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Cheshire, May 12:

ON Sunday last in the afternoon, Her Grace the Duchess of Ormond embarked at Beaumaris upon the pleasure-Boat which there attended her, and put to sea for Dublin with a fair wind.

Naples, April 30. The Mountain Vesuvius has of late cast up more smoke and ashes than formerly, and for several nights the neighbouring parts have been much frighted with the great flames that have been seen to issue from it with unusual noises.

The Banditti have been for some time very numerous and insolent, committing several violencies in the Countrey, for whose suppression the Vice-Roy sent out several parties of Soldiers, upon whose approach, those Robbers are again retired to the Mountains, their usual places of refuge.

The Vice-Roy has sent his Orders to *Ortonto* to provide 30000 Kintals of Biscuite to be sent to *Candia*.

The Vice-Roy of *Sicily*, the Duke d' *Albiquerque*, having compassion upon the miserable condition of about 30000 poor people which have by their flight saved themselves from the fire thrown out from Mount *Etna*, which has destroy'd about 17 or 18 Towns and Villages, and by its daily approaches to the City of *Catania*, seems to threaten it with inevitable ruine, inasmuch as the inhabitants are leaving the place, having sent one of his Officers under the Character of his Vicar to *Catania*, to take Order for the maintenance of those distressed people, and the disposing of them to places of safety.

Warsaw May 3. The Assembly of the States drawing on the King, has retired himself from this City, the better to avoid all jealousies of his practices to disturb the freedom of the Election: before his departure, he was pleased to be present at Mass in the Chappel of the Palace, where a Candle falling down set fire to the Veil of the Altar, which has been much talked of amongst the superstitious Commonalty, who look upon it as Ominous, and of ill interpretations, the like accident having happened at the Coronation of the same King at *Cracovia*.

On Wednesday last the 1 instant in the morning, the Duke *Michael Radzevil* General of the Field in *Lithuania*, made his entry into this City in this Order, First marched five Companies of Heyduques, consisting of 100 men in each Company, with their Ensignes flying and Drums beating; all the soldiers clad in large blew cloth Vests lined with yellow; then a Foot Company of 60 in yellow, clad like *Janissaries*; these were followed by two Troops of Dragons well mounted, with blew Coats, with silver Lace; then a Troop of German Horse in excellent equipage followed by as many Hussars, and after them by 60 Gentlemen of Quality, richly habited, with their Lances after the Turkish fashion; then came the General, followed by above 200 of the Lords and principal Genery of *Lithuania*, all of them richly clad, and their Horses extraordinary Harnessed and adorned, and with them divers of the most eminent Nobility, with the Prince *Staviskis* *Lubomirsky* and the Lord *Parozki*, these were attended at some distance by a great number of Gentlemen their attendants, with their other Servants in rich Liveries; after them marched two Troops of Partisan Horse, in Hundred in each Troop, followed by five Troops of Dragons in blew Coats with Silver Lace, and a full Company of Heyduques which brought up the rear. This Entry though it was very magnificent, was much exceeded in the afternoon by the Lords *Parzi*, the Great Chancellor, and

Great General of *Lithuania*, who had thrice their number and attendants; but much more this day by General *Sobieski*, Great Marshal of the Kingdom; all the Princes and Nobility doing him the Honour to meet him some miles from the City, followed by the Guards, and great numbers of Gentlemen with their attendants; who in an excellent Order conducted him into the City.

The Waywood of *Cracovia* is accompanied with a Train of above 5000 persons; the great concourse of people from all parts makes us already sensible of the scarcity and dearth of Provisions, for whose supply all the care imaginable is taken by drawing all kinds of necessaries from all the parts of the Kingdom.

Yesterday the second instant the Primate of this Kingdom the Arch Bishop of *Gnesse* came to the Cathedral Church, where met him all the Nobility and Senators, where they heard a solemn Mass, and from thence went to the place about a quarter of a League from the City; appointed and prepared for the Assembly, and began to fall upon the election of their Marshal or Speaker; but this was for the time diverted by the Prince *Lubomirsky*, who expecting a more full Assembly, caused a proposal to be made of pressing the Oath according to what was resolved the last Session, of making an election according to Conscience, without any reference to any parties or interests, or any Money that has or may be offered for their voices; which occasion'd a long debate amongst them, in which not coming to any resolution, the Assembly was adjourned till the next day.

It was also moved the same day, that the Court Marshal, who was formerly convicted of infamy, might not have any Vote in the Election: but he being a Member of the Senate, and of some reputation amongst them, 'tis believed, this debate may also take up much time to the retarding of the Election.

'Tis generally said, that before the Assembly proceed to the election of a Marshal, the soldiers shall be ordered to be sent away, that nothing may be objected on that side against the freedom of the Election.

Riga, May 3. The first instant arrived here Sir *Peter Wiche*, His Majesty of Great Britains Envoye to the Court of *Muscovy*, having been on his way civilly treated and Complimented by the Magistrates of *Dantzick*; and afterwards entertained at *Coningsbergh* in *Prussia* with much respect and kindness by his Electoral Highness of *Brandenburgh*, and on his way through the Territories of the Duke of *Curlands* attended upon the frontiers by a Gentleman of his Bed-chamber, who conducted him through his Countrey, honourably treating him all the way upon the account of the Duke his Master.

Count Tot the Swedish Ambassador intended for *Poland* to assist at the Election of a successor to that Crown, has been somewhat indisposed here, but is again recovered; he has sent away his Train and Baggage for *Poland*, and may in few days follow in person.

Genova, May 8. The 4th instant departed hence the *Leopold Fregat* with 22 sail of Merchant ships under her Convoy for the coasts of *Spain*.

The Gallies of this Republick which some time since put to sea from hence to secure the coasts from the Corsairs of *Barbary*, are said to have taken two Barks of the Island of *Cosica*, having aboard them about 80 Turks, and were upon the pursuit of several others.

Venice, May 11. A ship lately arrived here from the *Leuans*, informs us of the Continuation of the disturbances

at *Constantinople*, partly because of the false Five solz pieces, whose value being lately decayed, and little other Money found amongst them; has occasioned great complaints and tumults amongst the people, both there and in other parts of the Turkish Empire, but more from the disorder of the Janisaries, who still counsel at the ill management of the publick affairs, and the long absence of the Grand Signior, threatening to choose another to succeed in his room.

By the same ship we are advised, that the Turkish Fleet lye ready to sail at *Negrspore* for the relief of the Wisiers Army, and that the Venetian Fleet lay attending their motions at *Millo*, and other Islands in the *Archipelago*, with intentions (if possible) to engage them on the way.

They farther tell us, that four Privateers of *Malta* were put in at *Argentiera*, having taken two Saichs richly laden from *Alessandria*; and that Captain *Cardi* with some other Christian Privateers, were cruising about those seas, and had seized a Saich laden with Biscuit, intended for *Canea*.

This last week arrived here the Companies of Foot from *Bavaria*, all of them old experienced soldiers, with some other German Companies, to the number of above 2000 men, who were disposed of into convenient Quarters, and were yesterday mustered and paid, and may in few days be embarked upon the Convoy designed and near fitted up for *Candia*.

Hague, May 20. A Copy of the Letter which was lately written to the States by the Dutchess of *East-Friesland*, acquainting them with the Bishop of *Munster*'s threats, has been sent to the Admiralty of *Haringen*, who are to inform themselves more fully of the pretensions and intentions of the said Bishop, and in the mean time, some forces are ordered to march towards the frontiers of *Westphalia* to reinforce the Garrisons there, and to secure those parts from any sudden violence or invasion.

The *Sir Pool* a Secretary from *Sweden* is lately arrived here to assist with the other Ministers sent thither in the negotiation and contentments of that Crown.

Vice Admiral *Van Ghent* is putting to sea with a considerable Squadron under his Command to attend the ships designed for the *East-Indies*, and to conduct and secure some part of their voyage, and to pass afterwards into the *Straits* to attend the motion of the Corsairs of *Barbary*, and to secure the Trade of our Merchant ships in those seas.

We are lately informed of the loss of three ships of the Fleet from *St. Hubert*, which have been cast away about the *Cape St. Vincent*.

From *Hulsting* we are told of the arrival there of several ships from the French Islands in *America* but without their lading; the French West-India Company having it seems ordered that none but French ships shall be permitted to Trade to or from these their Plantations.

Neither our Letters from the Coasts of *Spain* or *Portugal* mentioning a second engagement of Captain *Swaers* with the Corsairs of *Algiers*, we as yet suspend our belief of that report.

Paris, May 22. By the way of *Vienna* are lately arrived Letters from *Monheur de la Haye* His most Christian Majesty's Ambassador at the Court of the Grand Signior at *Barissa*, bearing date the 6th of the last month; informing his said Majesty of what has pass in his negotiation there, desiring His Majesty's farther Orders; his Letters making no mention at all of the Grand Signior's hurt by a fall, gives us occasion to suspect the truth of that report.

From *Venice* our Letters confirm to us the news of the great Assault made by the Turks upon *Candia*, with their extraordinary loss, but without any farther particulars of that action: moreover, telling us that from *Zante* they are advised of the safe arrival at *Candia* of the 2500 *Hunenbutgers*, which 'tis hoped will enable them to defend that place till the arrival of a more considerable succor; but that the chief Visier had been lately recruited with 7000 soldiers which were landed at *Spina longa*, besides 2000 Janisaries which were joyned with his Army some time before; and from *Dalmatia*, that the Turks are drawn

together in a body of an Army, consisting of Twenty five thousand men, and were marching towards the City of *Candia*, to divert the Republick of *Venice* from the defence of *Candia*.

Monseigneur de Louvoy is gone to take a view of His Majesty's late Conquests in the *Netherlands*, he has in a late Letter to *Don Quignouet*, testified much dissatisfaction at the delays used by the Constable of *Castille* in not permitting the free passage of the Coal-boats to *Conde*; adding, that if justice were not speedily done in that point His most Christian Majesty would be forced to obtain it some other way.

This week by His Majesty's Order, several Waggon's were sent hence under a good Convoy for *Arras*, with a considerable summe of Moneys to pay off the Workmen employed in the fortifications of His Majesty's Garrisons in the *Netherlands*.

From *Brussels* we are informed, that the Constable of *Castille* and Count *Marcin* intend to take a view of all their frontiers, and to put them into a posture of defence, and that the Nobility and Gentry press hard for the revocation of the *Placards* for Confiscation of such persons as live from their Estate, which lye within the French jurisdiction, and which are already put in execution upon the Prince de *Ligne*. The Constable of *Castille* has also received fresh Orders from the Queen Regent of *Spain*, to insist upon their suppression, as being published contrary to the agreement made by the Treaty of *Aix*.

The Officers of the Army have Orders to reinforce their Companies, taking in such persons as shall freely offer themselves to His Majesty's service.

His Majesty being informed that the Timber of *Canada* may be useful to him for the building of ships, has ordered 800 workmen to be sent thither to be employ'd in felling Trees and building ships upon the place, intending to have a considerable quantity of the same Timber transported to *Thoulon* for the same sort of employment. The 20th instant about 4 or 500 young Women were sent away from hence, who are to be embarked with some Companies of Foot designed for *Canada*.

From *Nancy* we are informed that the Commissioners of the Prince Elector Palatine and Duke of *Lorraine* having spent much time in conference at *Wiesenberg* for the composition of the differences between them, but not able to adjust them, both Princes are again preparing for their defence, but intend to dispatch thither their Deputies to acquaint His Majesty with their respective pretensions.

Lime, May 12. A ship lately arriving from *Virginia* informs us of the good condition of that Colony, and that the Governour thereof Sir *William Berkeley* intended some time this month to employ 3 or 400 of his ablest men in a voyage to the southwards of that Continent, with intentions to make some discovery of a passage by the south sea.
