *Gottembourg*, and the Danish Fleet continues near *Kullen*, at the entrance into the *Sound*. Our Advices say, that several Swedish Regiments are to embark at *Gottembourg*, in order to be transported to *Torningen*. Directions are given for posting several Danish Regiments along the Coasts of *Fuzland*, and raising Batteries in several Places, to prevent the Enemy's making a Descent.

Vienna, June 23. Their Imperial Majesties continue at their Palace at *Favorita*, where Preparations are making for entertaining the Court with Running at the Ring, and with Opera's and other Diversions. Orders are given, for adding several Regiments to the Imperial Forces that are drawing together on the Frontiers of *Bohemia* and *Saxony*. The States of the Kingdom of *Hungary* are shortly to meet at *Presbourg*, to settle several Matters relating to the Courts of Justice; there, and to consider of the Means of providing for the Subsistence of the Imperial Troops quartered in those Parts. Count *Maringutz* is arrived here from *Rome*, where he has resided with the Character of the Emperor's Ambassador. Our Letters from *Croatia* give an Account, that the Imperial and Turkish Commissioners for settling the Limits, have had several Conferences together concerning the Affair of *Nova*, but have not yet been able to adjust that Matter.

Dresden, June 28. The Saxon Forces which the King of *Poland* has lent to the King of *Denmark*, are marching to *Holftein*, being about 4000 Men under the Command of Major-General *Neuschutz*, and 'tis said they are to be joined by some Troops of the Duke of *Wolfenbuttel*. The Imperial Forces in *Bohemia* and *Silesia* continue to assemble near our Frontiers.

Berlin, June 29. The Elector of *Brandenburgh* intends in few days to go and take a Review of his Forces, which are drawing together near *Lenzen*; and 'tis said, his Electoral Highness will afterwards take a Journey to *Prussia*. Orders are sent to several Regiments of the Elector's Forces in the Country of *Cleves* to march hither.

Torningen, June 28. The Garrison here have wholly demolished the Works which the Danes cast up during the late Siege of this Place, and they have mended several Defects in our Fortifications which gave an Advantage to the Enemy; And the Burghers at present are repairing their Houses that were ruined by the Bombs. A Party of 900 Dragoons being sent from hence to *Meldorf* to demand Contributions, they found the Boors had cast up a small Fort there; but they soon forced the same, and obliged them to comply with their Demands.

From the Confederate Camp near *Pinnemburg*, July 2. On the 30th of the last Month several General Officers went with a strong Party from our Army to view the Danish Camp. The same evening, about 11 at night, we received Advice, that the Danes were decamping, and General *Guldsfern* was sent out with 800 Horse to observe them; And we had afterwards an Account, that the Danes were marched back to their former Camp at *Ejnsborne* for the Convenience of Forage, which growing scarce hereabouts, 'tis believed we shall shortly remove our Camp. A great number of Danish Deserters are come over to us. The Magistrates of *St. Jurek* and *Kiel* have sent Deputies hither to acquaint the Duke of *Holftein*, that the King of *Denmark*, by way of Reprisal for the Contributions which the Allies have obliged the Inhabitants of *Altona* to pay them, has demanded 30000 Dollars of *Sleswick*, and 20000 of *Rath*, to be paid in 6 days.

Frankfort, June 30. The Landgrave of Hesse-Darmstadt is returned hither from Cassel, where he has been to compliment the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, upon the Marriage of the Prince his eldest Son with the Electoral Princess of Brandenburg. The Landgrave, at his return from Berlin with his whole Court, made a very magnificent Entry into Cassel, after which there were Balls, Operas, and other Publick Diversions, for 9 days together. The Elector of Mainz is using the Waters at Swaibach. The Baron of Schonborn his Brother being made Chancellor to the Emperor, has resign'd his Places of Great Marshal and Great Chamberlain to his Electoral Highness, which are given to the Baron of Strassan Vice-President of the Council, and to the Baron Schonbourn. The Elector Palatine's Forces in the Palatinate are drawing together near Mannheim, in order to be employ'd in finishing the Fortifications of that Place. Count Nossau Weilburg is hither expected there to review them; And 'tis said, 6000 of them will be sent to the Duke of Saxe-Meiningen, to assist him in making good his Pretensions upon the Duchy of Cobourg, or which the Duke of Saxe-Gotha is at present in Possession.

Cologne, July 2. The Elector of Cologne is at present at Brual. The Elector Palatine is at Dusseldorf, but intends to go in few days to his Palace at Hombach, and from thence to the Imperial Court. Major-General Touchein, Commissary-General of his Electoral Highness's Forces, took a Review yesterday at Dormagen, between this Place and Dusseldorf, of three Regiments of the Elector's Forces, which are ordered to march to the Palatinate.

Hamburg, July 2. The Danish Army is removed from Uyterson to their former Camp at Elmshorne. The Allies continue near Pinnemberg. Divers of the Inhabitants of Altona have paid their Quota's of the Contributions demanded of them by the Confederates, which amounted to 12000 Dollars, and the rest refusing to do the like, Orders are given to put them under Military Execution, and the Houses of those that have complied, have a Mark set upon them to distinguish them from the others. Count Chamilly, the French Ambassador, who came hither from Pinnemberg, returned yesterday to the Country of Holstein, to attend the King of Denmark. An Order is published here, to forbid the raising of Soldiers in the Territories belonging to this City for the Service of the King of Denmark. They write from Staden, that the Governor of that Place having reviewed the Garrison, a Regiment of Dragoons was detached from thence, and part of them were sent to Holstein, and the rest to Lubeck, where the Swedes have a Battery to fire upon the Danish Vessels that sail up and down the Elbe. There is Advice, that the Duke of Sverin having some Jealousy of the Forces of Brandenburg, which are drawing together at Lutzen, assembled his Forces, and having left a good Garrison in Sverin, marched with the rest to Demnitz, to cover the Frontiers of his Territories.

Hague, July 6. There are Letters from the Dutch Squadron Commanded by Admiral Allenonde which say, they were ready to sail from Cistemburg to the Sound. The States of Holland and Westfriseland are to meet to-morrow, and General Cuckorn is expected here, to give them an account of the condition of the Fortifications of the Brill and Helvoetsluis.

Paris, July 7. N. S. The King goes this Evening to Marly, where he designs to continue 8 or 10 days. The Magistrates of Strasbourg having lately resign'd to the King their Right of Presentation to the Abbey of St. Stephen, He has given it to a Prince of the House of Elbeuf. Monsieur Callieres returned hither from Nancy the 5th Instant. A Tryal is commenced in the Parliament of Paris, between the Prince of Guimené, Chief of the eldest Branch of the House of Rohan, and the Duke of Rohan Cabot, who enjoys the Title of Duke of Rohan, by his Marriage with an Heiress of that Family; the Dispute is, Whether the latter may give that Name to his younger Sons. The Sieur Priou, a Doctor of the Sorbonne, has lately writ some Animadversions upon a Paper published by the Sieur le Comte a Jesuit, Confessor to the Duke of Burgundy, by way of a Letter to the Duke de Maine, asserting, That the said Paper contains several Heretical Propositions; And has likewise made Reflections upon several Books published by that Society.

Portsmouth, June 28. Rear-Admiral Bembow arrived last night at St. Helens with His Majesty's Ships the Gloucester and Lynn from New-England.
