THE last Letters from the Saxon Camp near Riga gave an Account, that they made Preparations to repass the Dwina this day, so that we may expect every hour of their having attempted it. The Swedes continue in their Camp on the other side the River, which they have very well fortified, and have raised several Batteries to hinder the Saxons from coming over the River. Divers Noblemen of Poland are passed by this Place, going to attend the King of Poland at the Camp near Riga; and a great many Wagons are gone through this Place with Ammunition for the Saxon Army.

Warsaw, July 27. The Cardinal Primate is gone from hence to his House at Radzowic, and intends, after a short stay there, to go to Dantzick. The Sieur Oginsky is returned to Lithuania, and 300 new-raised Soldiers were sent from hence this week to the Saxon Camp in Livonia.

Copenhagen, Aug. 3. The Confederate Fleet sailed from before this Place on the 28th past, and Anchored in the King's Diep. The King of Sweden is at Malmoe, where about 12000 of his Forces are encamped, besides 14000 who embarked some days ago on 150 Transport-Ships, and 12 Swedish Frigats are appointed to convoy them, in order to make a descent in Koge-Bay, about three Danish miles from this Place, but the Wind being contrary, they have not yet appeared on this Coast. The Swedes at the same time make Preparations for another Transport of Forces from Gottembourg to Jutland. The Danes are putting themselves in a posture to hinder their landing, having raised several Batteries, and placed good Guards along the Sea-Coast. A Body of Forces are encamped near this City, who are said to be 10000 strong; And 'tis reported, that the new Levies that are making, and the Militia which are drawing together, will increase the number of the Troops in this Island to above 20000. Two English and three Dutch Men of War sailing lately to Gottembourg, met in the Kattegat with four Danish Merchant Ships coming from the North Sea, whom they permitted to pass without any disturbance.

Vizna, July 28. The Emperour intends to go to Neustad in 5 or 6 days, and the Elector Palatine is expected in 5 or 6 days, and the night hence. On the 24th Instant, the Imperial Court were entertained at the Palace at Favosita with a Turnament, performed by the King of the Romans, Prince Leopold Dietrichstein, and divers other Persons of Quality. The Turkish Ambassador was invited, and some of his Servants having behaved themselves rudely, and broke into the Emperour's Garden, he caused one of them to be hanged the next day, and the rest to be severely punished. Letters from Constantinople of the 19th of the last Month give an Account, that several Articles

were agreed between the Envoy of Muscovy and the Turkish Ministers, in order to a Prolongation of the Truce between the Czar and the Grand Signior; And an Express was dispatched to the Czar for his Approbation thereof.

Berlin, July 31. The Forces of the Elector of Brandenburg continue encamped near Lentzen. The Fortifications of Lockenitz, which Place commands a Pass between the Territories of Sweden and Brandenburg in Pomeran, are ordered to be repaired and augmented, and Directions are given to send for some Troops from Prussia to reinforce the Garrisons of the Elector's Frontier Towns on the side of Pomeran. The Count of Lowenhaupt is gone from hence with the Character of his Electoral Highness's Envoy to Stockholm, in the room of Count Dhona, who is returning home.

Francofurt, August 4. A Diet of the Circle of the Upper Rhine is shortly to meet at this Place, and Directions are given for the Troops of this Circle to draw together, in order to their being reviewed. The Elector Palatine, after a short stay at Heidelberg, continued his Journey to Vienna. A Detachment of his Forces in the Palatinate are directed to be in a readiness to march upon the first Orders they shall receive, but it is not yet known what Service they are to be employed in. The Great Master of the Teutonic Order is gone to the Baths at Swallach. Prince Lewis of Baden is shortly expected from Rastat at the Fort of Kiel, to view the Fortifications of that Place.

From the Confederate Camp near Segeberg, Aug. 5. On the 30th past there was a Skirmish between the advanced Guards of the Confederate and Danish Armies, and several were killed and wounded; Since which there has been another Encounter between two Parties, in which 6 or 7 were killed on either side. Several Conferences have been held at Bramstede, between the Ministers of the Princes and States concerned in the Affair of Holstein; but we do not hear any thing is yet concluded on, and most of the said Ministers are returned to Hamburg, where they are to continue their Conferences. The Duke of Holstein Ploen, who was present at some of these Meetings at Bramstede, has been since to attend the King of Denmark at Geluckstadt, and is returned hither.

Hamburg, August 6. Most of the Ministers concerned in the Negotiation for accommodating the Affair of Holstein, are returned hither from the Conferences at Bramstede. We hear, that the Pretensions of the several Parties are put into the hands of the Mediators. The Demand of Sweden and the Duke of Holstein demand, That Things be re-established on the foot of the Treaty of Altona, and the Duke of Holstein left undisturbed in the Possession of his Rights; That the Fortress Christianoppe be demolished, as being too near the Town of Kiel, and that the Swedes and Lunenburgers be reimbursed the Charges they have been at; The Danish

Differences between the Kings of Sweden and Poland may be treated of at the same time with the Affair of Holstein. In the mean time the Confederate and Danish Armies continue in the same Camps as were mentioned in our last. The Forces of Lunenburg, commanded by General Ohr, continue on the Frontier of the Country of Halberstat, observing the Saxon Troops that lately made an Inroad into the Country of Cell, under the Command of Count Ablefeld, who according to our last Advices are encamped near Liseburgh in the Territories of Brandenburg, and intend to march to the Country of Oldenburg, provided they can obtain a Passage through the Territories of the Bishops of Munster and Osnabrug. 'Tis said, Count Ablefeld writ a Letter to the Prince of Furstenberg, Governor of Saxony, for the King of Poland, desiring these Troops might come and take Quarters of Refreshment in the Saxon Territories; But an Answer was returned him, That the said Forces are now wholly in the Danish Service, and that the King of Poland's allowing them Quarters within his Dominions after the Hostilities they have committed against the Princes of the House of Lunenburg, might engage him in a Quarrel with those Princes, with whom he desires to maintain a good Correspondence. 'Tis said, that the Elector of Brandenburg has declared, that he will observe an exact Neutrality in this juncture of Affairs.

Leo, Aug. 6. His Majesty continues in perfect Health, and is now Hunting the Stag, and designs to lie this night at Dieren, and continue some days there. Monsieur Testau, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, came hither on Wednesday last from the Hague to wait on His Majesty. Monsieur Kirchner, the King of Poland's Resident, had Audience of His Majesty yesterday morning, and is this day returned to Holland. The Prince of Saxe Weissenfels having been here to wait on His Majesty, is likewise gone back this morning to the Hague.

Hague, Aug. 10. The Bishop of Osnabrug went from hence the 5th Instant to wait upon the King. The Baron Pleffe, Envoy from Denmark, is likewise gone to Dieren to attend His Majesty. The President de la Tour, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Savoy to His Majesty, is arrived here from Paris, and intends in 3 or 4 days to go to Dieren. The Sieur Bondeli is lately arrived here from Berlin with the Character of the Elector of Brandenburg's Envoy Extraordinary. Monsieur Optam, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General to his Electoral Highness, has obtained Leave to return hither, and is expected in 5 or 6 weeks. Several Foreign Ministers were in Conference this week at the Baron of Lillieroot's, Ambassador from Sweden. They write from Amsterdam, that 3 Dutch East India Ships are arrived in the Tessel, two of which sailed from Batavia the 17th of December last, and the other on the 20th of January.

Dieren, August 10. On Friday last, after Hunting the Stag, His Majesty came to this Place. His Majesty Hunted again yesterday, and designs to continue here till the latter end of the Week. The same day the Bishop of Osnabrug, younger Brother to the Duke of Lorraine, came to Apple-down, a Village near Leo, with the Earl of Carlingford, and other Persons of Quality in his Retinue, and the next day sent to acquaint the King with his Arrival in these Parts, and to desire Leave to wait on His Majesty, which he did on Sunday, and afterwards proceeded on his Journey towards Osnabrug. Monsieur Pleffe, Privy-Councillor to the King of Denmark, came hither on Sunday, and had yesterday an Audience of the King. The Baron Schatz, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Cell, is likewise come hither to wait on His Majesty.

Paris, Aug. 11. N. S. The Letters from Madrid give an Account, that the King of Spain has ordered, that divers Pensions and Salaries of Superintendary Officers, which amount to a great Sum yearly, be stop'd for 20 years, in order to employ this Money for Publick Services. That Monsieur Pointz was before Ceuta, and had Complimented the Governor, and offered him his Assistance against the Moors, to raise the Siege of that Place.

'Tis now said, that the King has repeated his Orders to the Cardinal de Bouillon, to return forthwith to his Abbey of Furnus near Lyons.

Westminster, Aug. 1. The Parliament met this day; and was further Prorogued to the 12th of September next.

Westminster, Aug. 4. His Highness the Duke of Gloucester's Body, with the Persons attending it, were brought on Thursday last, in the night, in the King's Barges from Windsor, and the Body was deposited in the Prince's Lodgings near the House of Lords, where 'tis to remain till it's Interment, which is appointed to be on Friday next. The Lords Justices went into Mourning this day.
