dience to the Emperor.

Six thousand mon are lately arrived at Dough, from whence they have lately fone to Pieces of Cannon for the service of the Gatrisons of Taile and Tournay.

The Commons have had lately several Assemblices bun have not been prevailed with to confent to any of the Dethands made to them; nor is it believed any thing of that nature will be concluded by them till the alteration of the

Magistrates, for which the time approaches.
