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Milan, Dec. 15. N.S.

**T**HE Count de Castellbarco, Envoy from the Emperor, arrived here the 11th Instant; He had Audience the next day of the Prince of Vandemont, and delivered his Credential Letter from the Emperor, together with a Memorial, in which was set forth, That by the Death of Charles the 2d, King of Spain, the Duchy of Milan with all its Dependencies, and the Marquisate of Final which is thereunto annexed, are devolved as a Fief to the Emperor and that the Emperor therefore requires his Highness not to acknowledge any other Sovereign, till he should receive his farther Orders; to which were added, Proffessions of the Emperor's Kindness and Esteem for the Interests and Person of the Prince of Vandemont, that he should be continued in the Government of the Milanese, and should receive from his Imperial Majesty all Protection and Assistance; And that the State of Milan should not only have all their ancient Rights and Privileges confirmed, but might expect an Augmentation of them from the Emperor's Grace and Favour. Another Memorial to this purpose was delivered by the Envoy to the Senate of Milan. The Prince of Vandemont returned an Answer, wherein he professes a great Regard and Respect for his Imperial Majesty, with Thanks for all the Honour and Favours he has bestowed on him and his Family; And adds, That he thinks the best way he can take to deserve the continuance thereof, is to comply with the Obligation that lies upon him, to serve the present King his Master with the same Fidelity and Zeal, which he has always shewed for the Service of the late King of Spain, who left him Orders to acknowledge the Duke of Anjou for his lawful Successor, and that he will faithfully, and with the Expence of his Blood and Fortune, keep and defend all he has entrusted to his Care. The Chancellor of Milan, by the Prince's Order, answered the Envoy's Memorial to the same effect; and the Envoy is since returned to Venice.

Venice, Decemb. 24. The Senate have chosen Signior Zorzi, Procurator of St. Mark, to be General of their Forces of Terra Firma, which they design to augment; And to this end have given Orders for raising several new Regiments, and buying 3000 Horses; And they have now under Consideration by what ways to raise Money to support this Expence. They have resolv'd to send three Inquisitors to the Morea, to examine the Conduct of the Governors of the Towns, and other Persons in Places of Trust; And this Employment is given to Signior Vicerzo Grimani, Signior Angelo Morosini, and Signior Giacomo Minio, who design to take their Passage with the Convey that will fall thither in few days. The Senate have admitted into the Body of their Nobility, Signior Oratio Albani, Brother to the Pope, and his Children, and the Instrument to that effect is sent to the Venetian Ambassador at Rome, to be presented to the Pope, as a Mark of the particular Regard of this Republick. The Count de Castellbarco, Envoy from the Emperor, is returned hither from Milan; And Monsieur Hautefrede, Envoy from France to the Duke of Mantua, is gone from hence to reside to the Dukes of Modena and Parma the Duke of Anjou's Accession to the Crown of Spain. A Ship is lately arriv'd from Dalmatia, the Master of which reports, that two Venetian Merchant Ships sailing some days ago from Durazzo, where they had laded Goods to the value of 200000 Ducats for this Place, meeting with a violent Storm, one of them was driven ashore, and stranded, but all the Men saved; the other kept out at Sea, and fell in with a Tripoline Man of War, with whom she fought several hours, and the Turks twice boarded her, and were beaten off every time; But the Venetian Ship received so many Shot, that she foundered soon after, and only six of her Crew got ashore in their Boat. Letters from Rome say, the Ceremony of the Pope's Coronation was performed the 24th Instant, and that the French Ambassador returned thither the 20th from San Quirico, and had an Audience of the Pope.

Milan, Dec. 20. We have received from Livonia the News, that the Total Duke of the Muscovite Army by the Swedes, who made themselves Masters of their Camp before Narva, and took 56 Colours and Standards, all their Artillery, the Papers of the Czar's Chancery, their

Baggage, and a considerable Sum of Money. It's said, the Czar had left the Army two days before.

Warsaw, Dec. 18. The Cardinal Primate has taken his Leave of the King of Poland, and intends in a day or two to go back to Lowicz. Count Jablonowsky, the Crown General, is returned to Lemberg. 'Tis believ'd, the General Diet, which was to meet in the beginning of February next, will be deferred a month longer by reason of the Troubles in Lithuania. The Commissary-General of that Duchy, Son to Prince Sapieha, is come hither to lay before the King several Complain'ts against the Confederate Nobility, who on the other side have sent hither the Stralock of Savok, Brother-in-Law to Oginsky, with several other Deputies, to justify their Conduct, and to desire the King to remove those of Prince Sapieha's Party from all Places of Trust, particularly the said Prince from that of Great General of Lithuania, and his two Brothers from the Offices of Great Marshal and Great Treasurer of that Province. Prince Radziwil is lately gone from hence to Lithuania, and the King before his departure did earnestly recommend to him, to use his Interest with the Nobility of Oginsky's Faction, to engage them by fair means to desist from any farther Hostilities, and to disperse themselves; But our last Advices from thence give an Account, that far from shewing any Inclination to accommodate Matters, they lately held a General Meeting, and by a Solemn Act declared, That Prince Sapieha and all his Followers were become Enemies to their Country, and as such, had forfeited their Lives and Estates; After which, they resolv'd to make a Detachment of 7000 Men to be commanded by the old Prince Wysznowsky, who are to take Quarters on the frontiers of Lithuania, to oppose any Forces that may come from abroad to the Assistance of Sapieha's Party; And that the rest of the Gentlemen and their Followers should return home, and keep themselves in a readiness to meet again when ever there is occasion.

Stockholme, Dec. 18. By divers Letters come from Revel, Wyborg, and Schansternyen, we have received the News of a signal Victory obtained by the King of Sweden over the Muscovites the 30th of November last, of which they tell these particulars; His Majesty decamp'd from Weyfenberg the 23d, and on the 27th a Detachment from his Army forced an Important Pass called Pyajoki, guarded by 12000 Muscovites; the 29th his Forces beat the Muscovites from another strong Post about two Leagues from Narva. On the 30th, about 10 in the morning, the King attacked the Enemy, who were very strongly Intrench'd, and after a very obstinate Fight of several hours, his Majesty broke into their Camp, and put them to an entire Rout; The Muscovites thereupon endeavour'd to pass the River, but the Bridge broke under them, and many were drown'd, and those that remained on this side, were most of them trod down by the Horse and killed, and the rest made Prisoners. The Swedes took all the Enemy's Artillery, their Ammunition and Baggage, and other rich Booty. The King of Sweden in the Battel had his Horse kill'd under him, and received a little hurt in his Leg. And at another time was quite surrounded by the Enemy, but was rescued by the Dragoons of Rhuskiind. After the Action was over, the King entred into Narva, and having made but a short stay there, marched in pursuit of the Enemy. Colonel Apellhof, who was at Schansternyen with a Body of Swedish Forces, upon Advice of the Success of the King's Army, marched to Coporic, which Place the Muscovites abandoned, and found there a considerable quantity of Provisions; And being informed that a good number of the Enemy were fled
