axing their addreffes contrary to this Order, and to fet a guard upon the offending Officers in their own Lodgings; exprelly prohibiting all Sollicitors or other Agents of the Court to prefent any petition from them : but upon all grievances or other occasions which shall require it, the Infantry are to make their Add effest to the Count de Marsun, and the Cavalry to the Prince de Ligne.

On Sunday lait we had news that about 15 thouland French were lately entred into *Picardy*, intending to match forwards there are new Conquests. Their tortifications attractory where very confiderably advanced, and particularly the *Cittadelle at Tournay* will in lefs than three Moneths be in a good posture of defence. The Marquiss de Louroy arrived at Tournay the 21th instant, and from thence intends for Lille, from whence he patters to take a View of all the late Conquests. At Douay were cash this last week 25 pieces of Cannon.

The Duke d' Acrichot has by his Letters lately informed the Constable of Caffille, that the French Garrifons of Aethand Tournay have forbidden the Countrey V-llages about Conde to pay any Taxes or Gabels to His Catholick Majesty.

'I's laid the Conftable of *Castille* has also defied, and obtained leave from the Quen Regent of *Spain* to retire himfelf from the Government of the e Countries; but as yet 'tis not known who may faceed him in this Charge.

On Friday laft the Commons met in the ufual place for their Allembly, to confider of the Imposs required y but came not to any resolution. On Sunday the S at s of Brabant allembled in the Town-House, to confult of the best method and means of fatisfying the Commons, and obtaining from them fuch things as have been required of them. The next day the Commons being again alsembled, a Demand was ma'e of 50 thou and Florins payable to the Comflable of Cafiile, to which they returned for answer, that they well understood not the title the Confieble had to it 3 but that the Demand ought to have been made in the Name of His Catholick MageRy.

Monsier de Bergeick being returned to Lille, the Sieur Houines another of our Commissioners emploied there to consult about the limits, returned hither by the Constables, permission for the settlement and ordering of his private affairs and concernment.

The 1st Courier from Spain arriving without difturbance by the way of France, informs us, that the defign of r ifing a new Regiment of Guards for the defined of the Kings Perfon, has been much opposed by (everal of the Grands, and their eftablishment (for that reason) as yet fuspended. That the Queen has lately nominated Don Paul Paradas, Don Louis Ferrer, and Don Francesco de Gusman to be members of the Council of War, to which the intends to adde leveral others; and that Don Fuan haying for fome days visited, the Abbey of St. Bartholomew de Lupiana, is returned again to Guadalaxara, from whence he has complemented their Majesties upon the late Festival.

'I is allo faid, that the Council appointed for the redrefs of the peoples Grievances, have made feveral Addreffes to the Queen upon that fubject, and that on the 3d inflant was to be publifit an Edict for reformation of the Fies of Officers, and 'twas believed another would speedily follow for the taking off part of the Subfidies and Tributes imposed on the people.

Haghes, May 24. The apprehensions we have of the intensions of the Bishop of Munster, whole Garrisons are more then usually filled with foldiers, gives the States an occasion to have an Eye to his motion, and a good Guard upon the frontiers. 'I is also faid that the Ma quis of Bran. denbarg has been moved to revive his pretensions to Wefel and some other places long possified by us. It is therefore thought convenient to make some addition to the forces already on foot, by admitting 25 men to every Company.

The Heer Heinfius, formerly defigned to be fent into Muscowy to mediate, together with the Envoye from His Majefty of Great Brittain, and interpole their good Offices for the composite of all differences between Sweden and Muscowy, is countermanded, and some other will be indeesly named for the employment.

Park, May 25. Letters f om Thoulon inform us of the arrival there of the Duke de Navailles, who was ready with the Duke de Beaufort to emback themfelvis upon the Fiect upon His Majefties first Orders, all their forces being in readinefs, as are also the flips, to the number of 21, defigned for that k xBedition. The Gallies are already arrived there from Marfeilles, among whom are three Galliots, to fupply the room of formany Gallies, which were left behind for went of flares to marge the Oars. About the end of this moneth they may begin their Voyage.

The 17.h infant their Majeflies with the Duke d'Enguyen and other perfons of the Court, went in a Galley followed by a great number of Boats towards the Camp or Fort of St. Schaftien about two leagues diftant from St. Germains, from whence they were faluted with feveral Vollies of Cannon and Musquets. The zoth infant their Majeflies came again to view the Camp, where the King ordered all the forces o be drawn up in Battaille and exerciled.

The 19th the Baron de Cruitshautem appeared before<sup>2</sup> His Majetty to just fie himself from the imputation of which he flood charged or fulpected by his Enemies of giving advices to the Spanish AmbaFadour prejudicial to the interest of this Crown 3 of which His Majetty was foon inclined to acquit him. He is fince returned with futisfaction to Fland ders in company with the Sieur Talox the Intendent of OAdenard.

Monfieur de la Have our Ambaffadeur in the Ottoman Court, has by his Letters of the 25th paft informed the Court, that the Grand Segnior had given him his laft Audience, with free liberty to return home; for which he is furn fht with all neceffary Pafs-Ports, and has been heard with m ch favour in all his Demands: thet he was then in readinefs to return from Lariffa to Conflantineple, where he intended to embark himfelf and his Family on board the French Meu of War which there attend for his Transportation, under the Command of the Siet r de Almerats.

Some few Horfe employ'd for that purpole to wait bes tween Franche Comte and the Swifs Gantons of Borne feiled on a French man, called Monfieur le Roux, fulpected to have been active in carrying on the Spanish interest amongft the Cartons, whom yesterday they brought to this Ci-y, and fecured him in the Bastille, which is ill referted by the Cantons; in the mean time the Count de Grammons is there prefling them to compleat the Leavies, to which he pleads they are obliged by the Treaty of 1666. and for which he has advanced a confiderable fumme of Moneys, with a promife of more affoon as they have made any advance into that work.

A Courier lately arriving here from Warfaw (from whence he departed the sth inftant) informs us that the Diet in ord r to the Election began the z inftant, but that the Minifters of the Duke of Neuburg had rendred the Bifhop of *Fefiers* uncapable of giving the Duke their Mafter the affiftance he intended in preferring his interest and pretentiors in the Election; that the Prince of Lorrains party daily increased as did his hopes to prevail in the faid Election, and that his Envoy had demanded the precedency of the Envoyes from Brandenburgh and Neuburg, which was not then determined.

His Majefty hasordered 10 men to be added to every company of Foot in all his Regiments. The Governour of this City has lately ordered the railing of men to be fent to the Camp neer St. Germains, offering a piftol to each man for advance, to new cloath them, to fecure them 10 folz a day for their pay, and affuring them they thall have leave to quit the fervice at the end of this Campagne.

The Members of Parliament went yetterday in a body to st. Germains, to prelent their Remonstrances (or Supplications, as the King is pleased to have them called ) against the Edict passed in pt judice of their priviledges.

London, May 19. This morning His Royal Highnels was prefent at Hide park & where were drawn out feven Companies of His M jefties Regiment of Guards, with two Troops of the Horfe-Guards, whom His faid Royal Highnels was, pleafed there to exercise.
