Turin, Sept. 11. N. S.

THE Duke of Savoy has been ill of an Ague, but having for several days had no return of it, he is gone from hence to his Palace at Scire for the benefit of the Air. The Dutchess-Dowager has been very ill of a Fever, but is perfectly recovered.

Venice, Septemb. 18. The Senate having made Choice of Signior *Pietro Venier* to be Procurator of *St. Mark* in the room of Signior *Ruzzini* deceased, he took Possession of that Dignity on Monday last with the usual Ceremonies, and his Friends and Relations according to custom made Publick Rejoicings. The Count *de Berka*, Ambassador from the Emperor, has received from *Vienna* a Commission to be Great Marshal of the Kingdom of *Bohemia*. The Advices from *Rome* of the 11th Instant give an Account, that the Pope is much better; When he was thought to be at the last Extremity, the Cardinals began to declare their Sentiments in relation to a new Election, and appeared to be divided in Five Factions, One in favour of Cardinal *Rospigliosi*, at the Head of which is Cardinal *Panciatiti*; Another for Cardinal *Carpagna*, supported by Cardinal *Ottoboni*; A Third that call themselves the Zealots, who set up Cardinal *Asolini*; A Fourth Party for Cardinal *del Verme*; And the Fifth, (of which Cardinal *Spinola* is Chief) who have not yet declared for any body, and resolve to keep together, and give their Votes as they shall think fit hereafter.

From the Saxon Camp before *Riga*, Sept. 16. N. S. The King of *Poland*, upon the Instances of Monsieur *du Heron*, Envoy from *France*, and other Foreign Ministers, and upon the Representations made to him on behalf of the *English* and *Dutch* Merchants, who would have been great Sufferers if the Town of *Riga* had been Bombarded, has given over this Design, and accordingly the Batteries that were raised for this purpose are ordered to be demolished, and the heavy Artillery will be sent back to *Cowland*. The said Ministers continue to employ their good Offices for accommodating the Differences between the King of *Poland* and the Crown of *Sweden*, and 'tis said they have already made a good Progress in this Negotiation.

Munich, Sept. 17. Letters from the Camp before *Riga* give an Account, that the Negotiations carried on by the *French*, and other Foreign Ministers, for adjusting Matters between the Kings of *Sweden* and *Poland*, seem to be in a very good way, and that the King of *Poland*, in compliance with the pressing Instances of the said Ministers, has wholly laid aside his Design of Bombarding *Riga*, and ordered the Batteries to be demolished, and the heavy Artillery to be sent back hither.

Carlsburgh, Sept. 20. The King of *Sweden* is still here, but intends to go in 2 or 3 days to *Wismar*, where the Duke of *Holstein* is shortly expected from *Holstein*. The Preparations for the Transport of 10000 *Swedish* Forces to *Livonia* are in such a forwardness, that 'tis thought they will be embarked and ready to sail within a fortnight.

The Discourse continues, that the King of *Sweden* designs to go with them to *Livonia*.

Copenhagen, Sept. 25. The King of *Denmark* continues as well as can be expected in his condition, and the Small-pox begia to dry. The Seamen that were on board the *Danish* Fleet are paid off, and discharged; and 'tis said, that part of the *Danish* Force that served in *Holstein* will be disbanded. A Block-house is ordered to be built before *Christians-haven*, to prevent the Bombarding of this Place by Sea. The Equipage of Count *Chamilly*, the *French* Ambassador, is arrived here from *Hamburgh*, and his Excellency is expected to morrow. The Duke of *Wirtemberg* intends to go from hence in a few days to *Holland*.

Vienna, Sept. 18. On the 15th Instant the Elector and Electores Palatine were splendidly entertained at Dinner by the King of the *Romans* at his House at *Schonbrun*; and the same afternoon their Electoral Highnesses took their Leave of the Imperial Court, and lay that night at *Buckersdorf*, from whence they continued their Journey the next day towards *Dusseldorp*, being attended by Commissioners appointed by the Emperor to defray their Expences as far as *Ried*, on the Frontiers of the Electorate of *Bavaria*. The Emperor and Empress, and the King and Queen of the *Romans*, are gone to *Eberstorf*, where they intend to continue till the middle of the next month. Yesterday Prince *Charles of Newbourg* returned to *Breslaw* in *Silesia*, where he designs to continue till the Celebrating of his Marriage with the young Princess *Lubomirsky*. The Prince her Father arrived here this day from *Poland*, and intends to wait upon the Emperor at *Eberstorf*, and from thence to proceed to *Rome*. The Cardinal *Lemberg* is come hither from his Bishoprick of *Passau*, and intends to go in a day or two to *Eberstorf* to receive the Cap from the Emperor's hands. The last Advices from *Upper Hungary* say, the Imperial and *Turkish* Commissioners have renewed their Conferences for settling the Limits on that side, wherein 'tis supposed they will meet with no great difficulty, the Boundaries being distinguished in most Places by Rivers and Mountains.

Hamburgh, Sept. 28. The Commissioners appointed by the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein*, to adjust several Matters that were not settled by the Treaty of *Travendahl*, will begin their Conferences in 3 or 4 days. The Duke has ordered a considerable quantity of Silver to be Comed, with the Bombarding of *Tumingen* on one side, and the Conclusion of the Peace between the King of *Denmark* and his Highness on the other, which will be distributed among the Officers and Soldiers that were in that Place when it was Belieged. His Highness intends to go from hence the 30th Instant with General *Bannier*, and divers other Officers that are to serve under him, to wait upon the King of *Sweden* at *Ustede* before they proceed on their Voyage to *Livonia*. Our Letters from thence give an Account, that the Ministers of the Princes, who employ their Mediation to adjust the Differences between the Kings of *Sweden* and *Poland*, have prevailed with the latter to desist from his Enterprize against *Riga*, and that he appears inclinable to hearken to Terms of Accommodation. There are Advices, that the Czar parted from *Myscow* the 22d of the last Month, to join his Forces which are said to be marching towards *Nerova*.

Dieren, Sept. 30. N.S. The King came hither last Tuesday in the Evening; The next day all the Dutch Troops that served lately in Holstein, except one Battalion of Foot, came from the adjacent Towns, and encamped near this Place, where they passed in Review, and perform'd their Exercise this morning before His Majesty, and then decamped in order to march into Winter-Quarters. Two young Princes of Bareith, of the House of Brandenburgh, arrived here this morning to wait upon His Majesty, and were present at the Review.

Hague, Octob. 1. The Electoral Prince of Brandenburgh, since his arrival here, has been visited by the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Quality; He intends to go from hence to-morrow to Brussels, to which Place the Electress his Mother, and the Electress Dowager of Hanover, design to come from Aix la Chapelle, and their Electoral Highnesses, with the Electoral Prince, will come hither to meet His Majesty at his return from Loo. The Swedish Ambassador, and the Resident of Poland, have both presented Memorials to the States-General, concerning the Differences between the Kings of Sweden and Poland; and the Deputies of this State, and some of the Foreign Ministers here, have had several Conferences upon the same Subject, and 'tis said, Matters are in a fair way of Accommodation. The Baron Schutze, Envoy from the Duke of Goh, is gone from hence to attend His Majesty at Loo.

Paris Octob. 2. N.S. The Court is at Fontainebleau. The King has given 6000 Livres to the Count de la Motte, Lieutenant of the Gards du Corps, in Consideration of the Loss he has suffered this year by a Distemper which was among the Cattel, and killed a great number of the Horses of his Troops. Monsieur Dangeville, the King's Solicitor-General in the Parliament of Paris, has bought for 20000 Livres the Place of Attorney-General, vacant by the Death of Monsieur de la Brije. The Monks of the Order of the Trinity having out of the Publick Charity, collected by them for that purpose, redeemed all the French Captives at Tripoli, Tunis, and Algiers, they employed the Surplus (with the King's Leave) in Redeeming 66 Persons that were born in the Spanish Netherlands, whom they presented to the King at Fontainebleau the 29th inst. 'Tis said, the King intends to raise the Count de Toulouse Colonel-General of the Swiss in the French Service, in the room of the Duke du Maine, who is made Colonel-General of the French Light Horse.

Deal, Sept. 24. Yesterday came in here the *Jafish*, Captain Hill Commander, from the East-Indies; and the *Cipriot*, Captain Paramour, from Alexandria.
