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Venice, July 23. N. S.

**T**HE Obsequies of the late Doge were performed the 12th instant with great Solemnity; and 41 Noblemen being chosen in the usual manner to Elect the new Doge, they put themselves up in the Palace, and this day by unanimous Consent made choice of Signior *Maffio Mocenigo*; The first that gave his Vote for him being the Procurator *Dona*, one of his Competitors, whereby he gained much Applause. The new Doge has taken Possession of this Dignity, and the Publick Ministers here have paid him their Compliments on this occasion. The Letters from *Rome* give an account, that the *Venetian* Ambassador has obtained a Promise from the Pope, that at the next Promotion he will make one Cardinal at the Recommendation of this Republick; Two Cardinals are then to be likewise made at the Recommendation of the Crowns of *Poland* and *Portugal*. The Ships called the *St. Andrew*, and the *Venetian Merchant*, Capt. *Robinson* Commander, arrived here this week from *London*. They write from *Dalmatia*, that General *Anton's Mocenigo* has viewed the *Venetian* Frontier Towns in those Parts, and has given Directions for repairing and improving their Fortifications.

*Warsaw*, July 15. Divers Persons of Quality are gone from hence to attend the King of *Poland* in *Livonia*. The Forces of the Crown have left their Quarters, and part of them are marching to *Prussia*, and the rest to *Podolia*.

*Mittaw*, July 16. The King of *Poland* arrived here the 14th Instant from *Warsaw*, being accompanied only by 2 or 3 Persons of Quality. Duke *Ferdinand* of *Courland* received him at the Castle Gates, and he was saluted by a triple discharge of our Cannon. In the evening the King made a Visit to the Dutchess of *Courland*, and yesterday he visited the young Duke; and went this day, accompanied by Duke *Ferdinand*, to the Camp in *Livonia*.

From the *Saxon Camp* near *Riga*, July 17. The King of *Poland* arrived here yesterday; He viewed the *Dunamunder* Fort, and afterwards held a Council of War. This day the Forces were drawn up in a Line, reaching from the said Fort along the *Dwina* to the Shore, opposite to *Jonsenboff*, and the King took a Review of them. Divers Boats are got together, in order, as is said, to lay a Bridge over the *Dwina*. The *Swedes* in the meantime are raising Batteries to hinder our passing the River.

*Copenhagen*, July 27. The *Swedish* Fleet having joined the *English* and *Dutch* Squadrons off *Landscroon*, they came on the 20th Instant to an Anchor within less than 3 miles of this Place, and the night following began to bombard our Fleet, which was retired into the Harbour, and lay

under the Cannon of our Citadel, and they fired about 130 Bombs, of which 'tis said only five fell in the *Danish* Ships; One of these fell in the *Danish* Admiral, but had no effect by the Boldness of one of the Seamen, who put out the Fuzee by smothering it with his Coat; and another falling in the *Danish* Ship called the *Electoral Prince*, two Seamen took it up in their hands and threw it into the Water; Which Actions Count *Gulacneew* the *Danish* Admiral immediately Rewarded, by making these Seamen Officers. The *Danes* at the same time fired from several Bomb-Ketches, and from a great flat-bottom'd Vessel which lay before their Fleet with divers Pieces of great Cannon planted thereon; but the Execution was not great on either side. Of the *Danes*, about 7 or 8 Men killed, and 10 wounded. On the 21st, several *Danish* Frigats were sent out, who exchanged some Guns with the *Swedish* Cruizers; and that day the *Danes* fired out two other great flat-bottom'd Vessels, and planted thereon divers whole Cannon. On the 22d, the *Swedes* offered to land some Men at a Place called *Old Warthan*, about half a mile from hence, but found the Coast so well guarded, that they presently went off again; The 23d, some *Swedes* came ashore at *Schawshafet*, a mile and half from this Place towards *Elfenore*, but did not long continue there, retiring to their Boats, but six of their Men were taken Prisoners by the Country People; 'Tis thought the *Swedes* did this only to amuse and alarm us. The 24th, their Fleet sailed back to the Isle of *Ween*, and anchored before *Lanaferone*; The *Danish* Fleet continues in our Harbour, having before them the three large flat-bottom'd Vessels above-mentioned, on each of which are placed 40 great Guns, and being besides defended on the left by the Castle, and on the right by the Fort newly built there. On the 25th, several Brigats and Bomb-Ketches came over the Flats of *Mahnöt*, between the Isle of *Saltholm* and the Coast of *Schoonun* to the Isle of *Amack*, where they anchored; And being yesterday reinforced by 13 Frigats and 2 Bomb-Ketches, they came nearer to this Place, and last night threw about 150 Bombs into the Town, the greatest part of which fell in that part of the Town which is called *Christians Haven*, but the Damage they did was inconsiderable. Their Fleet lies now near this Place; and 24 of their Frigats are advanced within a small distance of the new Fort, before which we have two great flat-bottom'd Vessels with heavy Cannon.

*Vienna*, July 21. The Emperor intends to go to *Nieustad* about eight or ten days hence with the Empress, and the King and Queen of the *Romans*, but the Arch-Duke and Arch-Dutchesses will continue at the Palace of *Favosaria*. Count *d'Aversberg* is arrived here from *England*.

land, where he resided with the Character of the Emperor's Envoy Extraordinary, and will be going in few days on his Embassy to the King of Spain. There is a discourse, that the Emperor intends to make new Levies. They write from Croatia, that the Turkish Commissioners insists upon the Cession of the Town of Novi, which the Imperial Commissioner having Orders not to consent to, it puts a stop for the present to the settling of the Limits between the two Empires on that side. The Letters from Constantinople say, the Emperor's Ambassador has obtained the Release of about 600 Christian Captives in Turkey; And that there was no likelihood of a Peace, or a Prolongation of the Truce, between the Czar of Muscovy and the Grand Signior.

Hanover, July 28. The Saxon Forces commanded by Count Ahlfeld, which lately made an Inroad into the Country of Cel, are arrived in the Neighbourhood of Gatzlar very much fatigued. The Forces of Lunenbourg pursued them very closely, and had several Skirmishes with their Rear, but could not come up so as to engage their whole Force; However they recovered all the Booty which the Saxons had taken, and took the greatest part of their Baggage; And Major-General Neitsch, and divers other Saxon Officers and Soldiers, were taken Prisoners by the Lunenbourgers. The Saxons are at present encamped near Gatzlar, and the Lunenbourgers near Breitslad, where the latter will continue till the Saxons are returned home.

Hamburgh, July 30. The Confederate Army decamped on the 26th Instant in the morning from Oldesloe, and marched towards Segeberg. The Danish Army marched also from Barmstede towards the same place, and a strong Detachment of Danish Horse was sent to Segeberg to secure that Post, but the Confederate Forces arrived there before the Danes, who made a halt on the other side of the Trave, where their Army is now encamped. The two Armies are within Cannon-Shot of each other, being separated by the River Trave, which is not fordable there. It's said, the Allies intend to march to Preize, and that the Danes will endeavour to hinder them. A Cartel is agreed upon between the two Armies for Exchange of Prisoners. The Ministers of the Princes Mediators, and the other Princes concerned in the Affair of Holstein, continue their Conferences for accommodating Matters; and on the 2d of the next Month are to have a General Meeting at the House of Monsieur Lenthe, one of the Danish Ministers, near Oldesloe. The Inhabitants of Altona have lately made a Payment of 3000 Dollars to the Allies, on account of the Contributions demanded of them.

Brussels, Aug. 3. A Placet is published here, to permit the carrying out of Woollen, and the Importation of Foreign Woollen Manufactures, on Condition, That in the several Towns of the Spanish Netherlands there shall be Halls erected for the Encouragement of the Woollen Manufacture in these Parts, and that all Foreign Woollen Manufactures imported shall immediately be carried to the said Halls, where the Merchants, who own the same, shall at the same time that they receive them, be obliged to take a certain quantity of Woollen Cloth, or Stuffs wrought in these Parts.

Loos, Aug. 3. The King arrived here from Sweitzke the 28th past in the Evening, and the next day hunted and killed a Stag. His Majesty came home afterwards on Horseback, and found himself very well after the Chace. Yesterday His Majesty hunted the Stag again, and

continues in very good Health. The Prince of Hesse, Second Son to the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, who was some time in England, is come hither to wait on His Majesty. A Gentleman is likewise come to this Place with the Character of Envoy from the King of Poland, and has desired an Audience of His Majesty.

Hague, Aug. 3. The Princess Dowager of Nassau, with the young Stadholder of Frize her Son, are returned to Leeward n. The Bishop of Osnabrug, Brother to the Duke of Lorraine, is arrived here from Germany. They write from Sweden, that Orders were given to the Forces on the Coast of Schonon to embark forthwith, in order to make a Descent in the Danish Dominions, and particularly in Zealand.

Paris, August 4. N.S. Two Couriers arrived here last week from Rome, one from the Prince of Monaco, Ambassador from this Crown, and the other with a Letter to the King from the Cardinal de Bouillon, giving him an Account of his being returned to Rome upon the Death of Cardinal Cibo, to take Possession of the Office of Dean of the College of Cardinals. Signior Gualtini is shortly expected here with the Character of the Pope's Nuncio. The Cardinal de Furstenberg has received a Brief from the Pope, permitting him to chuse a Coadjutor to the Bishoprick of Strasbourg. 'Tis reported, that three Bomb Ketches belonging to the Squadron commanded by Monsieur Nejmend in the Mediterranean Sea, have been lately cast away in a Storm.
