

# The London Gazette.

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Rome, Sept. 4. N. S.

**T**HE Pape continues extrem ill, Last week he sent for the Cardinals of the Palace, and gave the Bishoprick of *Viterbo* to Cardinal *Sancta Croce*, and that of *Osimo* to Signior *Gozzadini*, his Chamberlain, and made Cardinal *Cenci* Vice-Legate of *Bologna*. Cardinal *Albano* endeavoured to persuade him to declare the two Cardinals he reserved in Petto to do the last Promotion, but he has not yet thought fit to do so. All the French Servants of Cardinal *de Bouillon*'s have left him since his Disgrace, pursuant to the Most Christian King's Order, except only his Steward; But several of the Cardinals have offered him their Services, and particularly Cardinal *Nigroni* has desired him to make use of his Palace in this City. The Cardinals *Homodei* and *Nerli* are both very much indisposed; and we hear Cardinal *Duressi* is very ill at *Florence*. The Letters from *Naples* say, the Viceroy of that Kingdom has begun to put in execution the King of *Spain*'s late Order, for suppressing divers Persons and Supernumerary Offices.

**Genoa, Sept. 5.** The Squadron of French Gallies, commanded by the Chevalier *de Nautils*, are still in this Port, expecting a Supply of Provisions from *Marseilles*, and when they have received it, they will proceed on their Voyage to *Civita-Vecchia*. The Spanish Envoy arriving here has received Orders from *Madrid*, to go with the like Character to the Court of *Savoy*. The last Advice from *Algiers* say, the Affairs of that Government are in great Disorder, the Bey of *Tunis* on one side, and the King of *Morocco* on the other, being at War with them; His said, the *Algerines* have lately gained a Victory over the Army of *Morocco*, but they have not the like Success against the *Tunisians*, who have totally routed their Forces, and laid Siege to *Constantina* and *Erma*, two of the most considerab Places in the Kingdom of *Algiers*.

**Venice, Sept. 10.** The Senate has given Orders, That the Magazines of their Frontier Places in *Terra firma* be filled with Ammunition and Provisions, and their Fortifications kept in good Repair. Don *Juan Carlos Bacan* is arrived here with the Character of Ambassador from *Spain*. Signior *Giovanni Francisco Morosini*, who was appointed to go with the Character of Ambassador from this Republick to the Imperial Court in the room of Signior *Francisco Lovadano*, who is recalled, has excus'd himself from this Employment, and paid the usual Fine, and the Senate will soon proceed to a new Choice. Signior *Mocenigo*, who is named to go in the Quality of Ambassador from this State to *England*, expects the Senate's last Orders to proceed on his Journey. The Convey that is preparing here is almost ready, and will sail in few days with a considerable quantity of Provisions and Ammunition, and Recruits for the Venetian Forces in the *Levant*. The Letters from thence say, Captain-General *Cornaro* was come from *Napoli di Romania* to *Coron* in the *Morocco*, and would shortly return to *Venice*. The Captain-Bassa *Mezzemorto* was sailed towards the Isle of *Seio* with 12 Men of War and 20 Gallies, in order to raise the usual Tribute paid to the Grand Signior by the Islands in the *Archipelago* that are under his Dominion. The Captain-Bassa has desired Leave of the Grand Signior to resign his Employment, in Consideration of his very great Age, which 'tis believed will be granted him at his Return to *Constantinople*.

From the King of *Poland*'s Camp before *Riga*, Sept. 4. We have at length received our heavy Cannon and Mortars, and are at work in placing them upon the Batteries, in order to the Bombarding of *Riga*. Last night a Detachment of our Forces took a Post near the Town, and the Besieged made a Sally to regain it, but were

beaten back by a Party of 500 Men who were sent to support the *Saxons*. Several Parties have been sent out into the Country, who have brought back with them a considerable Booty. We have Advice that Count *Walling*, with the Swedish Forces under his Command, has entrenched himself in an advantageous Post near *Pernau*, where he expects farther Reinforcements from *Finland*.

**Copenhagen, Sept. 11. N. S.** The Swedish Fleet which lay near the Island of *Wien*, weighed Anchor the 8th Instant, and passing before the Danish Fleet which continues in our Road, sailed with a fair Wind towards *Carslesroome*, where we suppose they may be arrived by this time; And the next day the English and Dutch Squadrons passed thro' the *Sound*, in order to their return home. Count *Guldenlew*, Admiral-General of this Kingdom, is dangerously ill. The Danish Forces that were in *Holstein*, are marching to their Quarters. Our Advices from *Schonen* say, the King of *Sweden* is gone to *Christianstad*, to review his Forces which are to be sent to *Livonia*.

**Vienna, Sept. 8.** The Emperor and Empress, with the Elector and Electress Palatine, and Prince *Charles of Newbourg*, came the 10th Instant from *Newstad* to the Palace at *Favosita* near this City, where the King and Queen of the *Romans* arrived the 4th. The day following their Electoral Highnesses received a Visit from the Arch-Duke *Charles* and the Arch-Duchesses, who returned in the evening to *Eberdorf*. The King of the *Romans* intends to give a splendid Entertainment to morrow in his Palace at *Shornborne* to the Emperor and Empress, and to their Electoral Highnesses who in 4 or 5 days will leave this Place and return to *Disseldorf*; And about the same time the Imperial Court will remove to *Eberdorf*. A Match is concluded between Prince *Charles of Newbourg*, and the Daughter of Prince *Lubomirsky*, Great Marshal of the Crown of *Poland*. Count *Stratman*, who is gone with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the King of *Poland*, has Orders to use his Endeavours to accommodate the Differences between the King of *Sweden* and that Prince. Cardinal *Lamberg* is shortly expected here from his Bishoprick of *Passau*, to receive the Cap from the Emperor's Hands. The Council of War meet frequently to consider of the State of the Imperial Forces, and expect the return of Prince *Eugene of Savoy*, who is gone to review the Troops quartered in *Hungary*, that upon his Report they may give the necessary Directions for recruiting them, and remounting the Cavalry. Letters from *Temeswaer* say, the Imperial and Turkish Commissioners were shortly expected there from *Croatia* to continue their Conferences for regulating the Limits, and that the States of the Principality of *Transylvania*, which were assembled at *Alba Julia*, separated on the 20th past, but would meet again on the 8th Instant. The last Advices from *Constantinople* bring a Confirmation, that the Treaty for Prolongation of the Truce between the Czar of *Muscovy* and the Grand Signior is concluded, by which is left to the Czar the Possession of *Azof*, and all the other Places taken from the *Turks* by the *Niepr*. These Letters add, that the *Muscovite* Envoy insisted very much on a Free Trade and Navigation on the *Black Sea*, but could not obtain it.

**Hamburgh, Sept. 14.** Commissioners from the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holsheim-Gottorp* are shortly to meet in this City, in pursuance of what is stipulated in the 11th Article of the Treaty of *Trarvendale*, to adjust several Matters which were left undetermined by the said Treaty. Count *Guldensterne*, the Swedish General, is gone from this Place to *Staden* to review part of the Swedish Forces that were in *Holstein*, who have repassed the *Elbe* at *Blaskeness*, and are marched to the Duchy of *Bremen*. The rest of the Swedish Troops are marching to *Pommern*, and there is a discourse that they intend to make an Irruption into the Electorate of *Saxony*, if the Elector of *Brandenburgh* can be prevailed with to allow them Passage through his Territories. The Duke of *Holsheim* is gone to *Tonningen*; 'tis said he intends shortly to return to *Stockholm*. The Count *de Chamilly*, Ambassador from *France*, will leave this Place in a day or two, and return to *Copenhagen*. The last Advices from *Livonia* give an Account, that the *Saxon* Forces before *Riga* meet with so many Difficulties, that 'tis believed they will be forced to quit their Design against the Town of *Riga*.

Paris, Sept. 22. N. S. The Court returned the 18th Instant from Marly to Versailles, and will go tomorrow to Fontainebleau, where the King intends to continue till the latter end of November; and the Council of State is likewise to remove thither. The Duke and Duchess of Orleans, who have been some time at their House in this City called the *Palace-Royal*, went from hence this day to meet the Court at Fontainebleau, and will lie by the way at a House of the Chevalier de Lorraine's; The Dauphin intends to be this evening at *Pointe-aux-François*, a House belonging to the Marquis d'Anin, and to morrow at Fontainebleau. The Duchess de Chartres being near her time, is come to the *Palace-Royal*, where she intends to lie in. Monsieur de Harlay, who was the King's First Plenipotentiary at the Treaty of Ryswick, is made Councillor of State in Ordinary in the Place of Monsieur de Bezons deceased, and is succeeded as Councillor of State Extraordinary by Monsieur de Noin, Intendant of Bretagne. The French Squadron, commanded by Monsieur Pointu, is returned from the *Streights to Brest*, having left two Frigates on the Coast of Barbary with Orders to cruize against the *Mors of Salie* till the Month of December; The 4 French Gallies commanded by the Chevalier de la Palmetiere, which made part of this Squadron, are gone back to *Marseilles*. Monsieur Pointu is come to Court, to give the King an account of his Expedition, which has not had all the Success that was expected. The Marquis de Nivernois with his Squadron, consisting of 11 Men of War and 2 Fireships, continues on the Coast of Spain. Orders are sent to *Marseilles*, for four Gallies to be in a readiness to carry the Cardinals, *de Coassin, le Camus, and Noailles*, with their Retinue, to Rome, our last Advices from thence giving an Account, that the Pope continues so ill, that there is no hopes of his Recovery. The former of these Cardinals is made Great Almoner of France in the room of the Cardinal de Bouillon, who is removed from that Employment for having disobeyed the King's Order for his immediate return to this Kingdom. The Propositions extracted out of the *Jesuit le Comte's* Writings have been Condemned, with Submission to the Pope's further Decision, by an Assembly of 24 Doctors of Divinity, who were ordered to examine the same. The Abbess of *Danlan in Alsace*, being lately dead, the Nuns of that rich Monastery have, according to the King's Directions, sent him the Names of three Persons, out of which the King has chosen one to be their Abbess, who is a Princess of the Empire. The Sieurs, *Ducas, Renault, and de la Boulaye*, who were sent to the French Colonies in the *West Indies* to inspect their Fortifications, and the present State of the Trade in those Parts, are returned hither, and we hear they have given Directions for the building of several Forts in the French Plantations. The Letters from *Port Louis* say, they have begun afresh the making of a new Basin for Ships in that Port, and that this Work is carried on with such diligence, that 'tis thought it may be finished in two Months time.

Dial, Sept. 14. Sir George Rook arrived in the *Downes* this afternoon with the Squadron of his Majesty's Ships from the *Sea*; He will stay in the *Downes* to Revictual the Men of War that are to attend His Majesty in his Return to England, and so soon as that is done, will proceed to the Coast of *Holland*.

Monday, Sept. 12. The Parliament met this day, and was further Prorogued to the 24th of October next.
