**A PROCLAMATION,**

For Apprehending John Glover, Alexander Cutting, William Adye and William Clifton.

WILLIAM R.

**W** Hereas We have been Informed, That John Glover, Alexander Cutting, William Adye and William Clifton, who have been Charged by the Commons in Parliament Assembled with High Crimes and Misdemeanors, in Endeavouring by Bribery, and other Corrupt Practices, to procure Elections for several Boroughs of Members to Serve in this present Parliament, do, in Contempt of the Authority of the House of Commons, Abscond, and cannot be Apprehended: And whereas the said Commons in Parliament Assembled, have humbly besought Us to Issue Our Royal Proclamation for Apprehending the said John Glover, Alexander Cutting, William Adye and William Clifton: We therefore (with the Advice of Our Privy Council) have thought fit to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby Requiring and Commanding all Our Loving Subjects whatsoever, to Discover, Take and Apprehend the said John Glover, Alexander Cutting, William Adye and William Clifton, whether of them, wherever they may be Found, and to Carry them before the next Justice of Peace or Chief Magistrate, who is hereby Required to Commit them to the next Goal, there to remain until they shall be thence delivered by due course of Law: And We do hereby Require the said Justice or other Chief Magistrate, immediately to give Notice thereof to Our Privy Council, who is one of Our Principal Secretaries of State. And We do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Our Loving Subjects (as they will answer the contrary at their Perils) that they do not any ways Conceal, but Discover, Take and Apprehend the said John Glover, Alexander Cutting, William Adye and William Clifton, so the end they may be Proceeded against according to Law. And We do hereby Promise and Declare, That whatsoever shall Discover and Apprehend the said John Glover, and bring him before such Justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate, shall Receive, as a Reward, the Sum of One hundred Pounds; And whoever shall Apprehend and Discover the said Alexander Cutting, William Adye and William Clifton, or either of them, and bring them before such Justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate, shall Receive, as a Reward, the Sum of Fifty Pounds, for each of them so Discovered and Apprehended; which said respective Sums of One hundred Pounds, and Fifty Pounds, the Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby directed to Pay accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Kensington the Twenty seventh Day of March, 1701. In the Thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

Witness, Mar. 20 N.S. The King of Poland arrived here the 16th Instant from Birtzen in Lithuania, where he had an Interview with the Czar of Muscovy, who is like-

wife returned home. They have made an Offensive and Defensive Alliance against the Crown of Sweden; The Czar is to give the King of Poland 200000 Crowns, and to send an Army into Livonia to be commanded by the King. The Commissioners appointed to adjust the Differences between the Houses of Sapiaha and Oginsky, will shortly begin their Conferences, the Nobility of both Parties having sent Deputies hither to represent their Grievances. Deputies are likewise come hither from the Nobility of Great Poland; but the King has not yet given them Audience.

**Vienna, March 23.** The Regiment of Foot of Mansfeld, consisting in 2500 Men, will begin their March to morrow from their Quarters in the Country of Presbourg, to join the rest of the Emperor's Forces that are marching to Italy. The Prince of Longueval has undertaken to raise 1500 Men for the Emperor's Service, to which will be added 900, to be drawn out of the old Bodies, in order to form a Regiment of 2400 Men under his Command, who are likewise designed for Italy. Count Muzoni, who, during the late War against the Turks, served the Republick of Venice in the Quality of Engineer-General, is entered into the Emperor's Service, who has made him Lieutenant Field-Marshal-General, with a promise of the Command of the first Regiment that shall become vacant. The Bishop of Olmutz and Osnabrug left this Place the 20th Instant, and is gone to Olmutz. The Deputies of the Circles of Swabia and Franconia will be going hence in few days; 'Tis said, they have obtained of the Emperor an Assignment upon certain Imperial Revenues; for the Payment of the Sums he has granted them in consideration of the Damages they suffered during the late War. Letters from Italy say, that the French Forces in the Milanese have sent strong Parties to quarter in the Territory of Mirandola, and Places adjacent.

**Frankfort, March 30.** The Elector of Bavaria is expected here towards the latter end of this week, in his way to Munich. They write from the Palatinate, that several Regiments of Foot in the Elector Palatine's Service quartered in the Neighbourhood of Mannheim, are ordered to the Duchy of Bergs, and Boats are providing to carry them down the Rhine. The Inhabitants of Heidelberg begin to send away their best Effects to Places of Safety. The Garrison of Philipburgh, and the other Imperial Garrisons upon the Rhine, are reinforced, and well provided with Ammunition and Provisions. They write from Nuremberg, that some Troops of Hussars had passed by that Place, and several Imperial Regiments are shortly expected there, in their March towards the Rhine.

**Cologne, April 1.** The Electors of Cologne and Bavaria went from Bonn the 29th Instant towards Coblenz; They intend to see the Electors of Mentz and Trier; after which the Elector of Bavaria will proceed on his Journey to Munich, and the Elector of Cologne will return to Bonn. The Brabantian Forces lately arrived here from the Spanish Netherlands are put on Board the Vessels that are to carry them up the Rhine and the Meuse as far as Wertheim, from whence they are to march to Bavaria; They consist in 6 Regiments of Foot, making together 6000 Men, being commanded by the Count d'Acou. Yesterday arrived two Companies of Brandenburgh Foot, who are to remain in Garrison here, and 2 Battalions of the Troops of the Circles are shortly expected. 'Tis said the Emperor has recommended Major-General Bauschuld to command the Forces in this City. Several Pieces of great Cannon were this week placed upon the Town Wall.

**Hamburg, April 1.** We have an Account from Nyenboog, that two Regiments of the Duke of Ceda's Forces are passed by that Place in their march towards the United Provinces. The Forces of Hanover are likewise on their march thither. They write from Lerkun, that the King of Prussia has ordered several Regiments of his

His Forces quartered in the Electorate of Brandenburg, to march to the Country of Cleves. From Dresden we have an Account, that the Electoral Palace took fire the 27th past by some unknown Accident, that it lasted several hours, and destroyed the greatest part of the said Palace, with a great deal of rich Furniture. Letters from Sweden say, that Preparations are making there for a great Transport of Forces to Livonia.

**Brussels, April 1.** The Marquis of Badmar and the Prince Soltis are gone from hence, to view the Fortifications of Antwerp and the neighbouring Towns. There happened this week, a Quarrel between the Burgers of Antwerp and the French Soldiers in Garrison there, wherein divers were killed and wounded on both sides; and Informations are taking concerning this Matter. Orders are daily expected from the Court of Spain, to make the intended Reform of Offices and Pensions in these Countries; And in the mean time, the Chamber of Accounts are getting ready a State of the Revenues, and of the Pensions and other Payments charged thereupon. The French Forces continue to advance towards the Spanish Guelderland, and divers Pieces of Cannon have been sent thither from Muelen. The Elector of Bavaria's departure for Germany continues fixed for the 6th Instant.

**Hague, April 5.** The Courier lately sent by the Count d'Armas to the French Court, with the Proposals delivered to him by Mr. Stanhope and the Deputies of this State, returned Lither on Saturday last. Mr. Steepney, Envoy Extraordinary to the Emperor, is arrived here from England, and in few days will proceed on his Journey to Vienna. All possible diligence is used, in working on the Fortifications of Bergenopzoom, and other Frontier Places; and the new Levies go on very well. Twenty Dutch Men of War lie ready to sail for the Downs. The Dutch Regiments that are come to Maastricht from Namur and Luxemburg, are very much weakened by Desertion. We have Advice, that 2300 Luxemburgers were expelled yesterday at Devanter and Zutphen.

**Paris, April 6. N.S.** The French Court went last Monday from Versailles to Marli for a few days. The Duke of Orleans has made a solemn Protestation, on account of his being left out of the late King of Spain's Will, and has caused the same to be printed, for saving the Rights of himself and his Family to the Succession of Spain, preferably to the Arch-Duke of Austria, and the Duke of Savoy. The King has sent Orders to Monsieur de Phelipeaux, his Ambassador at Turin, to press the Duke of Savoy to declare himself before the German Troops enter into Italy; from whence we have an account, that the French have taken Possession of Gussalla and Mirandola. The Troops of the Household passed in Review yesterday, and this day in the Plain of Oulite. The Constable of Castile, Ambassador Extraordinary from Spain, went from hence on Monday last on his return to Madrid.

**Kensington, March 27.** His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Thomas Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery Lord President of the Council, to be First Lord Commissioner of the Admiralty, in the room of the Earl of Bridgewater deceased.

This day the Right Honourable Henry Boyle Esq; Chancellor and Under-Treasurer of His Majesty's Exchequer, was, by His Majesty's Command, Sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council; And accordingly took his Place at the Board.
