*HE Pope grows weaker every day, and in all likelihood cannot hold out much longer; which makes the Cardinals very buffe in carrying on their Intrigues against the net Conclave. Cardinal Carpegna feems to have the best Interest at present, and to have the fewest Orthions made against him by the several Parties; by there are 13 or 14 Cardinals more, who are mind of as the most likely to come in Nomination. Cardinal Santa Croce having excused himfelf from accepting the Bishoprick of Viterbo, the Pope offered it to Cardinal Tanara, who has likewife refused it. The Letter which Cardinal de Builten lately writ to the Most Christian King, to justifie his late Conduct, is fent back without being opened. The said Cardinal lives in the

mean time very privately in the Jesuits College.

Them, Sept. 18. The Duke of Savoy is perfectly recovered of his late Illness, and intends in few days to go to the Dutchy of Savoy to view the Fortifications of Mentmeillan, and other Place. There is Advice, that 200 Persons, who were banished out of the Province of Mondowi on account of the late Rebellion, have surprized the Calle of Penzone in the State of Mantua, which

they are fortifying.

Milan, Sept. 18. A General Review was lately with, sept. 18. A General Review was lately taken of all the Forces in this Dutchy, and Ortens are given for recruiting them. The Marquil of Patigns, who was sent some time ago with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Spain to the Duke of Parma, having finified his Negociation, returned hither this day. A confiderable Sum of Money is fent to the Spanish Ambalisdor in Swifferland, to pay the Arrears due to the Swife Forces what were in the Service

Ginus, Sept. 19. The 10 French Galleys, commanded by the Bailly de Nonilles, continue in this Port, expecting Orders from the French Court to return to Marfilles. Four Galleys belonging to this Republick are cruizing against the Ships of Barkary. Signior Albizo, Envoy from Spain, who is appointed to go with the same Character to the Court of Turin, has received Orders to put off his Journey thither till the arrival of the Marquis of Mentreal, who is coming to refide here in his toom. Tissaid, that the Senate of Genous continue their Resolution to make Delle Spezze a Free Port, though they have not yet made any Publick Declaration in this Matter.

Frim the Saxon Camp before Riga, Sept. 23. N. S. On the 21st Instant, 3000 Saxons, under the Command of Duke Ferdinand of Courland, marched from hence to attack the Fort of Kerkenbussen, belonging to the Swedes, and several Pieces of Cannon were fent after them. And we hear, that upon Advice of the march of these Troops, Count Welling with the Sweche Forces is approached nearer to Kockenhuyfen; but tis believed, the Body of Troops

were fent out of the Camp some days ago to observe him, will be able to hinder his relieving that Place. The King of Poland has set at liberty all the Swedish Prisoners that were in his Camp; and Count Dahlberg, the Governor of Riga, has in like manner released all the Saxons and others who were taken Priloners by the Swedes. Two Troops of Lithuanian Horse, of 70 Men each, came last week to our Camp, being fent by the Great Chancellor of that Dutchy, and the Under-Chancellor arrived two days ago with a Company of Foot; But the Standard-Bearer of Samegitia having Summoned together the Gentlemen of that Province in order to join the King's Forces, a Letter was sent to them by their Castellan, representing that they were not regularly assembled, and that the Laws and Constitution of their Country do not allow of their marching out of the Kingdom without leave from the Republick, much less to attack a Nation with whom they are in Friendship and Alliance; This wrought fuch a change, and incensed them against their Standard-Bearer to such a degree, that they presently separated and he escaped their Fury with much difficulty. 'Tis said, the King's quitting his Delign of attacking Riga, has given great Diffatisfaction to some of the great Officers of Poland, who had particular Reasons to defire it, and particularly to the Bishop of Szemeiten, who expected to be made Archbishop of the

Copenhagen, Octob, 2. The King of Denmark is very well recovered; The Queen has also been indisposed, but is much better. The King has ordered several of his General Officers and Ministers of State to give him an Account in Writing of their Thoughts concerning the Disbanding part of his Forces, and fetting up in their stead a standing Militia, for the Defence of the Country upon any sudden occasion. Counsellor Jessen is appointed to go with the Character of Ambassador to the Court at Vienia, and has relign'd his Place of Secretary of State, and the same is given to the Heer Sette, the King's Envoy at the Court of Sweden, who is recalled, and is to be succeeded in that Employment by the Heer Wieburgh. Count Chamilly, the French Ambailador, is returned hither from Hamburgh; The Duke of Wirtemberg has put off his departure to Hol-

land till the King's perfect Recovery.
