

Hamburgh, July 6. The Confederate Army decamped yesterday morning from *Pimemberg*, and marched to *Duvenbed*, and this morning they advanced to *Barfeld*, and are to continue their march to *Oldesloe*. The Danish Army is encamped near *Elnsbörne*. The King of Denmark is at present at *Resbörne*, whither all the Ministers concerned in the Mediation of the Affair of *Holstein* are gone, except the French Ambassador and the Envoy of *Brandenburgh*, who are with the Confederate Army. The last of the *Brandenburgh* Forces ordered to Encamp near *Leutzen*, marched in there yesterday. 'Tis said, the Troops of *Wolfenbattel* are ordered to be in a readiness to march, but 'tis not certain whether they will be sent to the Assistance of the *Danes*. The Inhabitants of *Altena* have at last complied, and paid the Contributions demanded of them, part in ready Money, and part in Bills. They write from *Carelseroon* of the 27th inst, that the Swedish Fleet put to Sea that day, consisting in 50 Men of War, great and small, besides Fireships and Tenders; Divers Transport Ships with Soldiers on Board, lay in a readiness to sail from *Carelseroon* upon the first Orders.

Hague, July 9. Monsieur *Gersdorf*, Resident from the King of *Poland*, has presented to the States-General, and to the Foreign Ministers here, the Manifesto lately published by the King his Master, to justify his making War against *Sweden*; And the Ambassador of *Sweden* expects from that Court an Answer to the said Manifesto, which he will in like manner communicate to the States and Foreign Ministers. The Princess-Dowager of *Nassau*, with the young Prince Stadtholder of *Frisland*, her Senare expected here in few days from *Leewarden*. The Marquis *d. Tuszay*, late Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke of *Tuscany* to the Kings of *Denmark* and *Poland*, is come hither in his return home from those Courts.

Paris, July 10. N. S. The Chapter of the Cathedral Church of this City having appointed several of their Body to return their Thanks to the King for having Nominated the Arch-Bishop of *Paris* to be a Cardinal, they accordingly waited upon the King at *Versailles*, and were introduced by the Marshal *de Noailles*, Brother to the new Cardinal. The States of *Burgundy* have consented to give the King a free Gift of a Million of Livres. The Prince of *Condé*, who was President of that Assembly, intends to set out from *Dijon* the 15th Instant, in his return hither. The Duchess of *Nemours* not enjoying her Health at *Columbieres* in the Province of *Brie*, whither she was Commanded to retire about 8 Months ago, desired Leave to remove to *Nanf-Chatel* for the Benefit of the Air, but 'twas not granted. The Sieur *de Lagny*, Inspector-General of the Commerce in the Ports of *Normandy*, having desired Leave to resign that Office, 'twill, it's said, be given to the Sieur *Le Gendre* of *Roan*. Letters from *Brest* of the 2d Instant say, two Frigates are fitting out there, to be sent to *Stam* in the *East-Indies*; And that two Men of War were come in there from the Squadron that cruized before *Sallee*, under the Command of the Sieur *de La Harlelorre*, and brought an account, That two Ships of *Sallee*, one of 24 Guns and the other of 12, were forced ashore, and destroyed by the French Men of War; And that on the 10th of the last Month a French Merchant Ship of 36 Guns falling in with 4 *Sallee* Men, and the Commander finding himself over-matched, set fire to his Ship, and escaped with his Crew in a Chaloup to *Cadix*.

Deale, July 2. Sir *Cloudesty Shorrell* is sailed from the *Downes* to *Margate* with the Yachts and Men of War, which are to attend His Majesty in his Passage to *Holland*. Rear-Admiral *Bembow*, with His Majesty's Ships the *Glecester* and *Lynn*, arrived the 30th inst from the *Downes* from the *West-Indies*, but left from *Portsmouth*.

Hampton-Court, July 3. The King intends to go from hence to morrow to *Margate*, where His Majesty will Embark for *Holland*.
