Lisbon, Aug. 10. N. S.

THE Count de Wallenstein, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, has had several Private Audiences of the King of Portugal, and is preparing for his Publick Entry and Audience. The Marquis de Cassee is returned hither from his Embassy to the Court of France. By the last Letters from Goa, we have received a Confirmation of the taking of *Mombaga*, on the Coast of *Zanguabar*, by the *Arabs*; The Portuguese Governor had made a long and vigorous Defence, and at length his Garrison being reduced to 18 Men, and no hopes of any Succours left, they chose to destroy the Town rather than to Capitulate; Accordingly they made several Mines under the Fortifications, and when the *Arabs* stormed the Place, set fire to them, whereby a great number of the Enemy were killed, and the Fortifications blown up, and at the same time they set fire to the Town. About 9 days after this happened, several Ships arrived on that Coast, being sent from this Place and from Goa with Succours; They found the *Arabs* at work in repairing the Town, but could not learn what was become of the Governor and his Men, who 'tis thought perished at the same time with the Enemy by the blowing up of the Mines. The Portuguese Ships returned to Goa, and one of them was blown up by the way, the Powder having accidentally taken fire. 'Tis said, the *Arabs* were going to besiege *Mofambick*, another Place belonging to the Portuguese, on the Coast of *Zanguabar*.

Cadix, Aug. 16. Monsieur Pointy, with the Squadron of French Men of War under his Command, has left the Coast of *Barbary*, and we hear he is cruising off the South Cape. The 4 Gallies which were with him, are gone back to *Marsilles*. The Squadron, commanded by the Marquis de Nesmond, is still in this Port, and consists in 11 Men of War, and 2 Fireships; A French Frigate was sent from hence some days ago, to convoy a Vessel laden with Naval Stores to *Thoulon*. There are in this Port, a Dutch Man of War and 4 Merchant Ships, which came lately from *Leghorne*. The 11th Instant, one of the Spanish Galeons sitting out here for the *West-Indies*, accidentally took fire, and was soon consumed, being just come off the *Coast*. The Garrison of this Place has lately been reinforced by a Regiment of Foot, and five or six Companies of new-raised Soldiers. The President of the Contractation-house sent a Tartane two days ago to the *West-Indies*, with Orders for Don Pedro Navaretta, Admiral of the Spanish Fleet, which sailed thither in June last. The last Letters from *Ceuta* bring an Account, of the continued good Success of the Garrison in the Defence of that Place against the *Moor*s, who were once advanced as far as the Ditch of the Town, but the Besieged have recovered so much Ground of them, as to build a Horn-work without the Place, on that side which can only be attacked, the other parts of the Town being encompassed with the Sea, and they doubt not but in a short time to beat back the Enemy so far, as to be able to make a Ravelin beyond the said Horn-work.

Rome, Aug. 21. On the 16th Instant the Pope finding himself something better, sent for the Cardinals, *Spada*, *Albano*, *Panciatichi*, and *Ferrari*, Signior *Urbino Rocci* Chief Harbiager, and the Commissary of the Chamber, and in their Presence signed several Instruments; One for the selling of all his Goods after his decease, (except a Picture of the Annunciation, presented to him by the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, which he ordered should be kept among the Goods belonging to the Apostolick Chamber,) and for employing the Money for the Benefit of the Poor; Another for confirming the Foundation of an Hospital he has made in one of the Suburbs of this City for the Relief of poor Priests; And a third, for applying 40000 Crowns to the Redemption of Christian Slaves in *Barbary*, particularly those who are born within the Ecclesiastical State. He intended to have put 80000 Crowns into the Treasure kept in the Castle of *St. Angelo* for the extraordinary Occasions of the Church, but was advised to leave this Money to his Successor, that he might not find the Treasury quite empty. The Pope's Illness is since considerably increased, and 'tis believed he cannot live many hours. On the 18th Instant, the Prince of *Monaco*, Ambassador from France, went to the Cardinal de *Bouillon*, and desired to know of him, Whether he would obey the King's Orders, which require his immediate return to France? The Cardinal answered, He would begin his Journey thither presently after a Consistory has been held, where he might take Possession of the Office of Dean of the College of Cardinals; Upon which the Ambassador declared, That the Cardinal by his Disobedience has forfeited the Protection of the Crown of France, and all the Honours and Titles he held of the same; And commanded him in the King's Name, to deliver to him the Order of the *Holy-Ghost*, and his Patent of Great Almoner of France, as likewise all the Papers, Ciphers, and Writings, relating to the Ministry which he has exercised at this Court. The Cardinal replied, That nothing could be a greater Misfortune to him than his Majesty's Displeasure, protested he never had done any thing contrary to his Duty and Allegiance to the King; And as for the Order of the *Holy-Ghost*, the Patents, Papers, and Ciphers, he had received them from the King, and could return them only to himself, and accordingly he immediately sent away a Gentleman to carry them to France. The French Ambassador made afterwards a Visit to Cardinal *Spada*, and gave him an account of what had passed. Cardinal *Castelno* is shortly expected from his Arch-Bishoprick of *Naples*. Letters from *Lucca* bring an account of the Death of Cardinal *Bonvisi*, Bishop of that Place, which makes a fourth Vacaney in the College of Cardinals.

Venice, Aug. 28. The Place of Procurator of *St. Mark*, vacant by the Death of Signior *Marco Ruzzini*, is filled by Signior *Pietro Venier*, formerly Ambassador from this Republick to the Courts of France and Spain, who was Elected by the Unanimous Votes of the Great Council. The Senate has decreed a Solemn Mass to be said yearly, in the Presence of the Doge and Senate, for the late Doge *Silvestro Vaiter*, in Consideration of the Legacy of 50000 Ducats which he left to the Republick. A Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition will be sent in few days to the *Levant*, for the Service of the *Venetian* Forces there. Cardinal *Delfino* is arrived here from his Bishoprick of *Briscia*, and Cardinal *Rubini* from his Bishoprick of *Picenza*, and will be going to *Rome* in a day or two, and Cardinal *Cornaro* will go thither directly from *Padua*. The last Advices from *Rome* say, the Pope lay speechless, and we expect every hour to receive the News of his Death.

From the King of Poland's Camp before Riga, Aug. 26. We continue to make Preparations for the Bombarding of *Riga*, but have not yet received our heavy Artillery. On the 24th Instant, a Party was sent by water to burn the Boats which the *Swedes* make use of to cruise upon the *Duna*, but the Materials that were prepared for this purpose accidentally took Fire, and had like to have consumed the Boats which the *Saxons* were in a Detachment of 2000 Men was lately sent to attack the Fort of *Kockenhusen* upon the *Duna*, about 14 Miles distant from hence, but they are countermanded, upon advice, that the *Swedish* Boats under the Command of General *Wesling*, are marching towards that Place.

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Mittaw, August 29. The Duke de Croy, and divers other German Officers, who lately came with him from Vienna, are gone to Muscovy to enter into the Czar's Service. Several small Detachments of the Forces of Lithuania are marched by this Place to the King of Poland's Camp in Livonia. Our Letters from thence give an account, that they have made Preparations to Bombard Riga, but can proceed no farther till the arrival of their heavy Cannon. A Gentleman is arrived there with Letters from Major-General Langen, the King of Poland's Envoy Extraordinary in Muscovy, who writes, that his Endeavours to persuade the Czar to assist the King of Poland against the Swedes, have hitherto had little effect, but that the Treaty for the Prologation of the Truce between the Czar and the Grand-Signior being concluded, he may probably have better success in his Negotiation. However the Saxons begin to speak very dependingly of the Assistance of the Muscovites, and indeed in general of their Expedition in Livonia.

Copenhagen, Sept. 4. The King of Denmark arrived here the first Instant from Holstein, and the Queen the day following. Yesterday he saw the Students of this University, who upon the occasion of the late Swedish Descent formed themselves into a Regiment, Exercise their Arms, and afterwards went incognito in a Shalop to view the English and Dutch, and Swedish Fleets. The Swedish Forces are all withdrawn out of this Country, and the King of Sweden is returned with them to Sebastian; They lived in very good Order and Discipline during their stay in this Island.

Hamburgh, Sept. 7. The Swedish Troops which were in Holstein are all marched away, part of them to Pomeran, and part to Bremen. The Duke of Holstein is at Tonnigen. They write from Berlin, that the Electors of Brandenburg left that Place the 3d Instant, in order to go to Aix la Chapelle.

Brussels, Sept. 8. The Elector of Bavaria went from hence this morning, accompanied by the Marquis de Bedmar, and divers other Persons of Quality, to meet the King of England at Breda; after which his Electoral Highness intends to go to Antwerp.

Grave, Sept. 10. On the 6th Instant the King went from Zulestein to Breda, where His Majesty reviewed the next day 13 Squadrons of Horse, and 5 Battalions of Foot. The 8th, His Majesty went to Bergen-op Zoom, and having reviewed the 4 Battalions of that Garrison, and viewed the Fortifications, His Majesty returned in the evening to Breda, where the Elector of Bavaria, with the Marquis de Bedmar, the Count d'Arcos, and other Persons of Quality, arrived the same day to wait upon His Majesty. This morning the King left Breda, and is come to this Place; To-morrow morning His Majesty will review 9 Battalions of the Garrison of Mastricht, and other adjacent Places, which are now encamped without the Gates of the Town, and in the afternoon His Majesty intends to return to Dieren. The Electoral Prince of Brandenburg is come from Berlin to wait upon His Majesty, and will be here to-morrow at the Review.

Hague, Sept. 10. The States-General have received a Letter from the Duke of Holstein, to thank them for the Good Offices of their Mediation in the Treaty of Peace between the King of Denmark and his Highness. They write from Breda, that the Elector of Bavaria intends to return from thence this day to Brabant. The last Advices from Sweden say, a strong Detachment of the Swedish Forces that were quartered in Holstein, is to be sent by Sea to Livonia, to reinforce the Troops commanded by Count Welling, and that in the mean time other Succours are marching to join him from Finland, by the way of Nerva.

Paris, Sept. 11. N. 5. This being a time of Vacation for all the Courts of Justice, it gives an opportunity to the Cardinal de Bouillon's Friends to make Applications in his behalf; But 'tis generally believed they will prove ineffectual, and that as soon as the Parliament of Paris meets, they will give Judgment against him. The Cardinal de Noailles is on his departure for Rome; 'Tis said, the King has made him a considerable Present to defray the Charges of his Journey.

Deal, Sept. 3. Yesterday came into the Downs His Majesty's Ship the Paramour Pink from Newfoundland, and the Merchant Ships called the Mary, Captain Knox Commander, from the East-Indies, and the Lucy, Captain Breholt, from Barbadoes.
