This officer has taken part in many attacks on strongly defended targets and has displayed a high degree of skill, courage and resolution. One night in January, 1944, he piloted an aircraft detailed to attack Berlin Early on the outward flight the air-speed indicator became unserviceable. A little later, his navigator became deprived of the use of some of his instruments. These difficulties in no way deterred Wing Commander Forsyth who flew on to the German capital and pressed home his attack. He has always displayed the greatest determination to make every sortie a success

Flight Lieutenant Lance Neville Ahern (Aus.402781).
Royal Australian Air Force, No. 112 Squadron.
This officer has completed a very large number of sorties and has invariably displayed a high degree of skill and courage, qualities which have been well illustrated on many recent occasions.
One day in April, 1944, he flew with much distinction in a successful attack on ground targets. The next morning, Flight Lieutenant Ahern led a formation of aircraft in an attack on shipping during which an enemy motor vessel was tunk. The same afternoon he led the squadron in an engagement against a number of fighters, 3 of which were shot down. By his inspiring leadership and outstanding determination, Flight Lieutenant Ahern contributed materially to the successes obtained. successes obtained.

ying Officer Arthur Gordon PLUMMER (Can/J 14032), Royal Canadian Air Force, No 420 (R C A.F.) Squadron. Flying

One night in March, 1944, this officer piloted an aircraft detailed to attack Stuttgart. When some 200 miles from the target one engine failed and the aircraft lost much height. Although he knew that he would arrive at the target after the main bomber force, Flying Officer Plummer flew on to Stuttgart and pressed home a successful attack. His determination to complete his allotted task in the face of much difficulty set an excellent example example

Pilot Officer John Douglas Mortimer (172572), Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, No. 100 Squadron

One night in April, 1944, this officer piloted an aircraft detailed for a mine-laying mission. On the return flight the aircraft was attacked by a Junkers 88. The first burst of machine gun fire Junkers 88. The first burst of machine gun fire from the enemy's guns caused considerable damage to the tail planes and the ailerons. The tail trimming gear was wrecked, the hydraulic system was rendered useless, whilst one engine was set on fire Considerable height was lost but Pilot Officer Mortimer regained control. Although the enemy continued to attack with much persistence. Pilot Officer Mortimer manœuvred his badly damaged aircraft with great skill and finally evaded the attacker, afterwards flying safely to base. This officer displayed praiseworthy courage and determination and his skill was undoubtedly responsible for the safe return of the aircraft and its crew its crew

This officer and airman displayed much skill and excellent co-operation and proved themselves to be valiant members of air-They have completed many sorties. craft crew
