Lisbon, Dec. 21. N. S.

Directions are given for sending three Men of War with the Fleet of Merchant Ships that is going from hence to the Indies; They are to be joined by two others from the Bay of All-Saints, and to sail to the Coast of Zanguebar with Succours, to put the Portuguese in those Parts in a condition to recover the Town of Mombaza from the Arabs. A great quantity of Corn is lading here for Brazil, where there is at present a scarcity thereof.

Naples, Jan. 4. The new King of Spain is to be proclaimed here the 6th Instant. Two Gallies of the Duke of Turfis's Squadron arrived in this Port last week from Genoua, and four more are expected, which, together with the Squadron of Naples and Sicily, will be employed in transporting the Regiments that are designed to be sent from hence to Final.

Madrid, January 13. Preparations are made for the Reception of the King of Spain, who will be 18 days in his Journey hither from Iron; it being appointed as follows; The 22d Instant at Haxani, the 23d at Tolosa, the 24th at Villa Real, the 25th at Mondragon, the 26th at Vitoria, the 27th at Miranda de Hebro, the 28th at Bribresca, the 29th at Burgos, the 30th at Lerma, the 31st at Arauda de Ducro, the 1st of February at San Isevan de Gormaz, the 2d at Verlanga, the 3d at Acienza, the 4th at Xadraque, the 5th at Ita, the 6th at Guadaxara, the 7th at Alcalá, and the 8th at Madrid. The Count de Harrach, Ambassador from the Emperor, will depart in few days for Vicma. 'Tis said, the Elector of Brandenburg's Envoy is likewise on his departure home.

Dresden, Jan. 23. The Diet of the Electorate of Saxony continue assembled, not having yet finished the Business before them. Directions will shortly be given for the Levies they have agreed to make, to the number of 6000 Men, for the King of Poland's Service. Letters from Warsaw say, the King has put off his Journey hither till the next Spring, and that he has made the Count of Zinzendorf Governor of this Place, General of the Ordnance, and Lieutenant-General Fleming General of Foot. They write from Bohemia, that divers Imperial Regiments which were quartered in that Country, are moving towards Germany.

Hamburg, Jan. 28. The Duke of Holftein will go from hence in few days to Kiel, and designs after a short stay there, to proceed to the Dutchy of Bremen to review the Swedish Forces in those Parts. The Elector of Brandenburg's Minister here has made Publick Rejoicings for his Master's Coronation as King of Prussia; They write from Embden, that his Electoral Highness's Resident in that Place did, upon this occasion, give a Splendid Entertainment to the Magistrates, and other Persons of Quality, and entertained them with a very fine Firework. Letters from Berlin say, great Preparations are making there for the new King's Reception, who is shortly expected from Camingberg. There are Advices from Revel which give an Account, that the King of Sweden continued his march towards Muscovy, and that a great

number of the Czar's Subjects who live on the Frontiers, have put themselves under the Protection of the Swedes, and bring Provisions very freely to their Camp.

Francfort, Jan. 30. The new Levies which are making in these Parts for the Service of the Emperor, and other Princes of Germany, go on with very good Success; and the Imperial Commissioners continue to buy up Corn and other Provisions for the Magazines at Philipsburgh, Eriburgh, and Brisac. Recruits are raising in the Palatinate for the Elector Palatine's Forces. According to the Advices from Alsace, the French make like Preparations at Landau, and other Frontier Places, and they work very diligently on the Fortifications of New Brisac. Letters from Strasburgh say, the Chapter are to meet the 28th Instant to choose the Prince of Soubize, Coadjutor of that Bishoprick, according to the Directions sent from the Court of France. The Count of Lewenstein Wertheim, Envoy from the Emperor, is gone from Wurzburg to Nuremberg, where the Diet of the Circle of Franconia are assembled, and from thence is to proceed to Ulm, to make some Proposals to the Diet of the Circle of Suabia. They write from Mentz, that Monsieur d'Uberville, Envoy from France, has left that Place, and is gone with some Commission from the King his Master to the Court of Hesse-Cassel.

Cologne, Febr. 1. N. S. Monsieur Desfalleurs, late Envoy Extraordinary from France to the Elector of Brandenburg, arrived this day from Berlin, being appointed to reside here with the same Character. He intends to go to morrow to Bonn, to confer with the Elector of Cologne. His Electoral Highness will leave that Place in 2 or 3 days, with a design to go to Liege, and from thence to Brussels.

Paris, Feb. 9. N. S. Last night a Courier arrived here from Flanders with Advice, That the French Troops had taken Possession of Luxemburgh and Charleroy, and were upon their March towards other Towns of Flanders. The Levies for augmenting the French Horse with 10 Men in each Troop, are carried on with great Diligence, the Officers being ordered to have them complete by the 15th of the next Month. The Number of Troops raised, and ordered to be raised in this Kingdom since Michaelmas last, amount to above 80000 Men. Letters from Antibes say, a good Body of French Forces embarked there the 22d, 23d, 24th, and 25th of the last Month, to reinforce those that are already in the Milanese. The Count d'Avaux set out from hence the 5th Instant for Holland. The Letters from Bayonne give an Account, That the King of Spain continued there the 20th and 21st, and held several Councils, at which the Duke de Noailles, as well as the Dukes de Harcourt and de Beauvilliers, assisted. The 22d in the morning he went from Bayonne with the Princes of France, and the Dukes of Beauvilliers, Noailles, and Harcourt, who were in the same Coach with them, to the Island of the Conference, (as 'tis called from the Conferences held there at the Treaty of the Pyrenees,) where the Princes took their Leave of each other. The King of Spain crossed the River in a Shalop prepared for this purpose, and at his arrival at Iron he found the Spanish Guards drawn up, making a Lane to the Church of Iron, where he was received and complimented by the Bishop of Pampelona at the Head of the Clergy, and afterwards Te Deum was sung. The Princes of France returned the same day to St. John de Luz, and came the 23d to Bayonne, and the 24th to Acqs, and from thence would continue their Journey hither through Languedoc and Provence. 'Tis said here, that the Spanish Flota with 20 Millions of Crowns is safely arrived at Cadix.
