sador will come away from Constantinople; Their Excellencies are to be exchanged upon the Frontiers in the same manner as when they set out upon their Embassies, which Ceremony 'tis believ'd will be perform'd towards the latter end of The last Letters from Constantinople say, the Grand Signior has dignified his Ambaffador at this Court with the Title of Vizier; And that there was a Report, that the Grand Signior having given Orders for the frangling of one of his Bassa's in Asia, for not using his Endeavours to suppress the Rebellion of the Arabs in those Parts, the said Bassa having notice thereof, engaged a great number of Men into his Party, and joined the Arabs, whose Force is thereby grown so considerable, that they have gained several Advantages over the Turkish Forces, which the Bassa of Babylon had assembled to oppose them; and some Advices say, the Sophy of Persia does underhand encourage and foment this Rebellion. The Letters from Greatia give Advice, that the Fortifications in the Island Broat are demolished, pursuant to the Agreement between the German and Turkish Commissioners for setling the Limits, who are remov'd from those Parts to Temeswaer, in order to regulate the Boundaries on that side.

Hamburgh, Spt. 10. Letters from Elfneur of the 7th Instant say, the English and Duich Squadrons were still anchored near that Place, but would proceed homewards as foon as the Swedish Fleet was failed for Careiscroone.

Paris, Sept. 15. N.S. All the Revenues which the Cardinal de Bouidon enjoyed in this Kingdom are sequestred, till such time as the Parliament of Paris gives Judgment against him. In the mean time his Place of Great A'monet of France is difposed of to the Cardinal Coassin, who was First Almoner to the King, and in this Place he is succeeded by the Bishop of Metz, his Nephew, who had before obtained this Office in Reversion. The Meeting of the General Assembly of the Clergy at St. Germains draws near a Conclusion; They intend the 19th Instant to wait upon the King, and to separate the day following. Proceedings in relation to Matters of Religion are printed, and contain 127 Propositions, which concern chiefly the Opinions of the Jansenists, and those of the Aich-Bishop of Cambray; As for what relates to the Doctrine of the Jeluits Miffionaries in China, who to humour their Proselytes, have framed for them a Religion made up of Christianity and Paganism, a great number of Books have been Published against them, but the King has put a stop to the writing any more, rill this Matter be decided at the Court of Rome. The Tax laid upon those who have had any share in the Collecting and Farming of the King's Revenues, amounts to 14443000 Livers; Monsieur Bourvalais Queta is the greatest, being 800000 Livers; Divers of them have already paid, others pretend themselves unable, but they will be obliged to pay this Tax, or to lie in Prison till they do. The Count a Uzez, who is accused of having bern Second to Count d'Albret in 2 Duel against two German Gentlemen, and upon that account was committed to Prison, is admitted to Bail; The two Germans are fled out of the Kingdom, as is also Count d'Albret, but 'tis said this last will return, there being no sufficient Proof against him.
