Rome, Octob. 23. N. S.

**C**ardinal *Le Camus* arrived here this week from France, and several Cardinals from other Parts. There are now 54 in the Conclave, and not above 5 more expected. The Zealots continue their Endeavours for the Election of Cardinal *Marescotti*, and there were 28 Votes for him at the Scrutiny, which was taken the 17th Instant. The Cardinals who are in the Interests of the House of *Austria* seem to favour him; But the *French* Party have set up Cardinal *Acciajoli*, and at a Scrutiny taken this day, they procured him 22 Votes; The Cardinals *Callorido*, *Spinola*, *Norris*, and others, had also several Votes; But there is yet no appearance of their coming to a speedy Choice.

*Genoa*, Octob. 24. The Difference between the Great Duke of *Tuscany* and the Republick of *Genoa* is in a fair way of Accommodation; and the 4 Gallies of this Republick, which have been cruizing upon the Coast of *Tuscany*, are returned to this Port. By a Ship lately arrived from *Tunis* we have an Account, that the Bey of *Tunis* has closely besieged *Cosfentina*, a Town belonging to the *Algerines*; And that the Marquis *de Nesmond* is cruizing on the Coast of *Tunis* with a Squadron of 6 or 7 *French* Men of War.

*Venice*, Octob. 29. The Duke of *Mantua* is lately come to this Place, and will stay here some time. Cardinal *Grimoni* arrived here two days ago from *Vienna*, and after having made a Visit to the Doge his Uncle, continued his Journey to Rome. A great Convoy sailed some days ago for the *Mores*, under the Command of Signior *Giamo. de. Alosto* Proveditore-General of the *Morea*, who is going to take Possession of that Employment, and divers Officers, who have Commands given them in the *Levant*, make use of this opportunity to repair thither. This Convoy consists of 14 Sail of Ships, on board of which are 300 Soldiers, 200 Galley-Slaves, a considerable Sum of Money to pay the *Venetian* Forces in the *Morea*, and a great quantity of Stores and Ammunition. By a Ship lately arrived from *Smyrna* we have an Account, that several *Turkish* Men of War had been at *Alexandretta*, where they put ashore 100 Pieces of Cannon, with a great quantity of Bombs and other Ammunition, which were to be carried from thence towards *Babylon*, to be made use of against the *Arabs* in those Parts, who continue in Rebellion against the *Turks*. Letters from *Dalmatia* give an Account, that the Weather in that Country has been so bad, and such quantity of Snow is fallen, that it has obliged the *Venetian* and *Turkish* Commissioners to put off their Conferences for settling the Limits. Letters from *Rome* say, the different Parties in the Conclave are very industrious in carrying on their several Designs, and that Cardinal *Marescotti*, who is supported by the Zealots, seems hitherto to have the best Interest, but that there would hardly be an Election before the arrival of Cardinal *Naxelles*, Cardinal *Lambert*, and three others who were daily expected.

*Warsaw*, Octob. 28. The King of *Poland* arrived here three days ago from *Livonia*, and every thing is now preparing for the Meeting of the General Diet. The King has received a Letter from the Duke *de Croj*, dated in the *Muscovite* Camp before *Narva* the 8th of *October*, which brings the following Particulars; That on the 4th of the said Month the Czar arrived there with 22 Battalions of Foot, and 32 Field-Pieces; That General *Weide* was expected in few days with the Train of Artillery, and more Troops; And that General *Mazeppa* would likewise shortly join the *Muscovite* Army with a considerable Body of *Cossacks*; That a Defeater from the *Swedish* Garrison was come over to the *Muscovites*, who gives an Account, that the said Garrison is not very strong, but the Burghers joining with them, they had repaired their fortifications, and resolved to hold out till the last Extremity, and that they were sufficiently provided with Artillery and Ammunition, and all manner of Provisions. The Czar had viewed the Place in Person, and had given Orders for a Line of Circumvallation to be cast up, upon which the *Muscovites* were working with great diligence; In the mean time the Besieged ply the *Muscovites* very warmly with their Cannon.

*Mittaw*, Octob. 29. The King of *Poland's* Army is separated, and the Forces are marching into Winter Quarters. The freshest Advices from *Livonia* bring an Account, that the King of *Sweden* having drawn together his Forces in those Parts, was marching to the Relief of *Narva*; and that the *Muscovites* had yet made but little Progress in the Siege of that Place for want of their heavy Artillery, which was not expected before the 24th of this Month.

*Copenhagen*, Novemb. 2. Most of the *Danish* Forces which are to be sent to *Saxony*, are embarked, and the rest are ready to go on board, being to sail with the first fair wind to *Rostock*, under Convoy of 8 *Danish* Frigats. The *Swedish* Men of War which have cruised some days upon this Coast, are returned to *Capef-haven*. The *Sieur Roscrans* will be going from hence in few days with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of *Sweden*. The Queen-Dowager is perfectly recovered of her late Indisposition, and is expected here this week from *Nicopink*.

*Vienna*, Octob. 30. The Queen of the *Romans* was safely delivered of a Prince the 28th Instant, to the great Joy of this Court; And there will be Publick Rejoicings for 3 days upon this occasion. The *Turkish* Ambassador parted hence this morning on his return home. Count *Orring*, the Emperor's Ambassador at *Constantinople*, intended to leave that Place the 11th Instant, and was expected they will meet on the Frontiers about the 25th of the next Month, where they are to be exchanged with the usual Ceremonies. Several Boats are lately come to this Place from *Brise*, laden with Cannon, which are to be carried to *Brise*, and the other Impregnable Towns on the *Rhine*. They write from *Petersburgh*, that the Forces which were employed in working on the Fortifications of *Aras*, are marched into Winter Quarters. The Letters from

*Belgrade* give an Account, that the Seneker or Governor of that Place having seized one of the Justices, who was under Sentence of Death, to be executed publicly contrary to their Privileges, the Garrison in respect upon maintained, and cut off their Scrabbling, and divers others of their Principal Officers.

*Hamburg, November 9.* Monsieur *Friesebourg*, Envoy from the King of Sweden, is lately arrived here from the Court of *Cass*, and has since been in Conference with several Foreign Ministers, whom 'tis said he has assured, that the King his Master has no intentions of giving any disturbance to the Country of *Saxony*. However they write from thence, that a General Diet of that Electorate are to assemble the 28th Instant, to consider of providing for the better Defence of that Country, and 'tis said the King of *Poland* designs to come to *Dresden* after the conclusion of the General Diet, which is to meet the next Month at *Warsaw*. Letters from *Copenhaven* give an Account, that Admiral *Ankerferme* is returned thither with the Men of War and Transport Ships which attended the King of Sweden to *Livonia*, and brings an Account, that they met with a violent Storm on the Coast of *Livonia*, but sustained little or no damage, and that the King of Sweden landed the 7th past at *Bernau*, and not at *Revell* as was said, with a Body of 11000 Men, and that he marched to join the Forces commanded by Count *Welling*, in order to endeavour the Relief of the Town of *Narva*.

*Hague, Nov. 12.* Don *Quirós*, the Spanish Ambassador, had Publick Audience of the States-General the 8th Instant. The Prince of *Hesse-Cassel*, Governor of *Overyssel*, is gone to review that Garrison, and from thence intends to go to *Cassel*, and to continue there 3 or 4 Months. Letters from *Cherbourg* of the 10th Instant say, the Elector-Princes of *Brandenburgh* and *Hanover* were arrived there, and would continue their Journey home in 4 or 5 days.

*Paris, Novemb. 13.* N. S. Orders are given for this Court to go into deep Mourning for the Death of the King of *Spain*. The Count de *Coigny*, Lieutenant-General, is gone from hence to *Bayonne* to live under the Marquis de *Hercourt*, who Commands the *French* Forces in those Parts. The Marquis de *Ferrero*, Ambassador from *Savoy*, had a Private Audience of the King at *Fontainebleau* the 10th Instant, and presented to him the President of *la Tour*, late Envoy Extraordinary from his Royal Highness to the King of *England*, who is returning to *Savoy*. They write from *Antibes*, that the Cardinal de *Noailles* embarked there the 30th past for *Civita-Vecchia*.

*Kensington, Nov. 4.* The King came hither yesterday in the evening from *Hampton-Court*. And this day being His Majesty's Birth-day, there was a great Court of Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Quality, who appeared very splendid. Before Dinner there was a very fine Concert of Musick, Vocal and Instrumental, and in the evening there were Entertainments for the Ladies, and other Persons of Quality, in the Great Gallery.

*London, Nov. 5.* His Majesty's Birth-day was celebrated in the Cities of *London* and *Westminster*, with Fireworks, Illuminations, Ringing of Bells, and other Demonstrations of Joy suitable to the occasion. And this day the Anniversary of the Gunpowder-Plot was observed in the usual manner.

*Whitehall, Novemb. 5.* His Majesty was pleased in Council to deliver His Privy-Seal into the Custody of the Right Honourable *Ford* Earl of *Tankerville*; And his Lordship had the Oath of Keeper of the Privy-Seal accordingly administered unto him, together with the other usual Oaths, and took his Place at the Board.

This Day the Right Honourable Sir *Charles Hedges* Knight, was, by His Majesty's Command, Sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and One of His Principal Secretaries of State, and accordingly took his Place at the Board.

*Westminster, Nov. 6.* His Majesty being graciously pleased to Call by his Writ, Sir *Joseph Jekyll*, of the *Middle-Temple*, Kt. Chief Justice of *Chesster*, King's Serjeant; *John Green*, of *Lincoln-Inn*, Esq; *Charles Whiteacre*, and *Tho. Gibbons*, of the *Inner-Temple*, Esq; *Tho. Barry*, of *Grays-Inn*, Esq; *John Keen*, of *Lincoln-Inn*, Esq; *Philip Nerve*, and *Nicholas Hooper*, of the *Inn of Chancery*, Esqs; *Henry Turner*, of *Lincoln-Inn*, Esq; *Robert Tracy*, of the *Middle-Temple*, Esq; *James Murray*, of the *Inner-Temple*, Esq; *John Hoake*, and *Lancelot Agar*, of *Grays-Inn*, Esqs; *John Pratt*, of the *Inner-Temple*, Esq; *William Hall*, of the *Middle-Temple*, Esq; *James Selby*, of the *Inner-Temple*, Esq; *John Smith*, of *Grays-Inn*, Esq; and *Thomas Carleton*, of the *Inner-Temple*, Esq; to take upon them the Oath and Degree of Serjeants at Law, they accordingly appeared at the *Chancery-Bar* the 5th of the last Month, where they took the usual Oath. And this day having met, and performed in *Grays-Inn* Hall the Ceremony of Counting, and having had their Choirs put on, they walked from thence, being clothed in Party-coloured Robes, and accompanied by a great many Gentlemen of the Long Robe out of the several Societies, to *Westminster-Hall*, where at the Bar of the Court of *Common-Pleas* they again Counted, and gave Rings in the usual manner; And afterwards entertained divers of the Nobility, the Judges, Serjeants, and other Persons of Quality, with a splendid Dinner at *Serjeants-Inn*.
