Rome, July 6. N. S.

ON the 2d Instant the Pope gave Audience to the Resident of Savoy, and promised him, that a Bull should be speedily dispatched for confirming the Duke his Master in his Right of Nominating to the Abbeyes in Piedmont, the Difference between this Court and his Royal Highness, in relation to this Affair, being adjusted. On the first Instant the Spanish Ambassador had Audience of the Pope, after which he was a long time in Conference with Cardinal Spada; And the 3d, there was a particular Congregation of State, at which were present the Pope, and the Cardinals Spada, Albano, and San Cesareo. The Prince of Monaco, Ambassador from France, having had Publick Audience of the Pope, does now make his Visits of Ceremony to the Cardinals, the Publick Ministers, and other Persons of Quality.

Venice, July 12. The late Doge was privately Interred this week in the Church of St. John and St. Paul, according to his own desire. The three Inquisitors who are chosen to receive all Complaints against the late Doge, and the five Correctors whom the Senate have made choice of, as usual, to examine the Statutes, which the next Doge is to swear he will observe, have according to Custom taken Possession of the Palace of St. Mark, where the Doge's Effigies lies exposed in the Ducal Robes; And to morrow his Serenity's Obsequies will be performed with great Magnificence, after which a new Doge will be Elected. There are divers Pretenders to this Dignity, of whom, the Signiors Foscarini, Erizzo, and Mocenigo, seem to stand the fairest. Signior Gabrieli Zuzi made his Publick Entry the 5th Instant, as Procurator of St. Mark, with the usual Ceremonies. Signior Baptista Nani being appointed by the Senate to be their Ambassador at Vienna, has desired to be excused from this Employment, which the Senate have consented to. A Convoy with Provisions and Ammunition, and a considerable Sum of Money, is ready to sail from hence to the Levant under the Command of Signior Pasqualigo, who is made Commander in Chief of the Venetian Men of War in those Parts.

Madrid, July 14. A Courier is arrived here from Gibraltar, with the news that Monsieur Pointi, with the Squadron of French Men of War under his Command, was bombarding the Town of Tetuan on the Coast of Barbary. They write from Ceuta, that nothing considerable has happened of late at the Siege of that Place, and that the Garrison has been reinforced by some Troops from the Coast of Andalusia, which have increased its number to 8000 Men, and they are frequently supplied with Provisions from Gibraltar.

The Marquis de los Balbaces has taken Possession of the Dignity of Grandee of Spain with the usual Ceremonies.

Copenhagen, July 20. The Swedish Fleet having joined the English and Dutch Squadrons on the 17th Instant, they anchored in a Line before Landskroone between the Islands of Ween and Saltsolme. This day they were under sail again, and Admiral Rook is come to an Anchor within 3 Miles of this Place; The Danish Fleet lie under the Guns of our Citadel.

Brunswick, July 20. On the 16th Instant in the morning, the Count d'Ableveld, with the Saxon Forces under his command, came within a quarter of a League of Peina, on the Frontier of the Countries of Cell and Hildesheim; And being informed, that the Militia of the Duchy of Cell were drawn together in the Neighbourhood, he caused part of his Forces to advance towards Swerthausen, as though he intended to have entered into the Territories of Cell that way; upon which the Forces of Cell marching thither, he took another Road, and marched to a place called Scoupern, from whence he sent out several Parties to plunder the Country, who advanced within an hour of Cell on one side, and as far as Gylhorn on the other. He continued there till the 18th, when receiving Advice, that two Regiments of Horse and Dragoons were arrived at Cell from the Confederate Camp at Oldesloe, and that two other Regiments of Horse of the Troops of Hanover, and a Body of the Militia of that Duchy, were marching at the same time to cut off his Retreat, he resolved to march from Scoupern, and to retire under the Cannon of this Place, where he expected to have found a safe Retreat; But the Duke of Wolfenbuttel would not consent to it, and caused the Garrison to march out against the Saxons, upon which, Count d'Ableveld turned towards the Country of Hildesheim, and retired by that way. The Troops of Cell and Hanover pursued the Saxons, and yesterday about three in the afternoon, the Vanguard of the Lunenburghers overtook part of their Baggage near a Village called Liersa; 'Twas convoyed by 30 Horse, who were soon put to flight, but Count d'Ableveld with 400 Horse coming up to their Assistance, beat back the Lunenburghers, and then continued his march in great hast, left the whole Force of the Enemy should come up with him; And we have received Advice, that he arrived last night near a place called Holsa, where the Saxons encamped in a small Plain, with a little Lake before them. The Lunenburghers were marching after them, and it's believed they may by this time have overtaken them.

Hamburg, July 23. The King of Denmark has not yet given a Positive Answer to the Proposals
