He 3d instant arrived the Charity of London from Croylick, and the 5th the George of Weymouth from the same place, the nex day arti-yed the Greyhound of this place from Genoua, having had thence the company of several other Merchant thips of London and other Western Ports. the Cape de Gates, being got at some distance from her company, the fell in amongst 4 Turkish Men of Wars whose Admiral commanded the Master on board, whilest his B pars Crew examined the Ship, but took thence only a Cheft of Lemmons and some small Mathematical Instruments : . the Master was in the mean time civilly treated on board the Admiral, whose Captain was chiefly inquistive after a Spanish ship which was to set out from Alecant with 3 cr 400 foldiers and provisions designed for Oran, a place, held by the Spaniards from the Turks. Off the South Cape an Algier Man of War with another of Sally, came in the Nicht amongst the Fleet; but being mouest in so much company, left them without any disturbance.

The 7th instant came in the Lilly Rose of this place from Morlaix, affirming that many soldiers intended for Candia, are shipt and ready to put to sea from Bress; that the, French, still continue building of ships, and that a Proclamation is there published, imposing 27 Livres apiece upon all Dutch and English ships that shall come in there, besides

the ancient Tunnage.

Danizick, May 4. From Warfam we have advice of the arrival there of the two Chancellors of that Kingdom, with the Bishops of Potsko and Posen, and the Vaivodes of Sendomir, Pomerelle, and other places; and that the zoth past the Prince Radzeville Chancellor and Vice-Blareihal of Lithuania, was to make his Publick Entry,

having with him 15. Companies of Foot and Horse.

The Grandees of Poland already appear very numerous in the City with many Attendants and great Trains. The Ambassadors and Ministers of Forreign Princes begin also to shew themselves near the City, those from France, Nicubourgh, and Lorrain, are lodged within two or three miles of Warsaw, but have not yet obtained liberty to enter the City; but the Senators have ordered some Polish Gentlemen to attend and complement them, and under that pretence to observe their actions; the better to prevent any under hand practices to the disturbance of the Publick Peace. The Ambassadours from His Imperial Majesty and the Elector of Brandenbourgh are also suddenly expected.

Tis believed they may proceed in little time to an Election, and the looner, the tetter to prevent any designs of the Tartars or other Nations which border upon Poland. The King is retired from Warfaw, but not to any considerable distance; pressing much the Establ shment of his Pension and suture allowance for his substituance, to have it sonfirmed by the Assembly of the States and by the Sue-

cellor to his Crown.

Venites, May 4. Here is daily expected the Regiment railed for the affishance of this Republick by the Elector of Bavaria with other forces from other Princes of Germany, for whose transportation as well as for a farther supply of Candia, a new Convoy of 16 ships is sitting up, some of, which are already taking in their Provisions and other neces-

faries for the supply of that place, upon which are also to be imbarked 200 horse more towards the p eparation for a Field-Army, and a considerable number of Masons, 4 arpenters and other Labourers to be employed for the effence

of the City, and its fortifications.

We have not of late received any particular account by Letters from Candia of the flate of our affairs there, nor of the advances made by the Turks upon them, onely by advices scatteringly brought us from other parts, we find the Visier more intent then ever upon that work, and encouraging his people to improve their valour to the utmost, before the forces of the Christian Princes can be united and tran ported into the Island : that for some time he was willing to attend the succe's of his Mines, in which he had reposed much confidence, thinking by this means to be as little ex-. pensive and profuse of the lives of hispeople as he could, his numbers being not over considerable before the Town, and his expectation of fresh forces often trustrated, but finding little success in these underground defignes, and having lost a confiderable number of his men by the happy firing of the. Mines by the Venetians, to the utter ruine of his Mount and Battery b fore the Work St. Antire, in which he loft above 1000 men. He fince in much fury meditating revenge, ordered a fierce affault to be given to that part wherein the had before made a confiderable breach, which continued for fome time with dubious success and great flaughters, but the valour of the belieged in the end forced them to retreats to the great vexation as well as loss to the Visier, and greater discouragement to his Army; nor had the Christians an easie victory, but besides the loss of many soluters, several Officers of principal note who had that day as well as formerly fignalized their valouts in the defence of the place, dyed valiantly fighting against the Enemy, of which we in few days may expect the particular.
