As flight engineer, this airman has participated in many sorties and has always displayed praiseworthy keenness, skill and resource. One night in February, 1944, he took part in an attack on Berlin. During the operation, the rear gunner became unconscious through lack of oxygen. With commendable promptitude, Sergeant Craig went to his comrade's assistance. After administering

oxygen from the emergency bottles he succeeded in extricating the unconscious gunner from the turret and got him to a rest position where he then plugged the gunner's oxygen tube to the main supply. With complete disregard for his own welfare, Sergeant Craig then manned the rear turret. He was forced to vacate the position, however, as he had no electrically heated clothing and the oxygen point was unserviceable. On reaching the wireless operator's position, Sergeant Craig collapsed but quickly revived and resumed his normal duties. He displayed great gallantry and resource and his prompt aid undoubtedly saved the life of his comrade.

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
