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Rome, Jan. 1. N. S.

THE Pope has held several Congregations, to consider of the Affair concerning the Spanish Succession, and his writ to the Emperor, and to the Most Christian King and the Crown of Spain, to enter them to a Friendly Agreement, and to offer his Mediation for this purpose, in order to preserve the Tranquillity of Christendom, and that Italy in particular; and on the same occasion has writ Letters to the several Princes and States of Italy. Cardinal Medicus is on a sudden gone for Florence, to avoid, as it's thought, being present at the Entertainments which the Cardinals in the Courts of France and Spain intend to make here, which might give Jealousie to the Emperor. The Cardinal de Noailles is returned to France; And the Cardinal d'Estrees is on his departure, having received Orders from the Court of France to go to Venice, and afterwards to the Great Duke of Tuscany, to negotiate Matters in relation to the present Conjunction.

Venice, Jan. 8. The Pope's Nuncio had Audience of the Senate the 8th Instant, and delivered a Letter from his Majesty, exhorting them to take such Measures as may be thought fit to preserve the Peace of Italy. The French Ambassador has received Advice, of the Count de Tefse's arrival at Milan, who under the Prince de Vaudemont is to command the Auxiliary Troops which the French are now sending into the Service of that State; and, if it's necessary, to add a much greater Force will follow under the Command of the Marshal de Catina. The 6th Instant the Spanish Ambassador here received an Express from the Prince of Vaudemont, Governor of Milan, which he sent back the same day. This State continues to make Provision for their Security, and seem resolv'd to oppose any Troops that may attempt to pass through the Venetian Territories in their march to Milan. The Senate have chosen Signior Alessandri Molino to be Provveditore-General of Terraferma, and Count Sacco to command under him, and the latter has already visited all their Frontier Towns. The Garrison of Verona is order'd to be reinforced, and great quantities of Provisions and Ammunition are sent to that Place; And Signior Molino intends shortly to go thither.

Hamburg, Dec. 23. The King of Sweden's Forces having from their late Victory refresh'd themselves in their Quarter hereabouts, tis said his Majesty intends to march from hence to morrow, but his farther Designs are as yet kept secret. Major-General Meydel is command'd to march with a strong Detachment into the Enemy's Country, as well to get Intelligence, as to gather what Forage he can; and another Body of Swedish Forces are drawing together at Schisternien, under the Command of Major-General Grunow; Four thousand Horse and Foot pass'd through Wyborg the 21st Instant to join them, and other Troops are marching thither from Abo and Nyeland. The Country People hereabouts do daily fish out of the River the Bodies of Muscovites, and it appears, that the number of those drowned upon their late Defeat is much greater than was at first reported. The King of Sweden has order'd the Duke of Crey's Sword to be returned to him, and he will be admitted to his Majesty's Presence. The other General Officers that are Prisoners here, will be sent to Revel. A Russian Lieutenant arriv'd here 3 days ago with a Letter from Fedor Gadowin General of the Muscovite Forces to the General Dolgaruka, who is a Prisoner here, enquiring after the state of his Health, but his chief Errand appears to be, to get Intelligence which way the King intends to march with his Army. He came without a Drummer or Trumpeter, and brought no Letters with him to any of the Swedish Generals, and therefore is seized here as a Spy; the Muscovites having demand'd an Ensign, which the Governor of this Place sent to Norway a little before they broke with us, and put him to the Torture to extort from him a particular Account of the condition of this Place. We have Advice, that the Muscovites draw together on the other side of Norway, and that very few of their Forces appear on this side; and that the Roads are covered with the Bodies of Muscovite Soldiers, who in their flight from hence died of the Wounds they received in the Battle, or perished for want of Subsistence.

Stockholm, Jan. 5. The Senate have received from the King of Sweden, a particular Relation of his late Great

Victory over the Muscovites, for which a General Thanksgiving is appointed to be observed in this Kingdom. The Letters from Narva give an Account, that the King broke up from thence the 24th of the last Month, and march'd towards Muscovy; and that besides the 145 Great Guns taken in the Muscovite Camp, 40 Pieces of heavy Cannon more have been since taken, which the Muscovites were bringing down to their Camp before Narva, but upon the News of their Defeat threw them into a Bog, where they were found afterwards by the Swedes. Contributions have been already rais'd by the Swedes out of a great District of the Enemy's Country in three several Places.

Warsaw, January 6. Prince Sapieha and his Brother are arriv'd here from Coningsberg; and the Senate are shortly to meet to consider of the most effectual Means to put an end to the Troubles of Lithuania, which are grown to a very great height, and give this Court a great deal of Uneasiness. An Envoy is arriv'd here from Muscovy, to acquaint the King of Poland, that the Czar intends to bring a very powerful Army against the Swedes the next Summer, and to desire the King's Assistance, and that he will not be discouraged by the late ill Success at Narva.

Vienna, January 12. The States of the Lower Austria met here the 10th Instant, and the Court-Chancellor Bucelini made a Speech, representing to them how the Peace was not long ago happily restor'd in the East and West; but that a very unexpected and important Accident has now happen'd, which may be to the very great Prejudice of the lawful Rights of the Emperor, and endanger the publick Tranquillity, if it be not in time provided against; And as their Readiness to comply with the Emperor's Desires was always an Example to the other Hereditary Countries, so more particularly a quick Dispatch of the Business before them may be expected at this time, when the loss of every moment is of so dangerous a Consequence. The Chancellor then deliver'd to them the Emperor's Demands in Writing, and his Imperial Majesty made a short Speech to them to the same effect, to which the Marshal of the Diet answer'd, That the States would on all occasions give the most zealous Proofs of their Duty to the Emperor, and their Readiness to comply with his Desires, and would be as speedy as possible in their Resolutions. The Nuncio has deliver'd to the Emperor a Letter from the Pope, offering his Mediation for adjusting Matters between him and the Crowns of France and Spain. The Imperial Forces continue their March towards Tirol, and the Train of Artillery will follow very soon. The Recruits for the Imperial Forces are almost compleat, and the Officers have received Money to make farther Levies for adding two Troops to each Regiment of Horse, and four Companies to each Regiment of Foot.

Hamburg, January 18. The Sieur Oran came hither the 16th Instant from Copenhagen, and brought with him 250000 Dollars, which

Treaty of Travendahl, to pay to the Duke of Holstein for Damages he sustained during the late Troubles in Holstein; and this Money has accordingly been delivered into the hands of His Highness's Minister here. The last Letters from Coningsberg say, the 18th of this Month continued to be the day fixed for the Elector of Brandenburg's Coronation as King of Prussia, and the same day a Publick Thanksgiving and Rejoicing was to be observed throughout the Elector's Territories.

Cologne, Jan. 21. 'Tis said, that the Elector Palatine has resolved to put 7 or 8000 Men of his Forces into the Emperor's Service. Several Officers of the Elector of Bavaria's Troops are come into these Parts, with Orders to raise Men for recruiting the said Troops.

Hague, Jan. 25. N. S. The Council of State have named Commissioners to go and view the Fortifications and Magazines of their Frontier Places; and it's resolved, That a Line shall be drawn from Bergenopzoom to Grave, &c. to cover the Country, the Care of which Work will be committed to General Coehoorne. The Duke of Wirtemberg, the Earl of Athlone, and some other General Officers, were desired this day to be present in the Council of State, where they had under Consideration the making the necessary Provision for the Security of these Provinces. Count Briord, the French Ambassador, is now pretty well recovered; and 'tis said, Count d'Adaux, who was appointed to succeed him, is countermanded. Publick Thanks were returned last Sunday in the Lutheran Church here at the desire of the Swedish Ambassador, for the Victory lately gained by the King his Master over the Czar's Forces; The Muscovite Ambassador has since complained of some Expressions which the Preacher used in his Sermon, who by order of the States has been Reprimanded for the same.

Plymouth, January 14. The Providence of Ramsgate, John Long Master, bound from the Canaries to London, sailed from hence yesterday; as did likewise the Happy Return of London, John Sampson Master, bound home from Campeachy. This day came in the William and Robert of London, John Swan Master, bound to Antegaa; and the Faithful Galley of this Place, George Teo Master, from Cadix.

Hampson-Court, Jan. 14. Monsieur Leyoncrona, Resident from Sweden, had Audience this day of His Majesty, to notify the late signal Victory obtained by the King his Master over the Czar of Muscovy's Army before Narva.

A Full and Particular Relation of the late Signal Victory obtained by the King of Sweden, over the Czar of Muscovy's Army before Narva: As it was sent by His Majesty to the Senate of Sweden.

THE Thirteenth of November, O. S. the King of Sweden, marched from *Wesenberg*, 15 Leagues distant from *Narva*, with his Army, consisting of about 8000 Men, His Majesty to gain time resolving not to stay for the rest of the Troops who were on their march to *Wesenberg*. The Country through which His Majesty passed, was for 10 Leagues round destroy'd by the Enemy, so that no Provisions or Forage was to be had, and the Roads were very deep and bad with many Defiles. The Enemy might have secured the Passes of *Purts*, *Pybejegg*, and *Silanggi*; and made a considerable Opposition, but they neglected it, only 6000 Horse were posted at *Pybejegg* under the Command of *Schemetis*, who had sent his Foragers over the Pass, which were surpriz'd on the 18th by our advanc'd Parties, and forced to retire with the loss of some of their Men. In the Night *Schemetis* drew off, and made what speed he could to the *Muscovite* Camp. The next Day the Army marched over the Pass, not coming up time enough the Day before to do it, and continuing their march arriv'd on the 19th at *Lagena*, a League and an half from *Narva*. On the Twentieth, His Majesty broke up from *Lagena*, and arriv'd about Noon before the Enemy's Camp, which from the River, near *Portei* Mill up as far as *Joala*, was strongly Intrench'd with Breast-works, several Out-works, and many Batteries on rising Grounds and advantageous Places, besides a strong Line of Contravallation. Presently after their arrival, His Majesty drew up the Army in sight of the Enemy, and under the Fire of their Batteries, His Majesty riding himself up and down to take a view of the Enemy's Works, and mark the fittest Place for attacking them. After which, His Majesty resolv'd to make two General Attacks; and to that end the Army was divided in the following manner:

On the Right Wing, which was Commanded by General *Wallingk*, Major-General *Poffe* had the direction of the Attack; Lieutenant *Reenschiold* march'd on first with 50 Granadiers of the Guards, and was followed by Count *Sperling*, Commanding a Battalion of Granadiers of the Guards; These were sustained by three other Battalions of the Guards, viz. the first Battalion in the Middle, under Lieutenant-Colonel *Palin*, Major *Nammers* on the Right, and Captain *Ebrasten* on the Left; who were followed on the Right by Captain *Charles Poffe*, and Captain *Stort* on the Left; these were seconded by Co-

lonel *Knorring* with a Battalion of *Helsing*s on the Right, and Captain *Casimar Wrangel* with a Battalion of *Wesmanland* on the Left; and to sustain them three Battalions more followed; one of *Finlanders*, on the Right, under *Magnus Gabriel Tiefenhausen*, Major *Wulf* in the Middle, with a Battalion of *Helsing*s, and Captain *Kurb*, with a Battalion of *Wesmanland* on the Left. The Horse behind them, Commanded by Lieutenant-General *Wachmeister*, had orders to break in also as soon as they could.

On the Left Wing, which was order'd to break in above *Wepsekyle*, and Commanded by Lieutenant-General *Reenschiold*, two Attacks were formed, that on the Right commanded by Major-General *Maydell* in two Columns; the Right whereof was led on by Lieutenant-Colonel *Roos* with a Battalion of *Wermland*, and sustained by a Battalion of the same Regiment under Captain *Focks*, upon whom followed Major *Felitzzen*, with a Battalion of *Wesmanland*, sustained by a Battalion of *Finlanders* under Captain *Safs*, the Left Column was led on by Lieutenant-Colonel *Gryndell*, who was sustained by three Battalions of *Finlanders*, Commanded by Colonel *Melin*, Lieutenant-Colonel *Lode*, and Major *Berge*. These two Columns attack'd the Entrenchments to the Left, below an high Work the Enemy had thrown up, from whence not only the Plain was commanded on one side, but also the Lines and Entrenchments could be scour'd on the other.

Colonel Count *Steenbock* who led on the second Attack on the Left Wing, and was sustained by Lieutenant-Colonel *Hatsfelir*, with a Battalion of *Finlanders*, did attack this great Work of the Enemy before mentioned, and after him followed His Majesty in Person, who chose to be upon the left Wing, because the Fight according to all appearance would be there the sharpest; and His Majesty thought also to meet there with the Czar, whose Head Quarter was on that side. His Majesty had by him Lieutenant-General *Reenschiold*, Captain-Lieutenant and Major-General *Horn*, with the Horse-Guards, and the Horse of the Left Wing; the Rear whereof was commanded by Major-General *Ribbing*; the Ordnance of the Left Wing, consisting of 21 Cannon, was commanded by the Master of the Ordnance, and that of the Right by Major *Appelman*; the Word was thereupon given, [*With GOD's Assistance*] and the Signal for the Attack were two Rockets in the Air.

The Attack began about 2 a Clock in the Afternoon, in thick hazy Weather, with the Wind in our Back, was carried on with that Vigour and Success, that notwithstanding a Smart Resistance of the Enemy, we had the good Fortune to force their Entrenchments on both sides, and break into the Camp in a Quarter of an Hour's time, when we pursued the Enemy all along the Entrenchments, killing a great number of them. Our Left Wing drove the Enemy down to the River of *Narva*, where they endeavour'd to save themselves over the Bridge, which Breaking, many of the Enemy's were drowned, the rest were forced to make a desperate Defence; all hopes of escaping being cut off, and placing their Waggon before them between their Hurts and Wooden-houses they had Built in their Camp, we were forced to attack them a second time; the fire on both sides lasted till it grew so dark it was impossible to distinguish or discern any thing. The same Success, by the Blessing of God, attended our Right Wing against the Enemies Left, which was also put to Flight; whereupon part of our Right with the Guards joined His Majesty on the Left in the latter Attack; and though the Ground was very unfit for the Horse to act on, yet were they commanded to sustain the Foot, as soon as they had made an Opening; and by their Courage they supplied the Disadvantage of the Ground. When the Night had put a stop to all farther Fighting, His Majesty posted the Troops he had by him between the Entrenchments and the Town; and according to the situation of the Ground, they were chiefly placed on those sides where any Surprize might be apprehended. His Majesty gave also Order to the Master of the Ordnance *Sioblad*, Major-General *Moydell*, and Colonel Count *Steenbock*, with some Troops to possess themselves of the Enemies chief Battery on a rising Ground, from whence the whole Entrenchment could be scoured, whereby all Communication was cut off between the Enemy's Right and Left Wings.

When the Enemies saw themselves thus enclosed on all sides, and no Hopes left of a Retreat, those of them that were drove to the River of *Narva*, sent that very Evening, and submitted themselves, imploring His Majesty's Mercy, which was promised them. A little after, the following Generals of the Enemy came to His Majesty, and threw down their Arms at his Feet; The Under-Field-Marschal and Chief Commissary of War, *Knees Jacob Fiederowitz Dolgoruky*; General *Afemon Michaelowitz Golovin*; and the Master of the Ordnance, Prince *Artzchelowitz*, surrendering themselves on Discretion, and delivering up their Posts, which presently were possessed by His Majesty's Guards. This Submission of theirs was so graciously received by His Majesty, that he gave that part of the Army permission to march off, over the River, with their Arms, after they had delivered up their Colours and Standards.

General *Weide*, who Commanded the Enemies Left Wing, and was also shut up by our Right, hearing of this, sent also towards the Morning, his Adjutant-General, with a Drummer and a Letter to the General of the Swedish Army, submitting himself and his Troops, and imploring in the same manner his Majesty's Mercy, which was promised them; yet with this Distinction, That they should lay down all their Arms. Upon which, all the Enemies Regiments came and laid down their Colours and Arms at His Majesty's Feet, marching afterwards, as well Officers in a great Number, as Common Soldiers, bare-headed through the Camp, and so over the Bridge. After which, full Possession was taken of the whole Camp, where we found plenty of all things, and a considerable Booty, and a very fine Train of Artillery, consisting of 145 new Brass Guns of different Sizes, the big-

gest thereof 45 Pounders, 28 new Mortar-Pieces, with a great quantity of Ammunition; 6 Pair of Kettledrums, 151 Colours, 20 Standards, besides many that were tore during the Engagement, or lost in the dark, as well as in the River, when the Enemy endeavour'd to retreat; a great quantity of Arms, a good Sum of Money, besides a great many Tents, and Store of Provision and Forage. His Majesty hath not only, by his Prudent Directions in this Glorious Action, performed all the Parts of a Great General, but also shared the Danger with the Common Soldiers, exposing himself no less than any of them, where the Fire was greatest, and the Fight warmest, Charging sometimes a-foot with the Infantry, sometimes on Horseback with the Horse, among which the Horse-Guards have particularly signalized themselves: And yet it hath pleased Almighty GOD to Preserve His Majesty's Royal Person in all those Inminent Dangers.

To the Praise of the Generals, it must be said, That they have, every one in his Station, given all possible Proofs of their Prudence and Courage; and the Colonels, and all other Officers, strove to out-do one another in performing the Bravest Actions. Among the Common Soldiers appeared an undaunted Courage and great Desire to attack the Enemy, which was done with an incredible Vigour and Bravery.

During the Action, the Duke of *Cry* (to whom the Czar, when he left the Camp the day before the Battel, had in writing given, together with some Instructions, the Command of the Army) seeing the Battel lost beyond all Hopes of retrieving it, came, together with Lieutenant-General and Chief Engineer *Adm. Major-General Lang*, and Envoy from the King of Poland, *M. Blumenberg*, Colonel of the Czar's Guards, *Colonel Le Fort*, Major *Pyhr*, and some Engineers, and surrendered themselves Prisoners, with the rest of the *Muscovite* Generals, a great many Colonels, Lieutenant-Colonels, Major, and other Officers.

Thus the Town of *Narva*, after a hard and close Siege of 10 weeks, hath thro' the wonderful Assistance of Almighty God, and His Majesty's Heroick Courage, been happily relieved.

This Victory is so much the more Glorious, as it hath been obtained by so small an Army, against so Powerful an Enemy, whose Forces were reckoned to consist of 80000 Men, whereas His Majesty's Army was but a handful of Men, and those very much fatigued by long and continual Marches, and want of Provisions and Forage. Of the Enemy we have already an account of 18000 Killed and Drowned in the Action; and on His Majesty's side the number of the Killed and wounded amounts to 3000 Men.
