**T**Hough Publick Notice has been given, that the Galeons will sail from hence to the *West-Indies* in *January* next, 'tis believed their departure will be put off for some time longer. According to our last Advices from the *Havana*, the *Spanish* *Floa* that were expected from thence this year, have been obliged to defer their Voyage home for several Months. Divers Vessels parted lately from this Port with Supplies of Provisions and Ammunition for the Garrison of *Ceuta*, from whence there are Letters of the 8th Instant, giving an account, that the King of *Morocco's* Forces having lately been defeated by the *Algerines*, he had sent for a strong Reinforcement from the Camp before *Ceuta*. The *Moors* notwithstanding these Difficulties, and their ill Success hitherto in the Siege of this Place, do still continue it with great obstinacy. The *Spanish* Garrison, in the several Sallies they have made against the Enemy, and by the means of their Mines, have gained so much Ground from them, that they are raising new Fortifications beyond the Outworks of that Place. The 2d Instant the *Spaniards* sprung two great Mines, whereby some rising ground which covered the Enemy from the fire of the Town was levelled, and the same night a strong Detachment of the *Moors* fell upon those who are employed in building the new Works before-mentioned; but several Companies of *Granadiers*, who were posted there to defend them, received the Enemy so warmly, that they were soon obliged to retire, and at the same time a Mine that was prepared in expectation of such an Assault, was fired, and destroyed a great number of them. The *Moors* have not since made any attack, but content themselves with throwing now and then a Bomb into the Place, which does little or no execution.

*Rome*, October 24. There are but five Cardinals more expected to enter into the present Conclave, and among these are the Cardinals *de Noailles* and *Lamberg*, the first from *France*, and the other from *Vienna*; and it's believed they have both particular Instructions in relation to the Election of a Pope. The Party of the Zealots is the most numerous, and consists chiefly of the Creatures of *Innocent* the Eleventh, and *Alexander* the Eighth, and are subdivided into four Parties under the Direction of the Cardinals, *Imperiale*, *Francisco Barbarini*, *Cenci*, and *Negrini*. The last is very active, in soliciting all the Cardinals not to suffer themselves, in giving their Votes for the choosing of a Pope, to be swayed by the Applications of any Foreign Power, but to have regard only to the

Interest of the Church; He proposes to them Cardinal *Marescotti*, as one every way qualified for so great a Charge, and has procured him a very considerable Interest; The *French* have set up against him Cardinal *Acciajoli*, but 'tis thought they do this only to delay the Election till Cardinal *Noaille's* arrival. The Cardinals who have the Administration of the Government, began the 13th Instant to give Audience to the Ministers of State, the Magistrates of this City, and other publick Officers; They did the like the 16th, and will continue to do so every *Wednesday* and *Saturday* as long as the Conclave lasts. Several Companies of Soldiers are sailing to reinforce the Garrison of this Place, and a Party of them is always to assist the *Sbirri's* in the execution of their Offices, for the better preventing of Disorders which have daily happen'd here since the Pope's Death.

*Vienna*, November 4. The Count *de Paar* is gone from hence with the Character of Envoy from the Emperor, to notify to the Court of *Spain* the Birth of the young Prince, Son to the King of the *Romans*, and Envoys are likewise sent upon the same Errand to other Courts. The new Levies for recruiting the Emperor's Forces are not yet begun, but the Officers of Horse have received Money to buy Horses for their Troops. The *Turkish* Ambassador is going on towards *Constantinople* by short Journeys, that he may arrive upon the Frontier about the same time with Count *Otting*, who parted from the Grand Signior's Court the 11th past on his return hither. The said Ambassador appears very well satisfied with the Reception he has had here, and the Presents he has received from the Emperor, consisting of the Emperor's Picture in Miniature, and a very rich Gold Chain, two very fine Clocks, several Pieces of Plate, and other Things of Value; besides several Presents to his Steward, his Secretary, and his other principal Servants. Count *Guido of Staremberg* is to receive him at *Esseck*, and will be present with divers other Persons of Quality at the Exchange of the two Ambassadors, which will be performed with the same Ceremonies as when they went. Letters from *Peterwaradin* give an Account, that a Fire happened lately in the Magazine of that Place, but 'twas happily extinguished before it had done any considerable Mischief.

*Cologne*, Novemb. 13. The Diet of the Circle of *Westphalia*, which was assembled here, is separated, after having come to several Resolutions in relation to the Forces they are obliged to maintain when there is occasion, for the common Defence of the Empire, and they are resolved to meet every year, in the Month of *May*, to settle all Matters that concern the whole Circle. The Elector Palatine continues at *Bensberg*, where he divers himself with Hunting, and there is yet no discourse of his returning to *Dusseldorp*.

Paris, Nov. 17. N.S. Yesterday the Duke of Anjou was declared here King of Spain. About 10 in the morning, the Most Christian King, with all the Princes of France, being in his great Cloister at Versailles, the Spanish Ambassador with his Retinue went thither and saluted the Duke of Anjou as his Sovereign, kissing his Hand upon the Knee; and then the Most Christian King complimented him, and afterwards at Chapel, (where Te Deum was sung) and at Dinner gave him the right hand. He is lodged in the great Apartment at Versailles, and will begin his Journey to Spain on the first of December next. The Dukes of Burgundy and Berry are to accompany him to the Frontiers; And the Marquis de Harcourt, who is now at Bayonne, is ordered to go directly from thence to Madrid to compliment the Queen and the other Regents, and to continue there with the Character of Ambassador from this Crown. The Count de Menastrol is arrived here in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria. The Count de Zinzendorf, Envoy from the Emperor, had Audience yesterday of the Most Christian King, to notify the Birth of the young Prince, Son to the King of the Romans. The King has given to the Count de Toulouse the Government of the City and Castle of Nantes; The Marquis d'Antin is made the King's Lieutenant in the Province of Bretagne. The Marquis d'Amblimont, who was Governor-General of the French Islands in America, being lately dead, the King has conferred that Government upon Monsieur Desnos, a Sea-Commander, and has bestowed the Order of St. Lewis, and the Pension of 3000 Livres, vacant by the said Marquis's Death, upon the Marquis de Nesmond, Lieutenant-General of the French Navy. The Marquis de Montbrun, Lieutenant-General of the French Forces, having a Pension of 6000 Livres a year, has obtained of the King that it be settled upon his eldest Son. Divers Persons are order'd to be seized here upon suspicion of Piracy. Letters from Rome give an account, that the Prince of Vaheni, a Roman, who some time ago put himself under the Protection of France, being insulted by the Sbirri's and others, who came to his House in a forcible manner, the French Ambassador repaired thither, and declared to them, That the said Prince was under the King his Master's Protection, in whose Name he required them immediately to disperse themselves, but they refused to do it, and fell upon the Ambassador's Servants, of whom they killed 2 or 3, whereat his Excellency being highly offended, sent an Account thereof to the French Court, and resolved to express his Resentment by retiring from Rome the next day.

Dublin, Novemb. 5. His Majesty's Birth-Day was observed here yesterday with the usual Solemnity; Several Discharges were made of the Cannon from the Castle, and of the small Arms of a Regiment of Foot now here; and at night there was a Firework in Stephen's-Green; where divers of the Nobility and Gentry, the Ladies, and other Persons of Quality, were present, who from thence came to the Castle, where they were splendidly entertained at Supper, and afterwards there was a Ball. In the Town were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy. This day being the Anniversary of the Discovery of the Gunpowder Plot, was kept in the usual manner.
