THE King's Order has been Published, for Suppressing divers Pensions and Super-nu-merary Offices; This 'tis said will pro-duce a very considerable Sum of Money, which is to be employed for increasing the Spanish Forces both at Sea and Land, and repairing the Fortifi-cations; And Cardinal Portocarrero, Arch-Bishop of Tich, is appointed to manage the Affairs relat-ing to the Fleet, and the Marquis de Leganes, who relates to the Garrisons and Land Forces. Letters from Gibraltar say, the Marquis of Nes-mal with 12 French Men of War put into that Bay the 13th Instant, intending to join Monsieur de Pury's Squadron before Tangier, whose ap-pearance there has so alarmed the Moors, that they have sent for great part of their Forces, from the Siege of Ceuta to defend their Coasts.

Rome, July 31. The Cardinal Gibo de Massa, Dean of the College of Cardinals, died here last week in the 88th year of his Age, leaving in Mo-ney and Jewels to the value of above 500000 Crowns. The Cardinal de Bonifoni, Vice-Dean, who was then at Caprarola, no sooner received the news of his death, but returned hither, to make good his Pretension to that Office, which is a very considerable one, as well for its Authority as Revenue; Wherein 'tis said, the French Cardi-nals, as also the Ambassador of that Crown, do oppose him, and that an Interest is made for Car-dinal Barbarini. Cardinal Bouillon desired an Au-dience of the Pope, but has not yet obtained it; 'tis said the Pope intends to hold a Consistory the next week, where 'tis thought they will pro-ceed to the choice of a new Dean. In the mean time, this Office of Dean is discharged by Car-dinal Marefotti. The Pope has made Cardinal Pamphilo Governor of Port Anzo. He has ordered 40000 Crowns to be paid out of his Treasury for the Redemption of divers Captives in Barbary. A very noble Monument is building in the Church of St. Peter for the late Pope Innocent the Eleventh, by Prince Odescalchi his Nephew.

Missa, Aug. 2. On the 30th of the last Month a Detachment of the Swedish Forces appeared in sight of the Saxon Army, which is encamp'd on the other side the Duna, upon which the King of Poland drew up his Ar-my in order of Battle, but the Swedes without coming to any Action retired to their own Camp. The next day the Saxons advanced nearer to the Swedish Intrenchments, and there was some Skirmishes between them, and 'tis said the Swedes are since retired nearer to Riga. The Swedish Troops, who lately came over the Duna, and pitched the Saxon Camp, have repossesed the River, and returned to Riga, which Place is in a very good condition, and provided with every thing for its Defence.

Copenhagen, August 10. The Swedish Forces which lately landed in this Country, continue encamp'd near the Sea-side; More of their Troops are land'ed, and they are said to be at present 5000 Horse, and 10000 Foot. About 15 of their Transport Ships having Soldiers on board, came yesterday from Yffede, but none of them are yet come ashore; And 'tis said, that the English and Dutch are unwilling any more Forces should be land'ed. The Danish Parties have taken divers Swedes Prisoners, who are brought from their Camp, but no other Hostilities have yet pass'd, and Matters seem rather to tend to an Accom-mo-dation. In the mean time the Danes are forming a

Camp near this City, and the King has offered consider-able Privileges to such of the County People as shall ap-pear in Arms on this occasion. The young Students that are in this City have lifted themselves to the number of 1200, and are formed in several Companies, and Officers are appointed to Command them.

Frankfurt, Aug. 11. The Elector Palatine's Forces that are employed in repairing the Town and Fortifications of Manheim, have lately been reinforced, in order to their carrying on that Work with greater diligence. The Re-view of the Forces of the Circle of the Upper Rhine, which was appointed to be at Wisbaden, is put off. Ba-ton Muter, Envoy from Sweden, is gone from hence to visit the Waters of Swalbach. Prince Lewis of Baden in-tends shortly to go to Philipsburgh, to view the Maga-zines and Fortifications of that Place.

Hamburg, Aug. 13. The Ministers of the Princes Me-diators have since our last had several Conferences, and the Treaty for accommodating Matters between the Kings of Sweden and Denmark, and the Duke of Holstein, seems to be brought to a good conclusion, so that we ex-pect every hour to hear that the Peace is signed; 'Tis said that among other things it is agreed, That neither side shall build any Forts within two miles of the Fortifications that belong to the other; And that the Army of the Alli-ies are preparing to leave the Country of Holstein, and to march back towards the Elbe.

Brussels, August 17. The Electress of Bar-varia was delivered yesterday of a Son, for which here has been publick Rejoycings. A Dispute happened lately between the Arch-bishop of Mechlen and the Magistrates of that City, concerning a Person, who having com-mitted murder, took Refuge in a Monastery, from whence the Magistrates caused him to be taken by force. The Archbishop thereupon ex-communicated the principal Officers concerned in this affair, enjoining the Priests to leave off Mass whenever he should come into any Church: The Civil Magistrates on the other hand resenting this Proceeding, seized the Archbishop's Temporal Estate, and have condemned him in a Fine of 10000 Florins, unless he take off the Excommu-nication within a certain time. This matter has been brought before the Council of State here, and is by them referred to the Courts of Madrid and Rome; And in the mean time they have for-bid the Magistrates to proceed any farther, and the like Prohibition is made to the Archbishop by the Pope's Nuncio. The Countess of Berlips is come hither to assist at the Marriage of one of her Nieces to a Relation of the Marquis de Bed-mar's, and as soon as this Ceremony is over, will go to Germany. The Count de Tirimont expects by the next Courier from Spain, a Patent for creating him Treasurer-General of these Provin-cies.

Loe, August 17. On Sunday in the evening His Ma-jesty returned to this Place from Dieren. The President de la Tour, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Savoy, is come hither to wait upon His Majesty, as is also Signior Givaldy, Envoy from the Great Duke of Tuscany; And they have both had Audience of His Majesty, and are since returned to the Hague.

Hague, Aug. 17. The last Letters from the North give so good an Account of the Negotiations for adjusting Mat-ters in those Parts, that we hope our next Letters will tell us, that the Peace is signed. General Banierè, who went to Dieren to Compliment the King from the Duke of Holstein, is returned to this Place.

Paris, August 18. N. S. The King went the 15th Instant to Meadon, where he designs to continue some days. The Abbot de Rozzani, Resident from the Duke of Modena, is returned hither from Carrath, where he
