In an effort to maintain height Flight Sergeant Nielsen gave orders to jettison all movable heavy equipment. Course was changed to enable him to fly home by the shortest route and he finally reached an airfield in this country. This airman has completed many sorties and has displayed commendable skill and determination throughout. throughout.

Sergeant Owen promptly gave his pilot the necessary combat manoeuvre and then he and his co-gunner opened fire. Following their accurate bursts the enemy aircraft broke away and was seen to be on fire. This airman displayed great coolness and his good shooting contributed materially to the safe return of the aircraft. of the aircraft.
