This officer has taken part in very many sorties, involving successful attacks on shipping, airfields involving successful attacks on shipping, airhelds and rail installations. In September, 1943, Flight Lieutenant Phipps participated in an engagement against 11 Junkers 52. Early in the fight, a bullet pierced his windscreen. The gun sight was damaged and Flight Lieutenant Phipps was cut over the eye by splinters. Despite these difficulties, he fought with rare skill and destroyed 4 of the enemy aircraft. His fine qualities have earned great praise. great praise.

Flying Officer George Augustus Shotan WILLIAMS (118639), Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, (118639), Royal No. 196 Squadron.

As navigator, Flying Officer Williams has taken part in many attacks against well defended targets in the Ruhr and Western Germany. He has displayed outstanding ability and great determination and has contributed materially to the successes obtained. His keenness and devotion to duty have always been evident.

Pilot Officer Philip Dyson (147748), Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, No. 196 Squadron.

Throughout his tour of operations, this officer has displayed great skill and sound judgment and has achieved much success. He has attacked his targets fearlessly, often in the face of heavy opposition, setting a very fine example.

Pilot Officer Cyril Bruce Megone (148126), Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, No. 603 Squadron.

Pilot Officer Megone is a keen and tenacious pilot. He has participated in a very large number of sorties, including a most determined attack on a large merchant ship which he bombed with destructive effect. In September, 1943, he took part in an engagement against a formation of enemy aircraft, one of which he shot down.

During the combat, his aircraft was hit and a fire commenced near the port main plane. Never-During the combat, his aircraft was hit and a fire commenced near the port main plane. Nevertheless, Pilot Officer Megone coolly flew the aircraft to the flat terrain of a small island where he effected a safe landing. Flames were still issuing from one of the fuel tanks but they were quickly extinguished. The situation was serious but, as it was clear that the island was still in enemy hands, Pilot Officer Megone took off. Displaying great skill and resolution he succeeded, after a long flight, in reaching base where he landed his badly damaged aircraft safely. His courage and resource were of a high order. courage and resource were of a high order.

Acting Warrant Officer George Alexander Lindsay (Can/R.79665), Royal Canadian Air Force, No. 156 Squadron.

This warrant officer was the mid-upper gunner of an aircraft detailed to attack Oldenburg one night in September, 1943. Shortly after the take-off, Warrant Officer Lindsay discovered that his electrically heated clothing was unserviceable and that his oxygen supply was not functioning properly. Displaying exceptional devotion to duty, Warrant Officer Lindsay refrained from disclosing these mishaps to his captain. At great personal discomfort, he remained at his post, alert closing these mishaps to his captain. At great personal discomfort, he remained at his post, alert to any threat to his aircraft, until the operation was almost completed. Not until the English coast was crossed, on the homeward flight, did he disclose his plight. His conduct was typical of the determination he has shown throughout the many sorties in which he has taken part.

This officer and airman were pilot and midupper gunner respectively of an aircraft engaged on a patrol in September, 1943. A surfaced U-Boat was sighted and Flying Officer Hartley immediately dived to attack. In spite of fierce gun fire from the submarine, Flying Officer Hartley straddled the vessel with his depth charges and probably destroyed it. During the approach, Flight Sergeant Ladds used his guns to good effect, pouring a hail of bullets into the U-boats gun positions. The aircraft sustained severe damage during the action and, a little later, Flying Officer Hartley was compelled to bring it down on to the sea. This officer and airman together with other members of the crew boarded the dinghy in which they subsequently drifted for 11 days before being rescued. During this period they had little food or water and, at times the sea was very rough. Nevertheless, they bore their privations with great heart and fortitude, setting an example which proved an inspiration to their comrades.
