**T**HE Count de Wallenstein, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, had his first Private Audience of the King of Portugal on the 25th Instant. The Cardinal de Souza was dangerously ill last week, and received the Extreme Unction, but he is since much better. On the 18th Instant the Duke de Cadaval took a Review in the Plain of Pedrossos of all the Forces, both Horse and Foot, that are quartered in and about this Place, which made a very good Appearance. Six Men of War are fitted out to cruise against the Ships of Barbary, several of them having lately been seen on this Coast.

**Madrid, Aug. 14.** The King of Spain having found great benefit in his Health from the Air of the *Esquivel* the last time he was there, has resolved to return to that Place as soon as the great heat of the Weather is over. Several Councils have been held by Cardinal *Portocarrero*, about increasing the Spanish Fleet, with the Management of which Affair he is chiefly entrusted; And the Ministers at this Court have likewise been several times in Conference with the Marquis of *Leganes*, (who is charged with the Care of the Land-Forces of this Kingdom) upon the Measures to be taken, in order to put them upon a better Foot than they are at present.

**Rome, Aug. 17.** The Pope is so ill, that his Physicians have acquainted him, that they think him to be in a very dangerous condition. This Illness of the Pope's has occasioned the putting off the Consistory, in which 'tis said he intended to confer the Office of Dean of the College of Cardinals upon the Cardinal de *Bouillon*; However the Pope has already granted him by a Brief the Bishopricks of *Osia* and *Velletry*, which are always annexed to that Dignity; and he has been Complimented thereupon by all the Cardinals, and particularly by Cardinal *Spada*, First Minister of State at this Court. The Cardinals are very busy in making Parties against the next Conclave; 'Tis said, there will be a great many Pretenders to the Popedom, but that those who in all appearance will stand the fairest, are of the old Cardinals, *Carpagna*, *Durazzo*, and *Panciatichi*; and of the new, *Morigia*, *Norris*, and *Rodolovick*.

**From the King of Poland's Camp before Riga, Aug. 19.** We began yesterday to Bombard the City of *Riga*, firing several Bombs from a Battery in the *Kober Schans*, but they did not reach the Town, being at too great a distance; We are now raising other Batteries, and Orders are given for bringing our heavy Cannon over the River, the Bridge of Boats at *Lutzenholme* being finished. The Besieged have made several Retrenchments without the Town, and planted Cannon there to hinder us from bringing our Batteries near enough for the Bombs to take effect. 'Tis said, Count *Welling* with the Forces under his Command, upon Advice that a Body of Swedish Forces was arrived at *Revell*, is marched that way to join them.

**Warsaw, Aug. 20.** An Express is passed through this Place, being sent from *Holstin* to the King of Poland with the News, that the Treaty for accommodating the Difference between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein* was in effect concluded. Our Advices from the King of *Poland's* Camp in *Livonia* say, the Saxons had thrown several Bombs into the Town of *Riga*, but without any effect, their Batteries being too far off, and that they were raising other Batteries, and expect-

their heavy Artillery, being resolved to go on with the Bombarding. They write from *Riga*, that the Place is in a very good condition of Defence, the Garrison very numerous, and well provided with all Necessaries, and that the Loss which the Swedish Forces, commanded by Count *Welling*, sustained in their late Retreat, is not near so great as the Saxons reported it to be. The States of *Courland* are assembled here, and have agreed to furnish 30000 Last of Corn, and as many of Oats, for the use of the King of *Poland's* Forces, but greater Supplies are demanded of them, which they seem willing to grant.

**Dantzick, August 25.** The Cardinal Primate is still here, and continues his Conferences with the Deputies of our Senate, which 'tis said relate to the Satisfaction demanded from this City by the Most Christian King, on account of what passed while Monsieur *Du Bart's* Squadron lay before this place. The Czar of *Muscovy* has writ to the Senate of *Poland*, to let them know, That he does not intend to take any Part in the War against *Sweden*. The Letters from the King of *Poland's* Camp in *Livonia* say, they had raised their Batteries, and were going to Bombard *Riga*.

**Copenhagen, Aug. 28.** On the 23d Instant the Count of *Ravenclau*, one of the King of *Denmark's* Counsellors, waited upon the King of *Sweden* in his Camp near *Rundsting*. The next day Count *Wrade*, and another of the King of *Sweden's* Ministers, came hither from the Swedish Camp to adjust divers Matters about the said King's withdrawing his Forces out of this Island; Monsieur *Krabbe* and the Sieur *Ola Hanssen* were appointed to confer with them on the part of the King of *Denmark*; They had yesterday a Conference together, and another this day; And every thing being agreed on, the Transport of the Swedish Forces is to be begun on the 31st Instant. The Danes are to furnish them for this purpose with several small Vessels, and an Embargo is therefore laid on all the Vessels in this Port. The Swedish Commissary-General *Adberstein* came hither the 24th Instant, to agree about the Provisions and Forrage to be furnished for the Swedish Forces during their stay in *Zeeland*, and the next day divers Wagons were sent to the Swedish Camp with Provisions. On the 25th Instant the King of *Sweden* took a Review of his Army, which according to the Swedish Muster-Rolls consists in 4000 Horse and 8000 Foot, besides 3000 Horses belonging to the King, the Officers, and the Baggage; and 'tis said, part of these Forces will be sent to *Livonia*. The King of *Sweden* has sent Orders to countermand the Transport of 3000 Men from *Gottenbourg* to *Tonningu*, if they be not already gone. The Forces which the Danes assembled to oppose the King of *Sweden* are encamped near this City, and as soon as the Swedes are withdrawn out of this Country, they will return to their Quarters, and the greatest part of them consisting of Militia, will be discharged and sent home. The Danish Fleet lies at Anchor in our Road, and will be laid up as soon as the English and Dutch, and the Swedish Fleets, are sailed home; The former are anchored off the Isle of *Wien*, and are taking in Provisions in order to their departure. The Swedish Fleet lies on the Coast of *Sweden*, between *Landseem* and *Malme*.

**Hamburgh, Aug. 27.** The Armies in *Holstein* are separated; the King of *Denmark's* Forces are returning to their Quarters, and the Swedish Forces which were there are marching part to *Bremen*, and part to *Pomerania*. The Dutch Infantry repulsed the *Ebo* yesterday, and their Ho'se will pass this River to day, and will march home through the Country of *Lunenburg*. The Elector of *Hanover* returned the 28th Instant to *Hanover*. The Duke

of *Haupten* is gone to view the Towns of *Leopold* and *Kiel*, after which he intends to come hither, and he has given Orders for preparing his Apartments in the Castle of *Gottorp*, where he designs to reside. Lieutenant General *Banner* is returned to this Place from *Loo*. The King of *Denmark* is still at *Coldingen*, but will return very soon to *Copenhagen*.

**Brussels, Septemb. 3.** The King of *Spain* has appointed the *Sieur Pasfall* to be his Envoy Extraordinary to His Majesty of *Great-Britain*, and he arrived here this day from *Madrid*. Don *Quiros*, the *Spanish* Ambassador, left this Place the 28th past, in order to return to the *Hague*. The Count *de Tirinont* has received a Commission from the King of *Spain*, to be Treasurer-General of the *Spanish* *Netherlands*, and has accordingly taken Possession of this Employment.

**Loo, Septemb. 3.** The King went yesterday to *Dieren*, and intends to go from thence on the 5th to lie that night at *Zuyvestein*, and to be the next day at *Breda*. On Friday His Majesty will go to the *Grave*, and return on Saturday to *Dieren*. During this Progress, His Majesty will review the *Dutch* Troops of all the adjacent Garrisons, and will view the new Fortifications of *Bergen-op-Zoom*. Lieutenant-General *de Bernsau* arrived here two days ago, being sent by the Elector of *Cologne* to Compliment His Majesty. The Pensioner, and Monsieur *Dyckvelt*, and divers other Persons of Quality that came hither to wait upon His Majesty, are returned to the *Hague*. The Letters come in this day from the North give an Account, That all Matters were adjusted between the *Swedes* and the *Danes* concerning the *Swedish* Forces retiring out of *Zeland*, and that the said Forces were accordingly preparing to Embark, in order to their return to *Schonen*.

**Hague, Septemb. 3.** Don *Quiros*, Ambassador from *Spain*, is arrived here from *Brussels*: The Pensioner of *Holland* is returned to this place from *Loo*. Monsieur *Pless*, Councillor to the King of *Denmark*, is gone to the *Brill*, in order to embark for *England*. The Count *de Goes*, Envoy from the Emperor, had a Conference this day with the Deputies of the States-General.

**Paris Sept. 4.** N. S. The King intends on the 23th of this Month to go from *Versailles* to *Fontainebleau*, and to continue there some time. He took a Review on the first Instant of his Guards of Musketeers in the Plain near *Versailles*. The King has added 30000 Livres a year to the Pension which he allows to the Prince of *Corsica*, in Consideration of the great Expence he was at in his Expedition to *Polana*. Count *Albert's* Regiment is given to Count *Wartigny*, a Reformed Colonel. The General Assembly of the Clergy intend to Separate by the 15th Instant. The Duke of *Orleans* has been very ill of the Gout, but is now perfectly recovered, and designs to come hither in 8 or 10 days, and to continue in this City till the departure of the Court for *Fontainebleau*. An Edict is published here, forbidding all such as let Lodgings to receive any Persons into their Houses that cannot give a good account of themselves, on pain of forfeiting 300 Livres for every such Offence.

Two long Loops of 18 Rose Diamonds in each, from 2 Gr. apiece to 1 Gr. with 2 Buttons or Reflex set with 11 Rose Diamonds in each, the two Middle-most about 7 Grains apiece, well-spread Diamonds. 4 longer Loops set with 20 Rose-Diamonds in each, as above, set in silver, open work leaves 4 Buttons or Reflex of 11 Rose-Diamonds each, the Middle stones not so big as the above-mentioned. 4 small Loops set with 9 Rose-Diamonds in each. 4 Buttons set with 9 Diamonds in each. A Girdle-Buckle of 22 Brilliant-Diamonds set close one to another, with 5 Diamonds more set on the Cross-Bar of the Buckle, one of the Tongues broke off. 8 small round stomacher Buckles, set with 8 small Brilliant Diamonds in each Buckle. A Triangle Crystal Seal with the Earl of *Ranelagh's* Coat of Arms, the Cypher and Crest set in Gold.
