Riga, Aug. 3. On the 16th past, Count Welling, who wish the Swedish Forces was encamped within halt a Mile of this Town, having notice that the King of Polana's lamy were going to repass the Dana near Thomsfoorf, marched thither to oppose them; but the Saxons passed one River without much difficulty, and the Swedes not being throng enough to keep the Field against them, they reuned on the 3 st at night to their Camp near this Fax, having lest about 3 or 400 Men in their Retrear, and suffered great Inconveniencies from the want of Forrage and Provisions, and from the Weather, which, during the 5 days they were in motion, was very bad and rainy. The first Instant the Saxons advancing nearer to this City, Count Welling thought fir to separate his Army; He put 3000 Foot and 1000 Horse into the Town to strengthen the Garrison, and with the rest of his Forces, being about 4000 Horse and 1000 Horse into the Enemies Exonsions. From the King of Poland's Camp near Riga, August 7. We are making Preparations to beliege Riga; and to sewe a Communication with the other size of the Duna, a Party was sent in Boats to take the Island of Lutzenbalm, upon whose approach the Swedes that were there retired in their Boats to the Town; We have since made a Bridge from this side of the River to the said Island, and our Bridge of Boats is ordered to be removed from Thomsdarf thicher. On the sirst Instant the Swedes set sire to the Suburbs of Riga, which are burnt down for the better Desence of the Town; And a Body of their Forces, constiting chiefly of Horse, restring towards the Country, the Duke of Caurland was sent by the King on the 5th Instant with a Body of Horse to observe them, but he returned without coming to any Action. We took 24 Swedish Wagons which were carrying Provisions into the Town, and in a day or two shall be able to prevent their receiving any farther Supplies. This morning the Garrison of Riga made a Sally, but with little Success, several of the Swedes being taken Prisoners, And some of them being Burghers, they were permitted to return into the Town, and were bid to tell their fellow-Citizens, That if they would furrender without suffering a Siege, the King would grant them very favourable Conditions, and it they neglect this Offer, they must expect to see their Town entirely ruined; But we do not find the lahabitants disposed to entertain these Proposals, and the Burghers are observed to be equally industrious with the Garrison to make the necessary Provision for their Common Desence.

The Letters from the King of Poland's Army near Riga of the 11th Instant give an Account, that they were posted within a quarter of a German Mile of the Town, and were prepaing to Bombard it. order to prevent the Saxon Parties from making Excurtions; But when these Letters came away, Major-General La Forest was marched from the King of Polana's Camp with a Detachment of 6000 Saxon Horse to a tack them, and afterwards to put the Country under Contribution. The King has forbid his Soldiers to Plunder the Country People; and a Party of 16 Tartars having disobeyed this Order, their Officer was hanged, and each of the Soldiers had one of his Ears cut off. The Saxons are removing their Bridge of Boats from the Place where they repassed the Duna to the Isle of Lutzenholme. A very considerable Train of Artillery, and a great quantity of Bombs and other Ammunition, are passed by this Place going to the Camp, but it cannot be conveyed over the River before this Bridge is sinissed. The Duke de Croy, and divers other German Officers, are arrived here from Vienna, and intend in sew days to go to Museour to enter into the Czar's Service. The Hears and Animosities between General Sapieha and the Sicur Oginsky are revived; 'Tis said, the latter is coming to join the King of Polana's Army at the head of the Body of the Nobility of Samogistia.

From the Camb of the Allies at Seechera August 10

From the Camp of the Allies at Segeberg, August 19. The Ministers of the Mediators, and of the Parties concern'd in the Affair of Holfisin, having in several Meetings held at Travendahl, near our Camp, settled the Principal Points of a Treaty for accomodating the Difference between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Holfisin, they met again at the said Place yesterday, and the following Articles were Sign'd about Midnight. Express were immediately sent to the Kings of Sweden and Denmark with an account thereof, and the Duke of Holfisin has engaged. That the King of Sweden, upon the first Notice he shall receive of the Peace being signed, will withdraw his Forces out of the Isle of Zeeland, and the rest of the King of Denmark's Dominions. Matters being thus come to a Happy Conclusion, all Hostilities are celled, and immediately after the Ratifications are exchanged, the Consederate and Danish Forces will separate, and march to their several Quarters.

Extract of the Treaty of Peace between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Helstein Gottorp, Sign'd at Travendahl the Tath of Auguft, 1700.

I. It is agreed, That there shall be a General Am-nefty of all that has been done by both Parties.

II. All former Treaties between the two Families, and particularly the Treaty of Altena, are confirmed.

III. Where both Parties have a common Right, no-

thing shall be done by either side without the Consent of the other; But in their particular Territories, each Party shall fully and freely enjoy all the Righes of Sovereignty, without being molested by the other under pretence of a Community of Rights, or any other pretence what soever:

IV. That as well in the Dutchy of Holstein, as in that of Sleswick, neither Partie foul pretend to great

ser Prerogatives than the other.

V. That both Parties shall contribute equally to the Defence of the Lands that are enjoyed in Common by, both; Provided always, That under this pretence, neither Party shall be obliged to engage himself in an unnecessary Quarrel begun by the other without his Conunnecessary Quarrel begun by the other without his Consent. That the Duke shall enjoy the full Power of raising Soldiers, making Alliances, and building of Forts
in his own Deminions, without asking the Advice or,
Consent of the King of Denmark; And for the better

Fortifications of the other, or within one German
mile of the Territorics of the other, or of the Common Roads between Flensbourg and Rensbourg, Itzehoa, Geluckstad, and Hamburgh; And neither Party field.
