Gadiz, Aug. 16. Monsieur Pointy, with the Squadron of French Men of War under his Command, has left the Coast of Barbary, and we hear he is cruizing off the South Cape. The 4 Galleys which were with him, are gone back to Marseilles. The Squadron, commanded by the Marquis de Nessand is fill in this Port, and consists in 11 Men of War, and 2 Fireships; A French Frigat was sent from hence some days ago, to convoy a Vessel laden with Naval Stores to Thoulon. There are in this Port, a Dutch Man of War and 4 Merchant Ships making the sent and 4 Merchant Ships, which came lately from Leghorne. 11th Instant, one of the Spanish Galeons fitting out here for the West-Indies, accidentally took fire, and was soon consumed, being just come off the Careene. The Garrison of this Place has lately been reinforced by a Regiment of Foot, and five or fix Companies of new-raifed Solders. The President of the Contractation-house sent a Tartane two days ago to the West-Indies, with Orders for Don Pedro Navaretta, Admiral of the Spauish Fleet, which sailed thither in June last. Rome, Aug. 21.
