**D**uke Ferdinand of Courland went again from hence the 26th Instant to the Saxon Camp near Riga. Our Letters from thence say, the Swedish and Saxon Armies continue in their former Posts; And that several Foreigners Inhabitants of Riga, who upon the Siege of that Place retired into Courland, have obtained the Governor's Leave to return thither. General Steinau is arrived in the Saxon Camp. The Horse from Saxony is come within a day's march of this Place; but we have yet no account of the Foot being landed at Memel, they coming thither by Sea from *Cuingsberg*.

*Warsaw, June 27.* The King of Poland intends to go from hence the 29th Instant towards *Liefland*, and his Servants and Equipage are gone before. The Envoy of *Tartary* had Audience of Leave of the King on the 24th Instant, and will be returning home in few days.

*Carelsroone, June 30.* The Swedish Fleet put to Sea the 27th Instant, and we have since had no News of them; but the Transport Ships that are in this Port have Orders to follow the Fleet, and their Rendezvous is appointed off *Ysted*. The Fleet consists in the following Ships; The *King Charles*, of 128 Guns; the *Unity*, of 100; the *Hedwig Eleonora*, of 90; Three Men of War of 84 Guns, Six of 80, One of 76, Two of 74, Twenty six from 50 to 70, and Nine from 16 to 32; in all, 50 Men of War, besides Fire-Ships, Bomb-Ketches, and other small Vessels. They are divided in three Squadrons, whereof the first is commanded by Admiral *Wachtmeister* Commander in Chief, Vice-Admiral *Seestjern*, and Rear-Admiral *Snaar*; the second by Admiral *Aukerstiern*, and Vice-Admiral *Nummers*; and the third by Admiral *Taub*, Vice-Admiral *du Prun*, and Rear-Admiral *Rush*.

*Elfsore, July 6.* The Danish Fleet appear off this Place, sailing towards the *Baltick*, upon the News they have received, that the Fleet of Sweden lie at Anchor off *Ysted*. The English and Dutch Fleet, which lay near *Kullen*, are likewise under sail, and come this way.

*Copenhagen, July 6.* 'Tis said, the King of Denmark will return to this Place in few days from *Halslein*, part of his Equipage being already sent thither. We have Advice, that the Swedish Fleet is come as far as *Ysted*, and that their Design seems to be to transport Forces to *Pomeran*; Whereupon the Danish Fleet moves that way to hinder it, and they are now seen off this Place.

*Vienna, June 30.* The Imperial Court continues in the Palace at *Favorita*, where they were entertained yesterday with a very fine Opera, at which the Turkish Ambassador was present; and in a day or two the Court will be diverted with a Running at the Ring. The Elector of Brandenburg's

Minister has acquainted the Emperor, that the Elector his Master has thought fit in this Juncture of Affairs in the North, to assemble some Forces for the Security of his Frontiers, but that he has no Intention to employ them to the Prejudice of the Peace and Quiet of those Parts, but on the contrary will use his utmost Endeavours to restore and preserve the same. 'Tis said, several Regiments quartered in *Transilvania* are ordered to reinforce the Imperial Troops on the Frontiers of *Silesia* and *Saxony*. Letters from *Hermanstad* of the 15th Instant say, the States of *Transilvania* were assembled there, and that Count *Rabatitz*, Commander in Chief of the Imperial Forces in that Province, had agreed with them, That for the Ease of the Country, the Regiments quartered in those Parts shall encamp during this Summer, and that the Country shall furnish for them a certain quantity of Provisions. They write from *Croatia*, That the Imperial and Turkish Commissioners continue their Conferences, but are not yet come to an Agreement about the Limits near the Town of *Novis*. An Express arrived two days ago from *Rome*, with an Account, That the Pope, at the Emperor's Recommendation, has made the Bishop of *Passau* a Cardinal.

*Sleswick, July 8.* The Sieur *Nissen*, one of the Collectors of the King of Denmark's Revenues, came the 6th Instant to *Kiel* with a Party of 60 Danish Horse, and 130 Foot; He sent for the Magistrates, and demanded of them the Keys of the Town Gates, the Town Books, and Register, and the Arms of the Burghers: The Keys and the Books were immediately deliver'd him, but the Magistrate obtained Leave to take the Arms into their own Custody. Then the Collector assented the Inhabitants, and declared to them, That the Houses of those who neglected to pay the Contributions demanded of them, should be immediately pulled down; But the Magistrates obtained a Delay of 2 or 3 days, and have sent Deputies to the King of Denmark.

*Francfort, July 7.* The Prince of *Nassau Weilbourg*, General of the Elector Palatine's Forces, is passed by this City, going to *Manheim* to review the Regiments that are to be employed in repairing the Fortifications of that Place. A great number of Horses are sent from the Countries of *Berg* and *Juliers*, to remount the Cavalry in the Palatinate. The Elector Palatine is expected here the 18th Instant, in his way to *Vienna*. The Elector of *Mentz* is now at *Slagenbad*, but will return in few days to *Mentz*. They write from *Alsace*, that the French work with great Application on the Fortifications of *New Brisac*.

*Cologne, July 9.* Monsieur *d'Imberville* the French Envoy, who has lately been at the Courts of the Electors of *Triers* and *Cologne*, is come to *Dusseldorp*, and has had Audience of the Elector Palatine. His Electoral Highness intends to go to-morrow to his Palace at *Haimbach*, and after having stayed there 2 or 3 days, to continue his Journey to the Palatinate, and from thence to *Vienna*. Hamburg, July 9. The Confederate Army is encamped near Oldesloe, and the Danes not far from Bramsche, within a League and half of each other. The Foreign Ministers who went some days ago to attend the King of Denmark at Rensbourg, are all returned hither, except Monsieur Busb the Brandenburg Resident, who being on his way to this Place, received an Express from Berlin, upon which he returned to Rensbourg; And 'tis said, that a Cessation of Arms is in effect agreed upon, in order to begin a Treaty for accommodating the Business of Holstein. Lieutenant-General Banner came hither the 6th Instant with a Danish Pals from Tonningen, and went yesterday to the Confederate Camp. There are Advices from Sweden, that the King of Sweden is on board his Fleet, and that he intends to come with his Forces to Pomeren. The Advices from Moscow say, the Czar had made a Visit to Monsieur Knipper, the Swedish Minister, and told him, He was informed, a Report was spread abroad of his making Preparations to enter into a War against the Crown of Sweden, and assured him of the contrary, and that he intends to continue in good Correspondence and Friendship with that Crown, and that the Ambassadors he is sending to Stockholm, have Orders and Instructions agreeable to these his Intentions. They write from Novigrad of the 13th past, that the Sieur Knes Gikhef, one of the said Ambassadors, was arrived there from Moscow, and would stay there for his Colleague, intending to continue their Journey by the way of Nerwa.

Hague, July 13. The King being expected this week from England, Parties of the Horse-Guards are sent from hence to the Hook of Holland, (where 'tis believed His Majesty will land,) and to Houslaerdyck, to attend His Majesty. The Muscovite Ambassador makes frequent Visits to the Foreign Ministers, and has taken several Opportunities to contradict the Report of the Czar his Master's intending to assist the King of Poland with his Forces against the Swedes. The Princess-Dowager of Nassaw, with the young Prince her Son, Stadholder of Friseland, is expected here this evening from Leewarden.

Paris, July 14. N. S. The Sieur le Comte, Confessor to the Dutchess of Burgundy, being ordered to retire from Court, is gone to Rome; And Father la Chaise is to nominate three Jesuits, out of which the King will choose one to succeed him as Confessor to the Dutchess. On the 12th Instant the Arch-Bishops and Bishops of the General Assembly of the Clergy paid their Compliments to the Arch-Bishop of Paris, at his House near this City, upon his being made a Cardinal; He has taken the Title of Cardinal of Noailles. The Persons employed in managing the King's Revenues during the War, have Petitioned the King for an Abatement of the Tax lately laid upon them. The Common Criers of this City are taxed 60000 Livres each. Montieur de Bezons, Counsellor of State, and Intendant of Guienne, is lately dead.

Whitehall, July 6. The King went from Hampton-Court last Thursday Morning, and lay that Night at Canterbury; His Majesty came to Margate yesterday about Eleven in the Morning, and went on board his Yacht; And towards the Evening the Yachts and Men of War, Commanded by Sir Cloudesly Shovel, failed with a fair Wind for Holland.
