Tarmouth, May 17.

Yesterday by contrary winds put into this Haven one of His Royal Highnesses Pleasure-Boats; Captain Read Commander; having on board the Countess of Carlisle bound for Stockholm. This Afternoon sailed hence two Vessels of this Town with piece Goods for Rotterdam.

Rome, May, 4. On Sunday last was celebrated with extraordinary Ceremony and Solemnity, the Canonization of the two new Saints, viz. Peter de A'vantara, and Mary Magdalen de Parzi, in order whereunto, the Pope met in the Chappel of Sixtus the 4th, with all the Princes, Cardinals, Arch-bishops, Prelats, the servants of his household, and all the Clergy, Secular and Regular, who in their habits of Ceremony, and Tapers in their hands, went in a solemn Order and procession from thence to St. Peters Church, which was extraordinarily beautified and adorned for that Ceremony, in which procession were carried two Glorious Standards, on which were lively drawn the Pictures of these two Saints. The Ceremonies being ended, and their Canonization solemnly pronounced, the Quire began the *Tu Deum*, which was answered without by the sounding of Trumpets and beat of Drums; and the discharge of several Chambers and all the Guns about the Town and Castle of St. Angelo, with the Ringing of Bells and all other Expressions of Joy, the usual attendants of these Extraordinary Ceremonies.

Several Complaints have been made to His Holiness of the great increase of Janitisme in several of the Provinces of France; to the prejudice of this Church, which the Pope is taking into his consideration.

Genova, May 7 This Republick having information that Father Nishard the Inquisitor-General of Spain was gone from Provence, and was with two Chaloups put to sea intending for this place, immediately ordered a Gally to be sent out to attend his arrival at Monaco, ordering the Captain to defray all his expences by the way: upon his arrival here he has been complimented in the name of the Senate; but appears *incognito*, and refusing the Pallace designed for his entertainments, has taken up his Longing amongst the Jesuits.

'Tis said that the Duke de St. Germain Viceroy of Sardinia, is lately dead, and that several of the Nobility there are got into Arms, but with what intentions is not yet discovered.

Venice, May 10 Our late advices from Zante assure us, that the Turks having made three furious assaults upon the Town of Candia, were in all of them beaten off by the great valour and courage of the Defendants, in which the loss of the Turks could not be computed less, then of 6000 men; that the Visier after so many losses and discouragements has not given over his hopes that he shall yet at the last make himself Master of the place, he has therefore ordered all the labourers about his Camp to be again employed in raising a new Mount and Battery in the place of that which was lately blown up by the besieged, and is so confidently persuaded of the strength of his Line, that he ordered the Chevalier Aloiso Molino the Venetian Minister, to be sent for from Canea, to whom he assigned the best Quarter in the Camp, entertaining him with much civility; shewing him all his Works, and afterwards sent him back again into Canea; in the mean time he is much concerned at the long delays of the Grand Segnior in giving him the assistance he has so long and often pressed for, and has sent fresh Letters to him to let him know, that unless he speedily supply him with such considerable numbers of men and other

necessaries as he has formerly demanded, he shall not be able to make good his promise of winning the Town within the time prefixed by him.

The same Letters farther inform us, that the Visier has for the supply of his Army left the Town of Canea very thinly manned and ill furnisht with necessaries; the whole Garrison not exceeding Five hundred men, which information the Senate has thought fit to communicate by a Courier Extraordinary to His most Christian Majesty, with other Letters to their Ambassador at Paris to press that Court to hasten away the succours intended for their assistance.

We are lately assured that his Electoral Highness of Brandenburg has shown his readiness to joyn his assistance with other Princes against the Common Enemy; and has designed 2000 men for that service which are already upon their march.

The Senate being informed that several frauds or neglects have been observed in the provisions which they have ordered to be made for their Convoys designed for Candia, and particularly, that several pieces of Cannon sent by the last Convoy were found to be cracked and useles; and the other provisions not so great as was ordered: have chosen three persons of known integrity, and impowred them to take a view of all such provisions as shall for the future be sent for Candia.

Vienna, May 11. The 7th instant, the Capigy Bassa; an Envoye from the Grand Segnior took his leave of the Count de Montecuculi President of the Council of War, and yesterday departed hence by water on his return home, having been treated here to his satisfaction, and dismissed with the usual presents of Plate and Scarlet for himself and others of his Train. Here is lately arrived a Chiaus from Hungary with several fresh complaints against the Hussars.

By Letters from Monsieur Casa nova His Imperial Majesties Resident in Turkey, we are informed, that the Grand Segnior has ordered an Army of about 100 thousand men to be drawn to their Rendezvous upon the Danube, the greatest part of the said force, being thought to be intended to march into Dalmatia.

From Hungary we are informed that the Town of Offen has been lately ruined and almost wholly destroyed by fire, with all their Magazines of Stores and Ammunition. We have great hopes that the Emperours Commissioners at Epheries may so well acquit themselves of their Negotiation there, as to put an end to all differences and disputes with the people of Upper Hungary; and to satisfy them in all their pretensions. The Emperour has ordered the Castle of Neutra to be well fortified, and Garrison'd for the security of those parts.

The Trade of the Levant-Company is much augmented, every Moneth four or 5 ships sailing upon their account; laden with Merchandises for Turkey, the said Company expect daily the arrival of several Boats richly laden at Belgrade, with 10000 Oxen which they have bought in Turkey.

The Emperour in a farther compliance with the Popes desire for the assistance of the Venetians; has granted liberty for the raising of three Regiments more in his hereditary Countreys for that service.

Bruges, May 14 The Constable of Castille on Monday last caused an Order to be issued out, forbidding any Officers or soldiers to appear at the Court to demand Audience from him; and accordingly the Adjutants of the Court are commanded to attend at the Antichamber of his Pallace, to commit all such private soldiers to prison as they shall find making
