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Cádiz, Aug. 2. N. S.

Captain *Munden* having prolonged the Truce with the King of *Morocco*, is returned hither from the Coast of *Barbary*, and intends in 2 or 3 days to sail to *Algiers*. On the 29th past, the French Squadron, consisting of 12 Men of War, 2 Fireships, and 2 Tartanes, under the Command of the Marquis *de Nesmond*, came to an Anchor off this Port, where they still continue; Monsieur *Pointi* with his Squadron is still on the Coast of *Barbary*, but has done nothing remarkable since his Bombarding *Tangier*.

Madrid, Aug. 13. The King of *Spain* was somewhat out of order yesterday with a Fainting, but it soon went off, and he is very well again to day. Monsieur *Schwartzberg* had an Audience of the King on the first Instant; And Orders are sent to Don *Quiros* to return to the *Hague*, and to desire an Audience of His Majesty of Great Britain. His Catholick Majesty has resolved to augment his Land-Forces, and to that end to raise 4000 Horse and 12000 Foot, and to increase his Fleet by an addition of 24 Men of War, which are to be bought. Prince *Charles of Vaudemont*, and the young Count *Arctur*, are made Knights of the Order of the *Golden-Fleece*. The Marquis of *Monroy* is made one of the Stewards of the King's House, and is appointed to go with the Character of his Envoy to the Court of *Portugal*; and the Marquis of *Montcal* is named to go in the same Quality to *Genova*. The Sieur *Dios de la Torres*, who was Confessor to the King, having upon his falling into Disgrace retired to *Rome*, was brought from thence by the King's Order to *Marcia*, where he continues under Confinement.

Rome, Aug. 14. On the 31st of the last Month the Pope was taken ill of a Fever, which is since increased to such height, that his Recovery is despaired of. The Cardinals and Foreign Ministers are very industrious in forming their Parties against the next Conclave, 'tis said there are no less than 20 of the former who pretend to succeed the Pope, so that the See may probably remain long vacant; And in the mean time 'tis believed Cardinal *Ottoboni* will be chosen General of the Ecclesiastical State, the Pope having no Nephew. The Prince of *Monaco*, Ambassador from *France*, has by order from *France* signified to the Cardinal *de Bouillon*, That 'tis the King's Command he should resign his Place of Great Almoner of *France*, and take back his Order of the *Holy-Ghost*, and take down the Arms of *France* from the Gates of his Palace; But the Cardinal answered, He would himself write to the King to know his Pleasure.

From the King of *Poland's* Camp before *Riga*, August 14. We are making Preparations to Bombard the Town of *Riga*, and have begun to raise several Batteries for this purpose. The Governor of that Place has sent out all the old Men, the Women and Children, as being burthenfome in a Siege; And the Garrison and Inhabitants are doing every thing that is necessary to secure themselves from the effect of the Bombs. The Detachment of 6000 Horse which was lately sent from our Camp under the Command of Major-General *La Ferrière*, to attack the Body of *Swedes* commanded by Count *Willing*, and to put the Country under Contribution, is not yet returned, nor do we hear that any Action has passed between them.

Danzick, Aug. 21. The Cardinal Primate upon his arrival here, was Complimented by the Magistrates and Senate of this City; And he desired them to appoint two Deputies to confer with him, which was done accordingly, and they have had several Conferences, but 'tis not yet known upon what Subject. The King

of *Poland* has writ twice to our Magistrates, to desire them to furnish a quantity of Ammunition for the use of his Forces; which they have not yet complied with. The Letters from *Warsaw* say, the Sieur *Overbeck*, Envoy from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, is come thither from *Berlin*, and intends to attend the King of *Poland* in his Camp before *Riga*.

Vienna, August 18. The Elector and Electores Palatine arrived the 15th Instant at *Newstadt*, where the Imperial Court is at present. 'Tis said a Marriage is concluded between Prince *Charles of Newburgh* and the Princess of *Lubomirsky*. The Count *de Zedelinsky*, Envoy from the Emperor to the King of *Poland*, is returned to this Place from *Warsaw*, and the Count *de Straatman*, who is appointed to succeed him, is on his departure thither. Letters from *Croatia* say, the Imperial and Turkish Commissioners are gone from thence towards the *Theyffe*, to regulate the Boundaries on that side.

Hamburg, Aug. 27. The Confederate Army in *Holstein* is separated; The Guards of *Hanover* and *Cell* re-passed the *Elbe* this day at *Haarbourg*, and are gone to their Quarters; The rest of the Troops of *Lunenbourg* are marched home another way, and a Bridge of Boats is prepared at *Winsen* on the *Eibe* for the Dutch Forces, which are expected there on the 30th Instant in their March homewards. The Danish Forces are to decamp the 29th, and to return into the Territories of *Denmark*. The King of *Denmark* is now at *Cölsingen*; The Duke of *Cell* is expected to morrow at *Erbstorf*, in his return to *Cell*. The Elector of *Brandenburg's* Forces which were encamped at *Lenzen*, are returned to their Quarters. The Post from *Copenhagen* is not yet come in; We are expecting to hear, that the King of *Sweden*, upon the News of the Signing of the Peace, has withdrawn his Forces out of *Zeeland*.

Loo, August 31. On Saturday last the Pensioner of *Holland* came hither from the *Hague*, and he continues here; The next day the Count *d'Arvergue* came likewise to this Place to attend His Majesty. The same evening the Regiment of Dragoons, consisting of 10 Troops of 65 Men each, commanded by Major-General *Eppingen*, marched from their Quarters at *Campen* and *Zwoll*, and came and encamped about a Mile from this Place, where they were reviewed yesterday, and performed their Exercises before His Majesty, after which they returned to their Quarters. Monsieur *Dyckwolk* and Monsieur *Geldermalsen* arrived here this day from the *Hague*.

Hague, Aug. 31. A Plan of the new Fortifications intended to be made at the *Brill*, has been laid before the States-General, who have approved thereof. Yesterday the Count *de Briort*, Ambassador from *France*, and several other Foreign Ministers, were in Conference together. The Sieur *Bondeli*, Envoy from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, is returned hither from *Loo*.

Paris, Sept. 1. N. S. Two Expresses are arrived here from *Rome* with an Account, that the Pope is dangerously ill, and the last, who parted from thence the 22d past, brings Advice, that he was then at the last Extremity; Upon this, the Court has sent Orders to the Cardinal *Le Camus*, who is at his Diocess of *Grenoble*, to put himself in a readiness to go forthwith to *Rome*; The Cardinal *de Noailles*, President of the Assembly of the Clergy at *St. Germain in Laye*, has received like Orders; But the Cardinal *de Bonzy*, who is at his Bishoprick of *Narbonne*, is so weak and infirm, that 'tis believed he will hardly be

like to undertake such a Journey. The King is very much displeas'd with the Cardinal de Bouillon, for not returning to France according to his Orders; and the Parliament of Paris is order'd to take into Preceden's; what Proceedings there have been against others in the like Case, which they had under Consideration yesterday, but 'tis not yet known what Report they intend to make. It's said, that the Count d'Arvergne, brother to this Cardinal, will lay down his Commission of Major-General of the French Horse, and that 'twill be given to the Duke de Maine, who will quit his Place of Colonel of the Swiss in the French Service, in favour of the Prince of Conti, who, by having this Employment, will gain a great Interest among the Swissers, which may be of good use to him in furthering his Pretensions upon *Nis Chatel* after the Death of the Duchess of Nemours. On the 27th past an Edict was Registr'd in the Parliament of Paris, for suppressing divers offices created in Burgundy during the late War, in consideration of a Sum of 220000 Livres which the States of that Province have resolv'd to pay upon this account. The Princess of Conde is very ill. The Count d'Uzez, Brother to the Duke d'Uzez, has surrender'd himself in order to take his Trial, for having been second to the Count d'Albert in a Duel against the Counts of Rantzau and Chaffinbourg, who are gone out of this Kingdom.

Whereas a Traiterous and Villanous Libel, Entituled, Mr. Charnock's Letter, writ to a Friend after his Condemnation, has been lately dispers'd, and sent under Blank Covers to several Persons; the Lords Justices have thought fit to direct, that Publick Notice be given, That any Person who shall discover the Author or Printer of the said Libel, shall upon his Conviction receive a Reward of One Hundred Pounds; And whoever shall discover the Publisher of the said Libel, shall upon his Conviction have a Reward of Fifty Pounds: To be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

Whereas the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer at Westminster was attempt'd to be broke open on Saturday or Sunday night, the 17th or 18th Instant, and some Money belonging to the Clerks (who none of His Majesty's Treasury) was taken away. The Lords Justices are pleas'd to declare, That if any Person or Persons not concern'd in the said Robbery shall discover the Persons that were concern'd therein, so as they may be convicted by Law for the same, such Person or Persons shall receive the Reward of One hundred Pounds; And in case any one of the Persons concern'd in the said Robbery shall discover his Accomplices who were concern'd therein, so as they may be convicted for the same Offence, such Person shall not only receive the Reward of One hundred Pounds, as aforesaid, to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, but also His Majesty's Royal Pardon for the same.

Whereas either through Inadvertency, or a Malicious Design to hinder the Charity for Redemption of the Poor Captives under the Emperor of Morocco, it was insert'd in Two News-Papers published the 21st of this Instant August, call'd The Protestant Mercury, and The London Post, That the Collection for Redemption of the said Captives was over, and was found to amount to a Sum sufficient to discharge them: These are by Order of the Commissioners for Excusing His Majesty's Letters-Patents for the Redemption of the said Captives, to certify all Persons, That the said Collections are not yet over, and have not been made in many Places besides London, and the Parts adjacent; And that the said Pretended account of the said Collections is altogether False, and that there has not been Collect'd at present above One Seventh Part of what is requir'd for the said Captives Redemption: And therefore 'tis hop'd, That all Charitable-dispos'd Persons will not suffer themselves to be Prevented in their Good Intentions by such False and Uncertain Reports, but Contribute Liberally to so Great and Pressing a Charity, which is neither Farm'd, nor will be apply'd to any other Use; And will faithfully be employ'd for the Redemption of the said Poor Captives, who lie under a most Grievous and Barbarous Usage.
