**Cologne, April 5.** The Garrison of this Place was reinforced on the 2d Instant with 300 Men of the Forces of the Circle of the Lower Rhine, and is to consist in the whole of 3000 Men of the said Forces, and of 1000 Men which this City are to maintain at their own Expence. The Bishop of Munster's Officers are raising Recruits. 'Tis said, the Electors of Mentz, Triers, and Cologne, have resolved to make new Levies.

**Hamburg, April 5.** The last Letters from Livonia give an Account, that the King of Sweden continued in his Quarters near Laus, and had sent out Orders for the Nobility of Livonia to be in a readiness to mount on Horseback, and to join his Army. They write from Sweden, that all possible diligence is used to hasten away the Transport of Forces to Livonia; and we are told from Warsaw, that 'tis at last received, that the General Diet of Poland shall meet on the 30th of May next.

**Brussels, April 8.** The Electress of Bavaria parted from hence the 6th Instant, in order to return to Germany. The whole Garrison appeared in Arms, and the Marquis of Bedmar, with the Prince of Saxe, the Duke of Bisaccia, and many other Persons of Quality on Horseback, waited upon her about a mile out of Town. The Marquis of Bedmar, and several of the General Officers, have been at Antwerp, where they gave Directions for augmenting the Fortifications, and for preparing Quarters in the Town and Castle for about 9000 Men. Orders are given for sending thither 80 Pieces of Cannon. A great Convoy of Ammunition, and 40 Pieces of Cannon, are sent from Mchlen to the Spanish Guelderland, for the use of our Frontier Places. An Order is published here, for calling home all the King of Spain's Subjects who are in the Service of any Foreign Prince. The Count de Briond, late Ambassador from France at the Hague, arrived at Antwerp the 3d Instant, in his return to France.

**Hague, April 8.** We have Advice, that 2800 Men of the Forces of Lunenburg, are arrived at Zutphen, where 1000 are to remain in Garrison, 900 are to go to Nimeguen, and the rest to Arnhem. Mr. Stepany, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain to the Emperor, went from hence this day, in order to continue his Journey to Vienna. General Cosboorn is returned hither from viewing the Fortifications of Berg-opzoom, and other Frontier Places.

**Paris, April 9. N. S.** The Marshal de Camille arrived the first Instant at Lyons, and the day following continued his Journey to Milan, where he is to have the Chief Command of all the French Forces, and 40 Squadrons of French Horse are ordered to march towards that Dutchy. The Letters from Milan say, the French have put a Garrison into Mantua, as they have likewise done at Castiglione, Mirandola, Guastalla, and other Places. The King has given Orders for providing Horses for the Baggage of the Troops of the Household. Orders are given for enquiring into some Abuses that are complained of in the Mints of this Kingdom, whereupon several Persons who had Employments there, have absented themselves, as have likewise the Treasurer to the States of Britany, the Treasurer to the States of Languedoc, the Treasurer to the Clergy, and several others, because they cannot make up their Accounts. The Packets of Burgundy and Berry left Aix the 21st past, and came to Antibes; the 22d they crossed the River Durance at Arlesmouth; They were received at their Landing by the Pope's Vice-Legate, who accompanied them to Civitanova, where he entertained them in a very splendid manner; The next day they came to Avignon, where they were received without the City Gates by the Magistrates; the Keys of the City were presented to them, and they passed to the Vice-Legate's Palace; The 24th the Vice-Legate delivered to them Letters of Compliment from the Pope; The 25th they departed from Avignon, and lay that night at Cadarsane. Several Triumphal Arches were erected at Avignon, and Medals were Coin'd and distributed there on this occasion.
