The Attack begun about 22 Clock in the Aftemoon, in thick hazy Weather, with the Wind in our Back, was carried on with that Vigour and Success, that notwithstanding a Smart Resistance of the Enemy, we had the good Fortune to force their Entrenchments on both sides, and break into the Camp in a Quarter of an Hour's time, when we purfued the Enemy all along the Entrenchments, killing a great number of them. Our Left Wing drove the Enemy down to the River of Narva, where they endeavour'd to fave themfelves over the Bridge, which Breaking, many of the Enemy's were drowned, the rest were forced to make a desperate Desence; all hopes of escaping being eur off, and placing their Waggons before them between their Hutts and Wooden-houses they had Built in their Camp, we were forced to artack them a second time; the fire on both sides lasted till it grew so dark it was impossible to distinguish or discern any thing. The same Success, by the Blessing of God, attended our Right Wing against the Enemies Left, which was also put to Flight; whereupon part of our Right with the Guards joined His Majesty on the Left in the latter Attack; and though the Ground was very unfit for the Horse to act on, yet were they commanded to sustain the Foot, as soon as they had made an Opening; and by their Courage they supplied the Disadvantage of the Ground. When the Night had put a stop to all farther Fighting, His Majesty posted the Troops he had by him between the Entrenchments and the Town; and according to the structure of the Ground, they were chirsty placed on the Ground, they were chiefly placed on those sides where any Surprize might be apprehen-His Majesty gave also Order to the Master of the Ordnance Sieblad, Major-General Maydell, and Colonel Count Steenbock, with some Troops to possels themselves of the Encmies chief Battery on a rifing Ground, from whence the whole Entrenchment could be scoured, whereby all Communication was cut off between the Enemy's Right and Left Wings.

When the Enemies faw themselves thus enclofed on all fides, and no Hopes left of a Retreat, those of them that were drove to the River of Narva, fent that very Evening, and submitted themselves, imploring His Majesty's Mercy, which was promised them. A little after, the following Generals of the Enemy came to His Majesty, and threw down their Arms at his Feet; The Under-Field-Mareschal and ChiefCommisfary of War, Knees Jacob Finderowitz Dolgoruky; General Aftenon Michaelowitz Golovin; and the Master of the Ordnance, Prince Artzehelowitz, furrendring themselves on Discretion, and delivering up their Posts, which presently were pos-fessed by His Majesty's Guards. This Submisfion of theirs was so graciously received by His Majesty, that he gave that part of the Army permission to march off, over the River, with their Arms, after they had delivered up their Colours and Standards.

General Weide, who Commanded the Enemies Left Wing, and was also shut up by our Right, hearing of this, fent also towards the Morning, his Adjutant-General, with a Drummer and a Letter to the General of the Swedish Army, sub-mitting himself and his Troops, and imploring in the same manner his Majesty's Mercy, which was promised them; yet with this Distinction, That they should lay down all their Arms. Upon which, all the Enemies Regiments came and laid down their Colours and Arms at His Majesty's Feet, marching afterwards, as well Officers in a great Number, as Common Soldiers, bare-headed through the Camp, and fo over the Bridge. After which, full Possession was, taken of the whole Camp, where we found plenty of all things, and a confiderable Booty, and a very fine Train of Artillery, confisting of 145 new Brass Guns of different Sizes, the big-

gest thereof 45 Pounders; 28 new Montacken with a great quantity of Ammunition; 6 Ping Kettledrums, 151 Colours, 20 Standards, L. Kettledrums, 131 Colours, 20 Standard; be fides many that were tore during the Engagement, or lost in the dark, as well as it River, when the Enemy endayoured to make a great quantity of Arms, a good Sum of Maney, belides a great many Tents, and hard Provision and Forage. To the Praise of the Generals, it must be ful That they have, every one in his Station, given ail possible Proofs of their Prudence and Conrage; and the Colonels, and all other Officen, firove to out-do one another in performing the Bravest Actions. Among the Common Soldier appeared an undaunted Courage and great De

fire to attack the Enemy, which was done with an incredible Vigour and Bravery.

During the Action, the Duke of Org (we whom the Czar, when he left the Camp the day before the Battal had in writing given. before the Battel, had in writing given, mo the Army) feeing the Battel lost beyond a Hopes of retrieving it, came, together with Lieutenant-General and Chief Enginer And Major-General Lang, and Envoy from the In of Poland, M. Thus the Town of Narva, after a hard we close Siege of 10 weeks, hath, thro' the worder ful Allistance of Almighty God, and His Majesty's Heroick Courage, been happily relieved.

This Victory is so much the more Gloring.

as it hath been obtained by fo small an Army against so Powerful an Enemy, whose Forces were reckoned to confift of 80000 Men, where as His Majesty's Army was but a handful of Men, and those very much fatigued by long and continual Marches, and want of Provision and Forage. Of the Enemy we have already at account of 18000 Killed and Drowned in the Action; and on His Majesty's side the number of the Killed and wounded amounts to 2000
