target, on the homeward flight, Warrant Officer Hudson saw a Junkers 88 closing in. He promptly warned his captain. Evading action was taken after the rear gunner had opened fire. The enemy aircraft came in again, however, with guns firing. aircraft came in again, however, with guns firing. Warrant Officer Hudson was badly wounded. In spite of this he continued to fire his guns to the best of his ability until the enemy aircraft was evaded some five minutes later. Not until the fight had ended was any member of the crew aware that Warrant Officer Hudson had been hit. His injuries were severe but he had fought bravely and well. His efforts contributed in group measure and well. His efforts contributed in good measure to the safety of the aircraft. His fortitude and strong sense of duty in spite of much physical suffering set a magnificent example.

Warrant Officer Albert William RUSSELL (1376322), R.A.F.V.R., 158 Sqn. In September, 1944, Warrant Officer Russell was the air bomber in an aircraft detailed to attack a well defended enemy strong point in the Calais area. In spite of considerable light anti-aircraft fire, Warrant Officer Russell directed his pilot on six runs over the target before re-leasing his bombs. This warrant officer has participated in many successful sorties and has invariably displayed the highest standard of skill and courage.

This officer and these airmen were captain, air bomber, wireless operator (air) and flight engineer respectively of an aircraft detailed to attack a synthetic oil refinery at Sterkrade in October, 1944. In the vicinity of the target the bomber was hit by anti-aircraft fire. A fire commenced in the fuselage behind the main bulkhead. Promptly and resolutely, Sergeant Soames attempted to quell the flames. As he fought, the aircraft was again hit. The navigator was seriously wounded; Flight Sergeant Baldwin was also wounded but withheld the fact from his captain in order to help Flight Sergeant Whelan who had gone to the assistance of their stricken comrade. Meanwhile, Seageant Soames succeeded in putting out the fire. During this trying period Flying Officer McGindle had shown the qualities of a fine captain and his coolness and able direc-tions greatly inspired his crew. One engine had become defective and, a little later, ceased to function completely. The airspeed indicator was unserviceable and much other damage had been sustained. Nevertheless, Flying Officer McGindle flew the aircraft safely to base. This officer dis-played great skill and determination throughout. Flight Sergeants Baldwin and Whelan and Sergeant Soames also proved themselves to be devoted and resolute members of aircraft crew. They did everything possible to assist their captain in his endeavour to reach home, whilst their efficient first aid and constant attention to their grievously wounded comrade undoubtedly played a prominent part in saving his life.
