Warlaw before the Election.

The 14th, Galeski appeared in the lower House to make good his Charge against the accused Members, but his Evidences proved to light and ill foundedy that the Houle was with much difficulty moved to give him time till the

next day to fortify his Charge.

The same day the Senators sent to the Equestrian Order to defire a Confetence, which was immediately complyed with, the whole House rising to attend them, but entring into the house of the Senators, and perceiving that (contrary to the ancient Cultom) two ranks of Benches were fet up behind the Senators leats for the reception of the Nobles; the Members of the Equestrian Or er being difgusted, went away, faying they would return when those new things were taken away.

On Wednellay the 15th, the Lower House examined again what fatther proof Galerki was able to bring in a gainst the before fail accused Members, but finding nothing material, he infishing chiesly upon common Report, the Marefinal declared that these acculations did not at all prejudice the Honour of Gelinski, and so threw it out of the House, and its believed Begoir Pazzi will not only be clerred by the Senators; but that satisfaction will be also

This debate ending, the House being informed that the new Benthes were taken out of the Senate houle, went again in a body to attend them; where they found most of the Senators, but that nothing could be done till the arrival of the Arch-Bishop of Guesne their Speaker, at which his ablence the Members of the Equestrian Order began to full into a discontent, and having some time attended, seeing at lest the Crois which is usually carried before the Arch Bishop, with some of his Officers coming in before him, the refused to stay, going out altogether, saying, They had other affire and would return again the next morning at 8 of the Clock.

From Ghent we are informed, that upon an application made by the Reur Safbourg if the Constable of Castille, the two malesactors apprehended for the infolency formetly committed by them at Oudeman, viz. Pierre de Thionville, and faques Cordelier now prisoners at Ghent aie ordered to be delivered into the hands of the President of Fland 75, but as yet 'tis not certainly affirmed whether they shall receive their trial in Flanders, or be by the said President delivered to the Magistrates of Escuse to

proceed with them according to Justice.

Park June 4. Yesterday his Majesty was pleaset the Fort St. Sebasian neer St. Germaines, where the whola body was drawn up upon a line, in several baraillons, Bach of them having z. pieces of Cannon at the head of them, in which posture they gave four Vollyes of shot, with as many discharges of their Cannon: the Capraines of the Guards in their weekely Turnes performs the Office of Generall, and keepe an open Table.

From Thoulon we are informed that the Galleys are now put out to les to joyne with those fitted out by the Pope forthe Reliefe of Candia, and the men of warr intended for the same Expedition lye ready to put to sea with the fift faire Wind.

Letters from Flanders confirm to us the news of fome action that has happened between the Garrisons of Ghent' and Oudended, informing of that a Party from Ghent having taken a Citizen of the other place, upon a debt owing to fome spaniards, and upon application refu'ed to re-lease him, the Governour of Oudenard Monsieur de Rochepas went out with a party of 200 Horse, and marching towards Ghent, placed 150 of them in Ambulcado behind a hill fending out the other 50 nearer the Town to take Prifoners, which giving an Allarum to the Town, aparty of 150 Horle were fent out, upon whole appearance the 50 recreated skirmishing, but closely pursued by the Spaniards. till falling within the ambush, they were so briskly Charged, that they were prefently difordered, and most of them either killed or takon.

Waymouth, May 26. The 24th instant touched in this Bay a ship passing to the Eastwards, firing 9 Guns, and is suppoled to be a ship of North-Tarmouth newly returned from

the Eaft-Indies.

Yesterday arrived the Constance of this Port from Virginia, telling us of a Fleet of about 40 fail which are

passing up the Channel, most of them Dutch.

Deal, May 28. Yesterday arrived in the Downs two thips from the East-Indies, one of them from Bantam laden with Pepper, the other from Suratt with much Cloath and a quantity of Mace with other Spices. Several other thips are also come into the Downs from the Straights and Leveral Ports of Spain, one from Lisbonne, one from Mary land, and one from Morlaix.
