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Warsaw, April 18. N. S.

THE Circular Letters, for Summoning a General Diet of this Kingdom to meet the 30th of the next Month, are sent to the several Palatinates; The King therein represents to them the Advantages which his own Forces, though in a small number, have gained in *Livonia*, by taking several Places from the *Swedes*, and exhorts them to assist him in the War against *Sweden*, in order to recover the Country of *Livonia* which formerly belonged to the Crown of *Poland*, for which the present Conjuncture being very favourable, he thinks himself obliged to make use of it, pursuant to the Oath he took at his Coronation, to endeavour all he could to restore the Republick to its ancient Glory, and Extent of Dominion. The *Sieur Pocré*, Major-General of *Lithuania*, came hither some days ago from that Duchy, attended by 500 Horse; He has had Audience of the King of *Poland*, and delivered to him a Letter from the Confederated Nobility of *Lithuania*, who desire the King not to protect the House of *Sapieha*. The *Sieur Szoracks*, Under-Chancellor of *Lithuania*, answered, That the King recommended it to the Nobility of *Lithuania* to hearken to Terms of Accommodation, and assured them, that notwithstanding the ill Success of the Negotiations that have hitherto been for on foot for reconciling the two differing Parties, He will never cease to employ his utmost Endeavours to that end. The Palatinates of *Craon* and *Sandomir* have sent Deputies to the King, to desire him to make a Peace with *Sweden*, and to send home his *Saxon* Forces, but they have not yet been admitted to Audience.

Vienna, April 20. The Regiment of Horse commanded by Prince *Charles of Vaudemont*, arrived two days ago in the neighbourhood of this Place from *Hungary*, and was reviewed yesterday in the presence of the Emperor and the whole Court. His Imperial Majesty, the King of the *Romans*, and the Arch-Duke, were on Horseback, and the Empress, the Queen of the *Romans*, and the Arch-Duchess, in open Chaises; The Prince of *Vaudemont* received their Majesties at the Head of the Regiment, and carried them through the several Ranks; The Regiment appeared in a very good condition, and the same day continued their March to *Italy*. The Regiment of *Savoie* is expected here the 23d from *Hungary*. Prince *Eugene of Savoy*, who is to have the Chief Command of the Emperor's Forces in *Italy*, prepares for his departure from hence. General *Grossfeld* is made Commander in Chief of the Emperor's Forces in *Upper Hungary*.

Frankfort, April 27. The Imperial and French Commissioners for adjusting the Differences between the Elector Palatine and the Dutchess of *Orleans*, concerning the Pretensions of the latter to several Lands in the Palatinate, did yesterday deliver their Opinions as Arbitrators in this Matter, but not agreeing therein, the Final Decision is to be referred to the Pope, pursuant to the Treaty of *Ryswick*. 'Tis said, the Circles near the *Rhine* will shortly have a General Meeting at *Hallbrunn*, to consider together of providing for their Common Safety. The Landgraves of *Hesse-Cassel* and *Hesse-Darmstadt* have given Orders, That the Militia of their respective Territories be frequently Exercised in the use of Arms, to the end they

may at any time make a Draught out of the same to be formed into regulated Regiments. They write from *Alsace*, that the French Forces continue to advance that way from *Franch-Comte* and *Burgundy*, and that they talk of forming a Camp near *Landau*. Mr. *Stepney*, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great-Britain*, had Audience the 24th Instant of the Elector of *Mentz* at *Alschaffembourg*, and afterwards continued his Journey to *Vienna*, intending in his way to see the Bishop of *Wurtzburgh*. Letters from *Vienna* say, the Emperor's Forces which are to serve in *Italy*, are all on their March thither. And they write from *Innspruck*, that the Imperial Regiment of Foot of *Herberfeyne*, consisting of 2200 Men, passed by that Place the 15th Instant, and that the Regiment of Horse of *Serini* was expected there the 22d of this Month.

Hamburgh, April 29. They write from *Berlin*, That the States of the Country of *Brandenburgh* are summoned to meet there the 3d of the next Month, and that the King of *Prussia* will make his Publick Entry into that City the 6th. Letters from *Dresden* say, the *Saxons* grow daily more and more jealous of the Strength of the *Swedes* in *Pomerania*, who are at present able to bring into the Field an Army of above 17000 Men. We have an Account from *Livonia*, that about 50 Transport Ships are arrived at *Revel* with Forces from *Sweden*, and more were shortly expected; That a good quantity of Bombs and other Ammunition was sent from *Narva* to the King of *Sweden's* Camp near *Lais*, and that the King intended, as soon as the Succours from *Sweden* were all arrived, to march to *Pleskow*; And that they had Advice from *Muscovy*, that the Czar would bring a great Army into the Field the next Summer, but that a considerable Body of *Circassian* Horse being dissatisfied for want of their Pay, had quitted his Service, and were returned home.

Wijl, April 29. Several Battalions of the King of *Prussia's* Troops arrived here this week from the Country of *Brandenburgh*, and are sent into Quarters at *Ermsrick*, *Rees*, *Zanten*, and *Cleeve*; about 10000 Men more are shortly expected; And 'tis said, these Forces are to form a Camp near the *Rhine*. They work with great diligence to repair the Fortifications of this Place, and particularly those of our Citadel, and Orders are given for pulling down several Houses which are built too near the Line.

Brussels, May 1. The Marquis of *bedmar* returned hither the 28th of the last Month; and the Marshal de *Boufflers*, who went with him to view the Garrisons of *Bruges* and *St. Donat*, came the 29th to *Dendermond*, and went the day following to *Antwerp*. 'Tis said, the French intend to have a Camp this Summer near *Bruges*. Monsieur *Bagnols*, Intendant at *Lisle*, is expected here to morrow, and is to reside in this Place in the same Quality. The *Swiss* Regiment of *Sartines* arrived here yesterday from the French Conquests, and marched this day to *Lierre*. A French Regiment of Horse came last night to *Nivelles*, and marched this day to *Louvain*; and Stables are provided at *Mons*, *Namur*, and other Places, for the French Horse which are shortly expected there. A considerable Magazine is preparing at *Namur*. The Government of *Courtray*, vacant by the Death of the Baron of *Cuicieres*, is given to the Count de *Soye*. The Marquis de *Comales*, who formerly resided in *England* with the Character of Ambassador from *Spain*, departed from hence this day for *Maastricht*. The Count d'*Arignan*, Inspector-General of the French Forces, took a Review last week at *Louvain*, and other Towns in these Provinces.

ANSWERD,

Antwerp, May 2. The Marshal de Boufflers came hither the 29th Instant by Water from Dendermonde; He was saluted with a Discharge of the Cannon of the Town and Citadel, and was received at his Landing by the Governor, who conducted him to his Lodging at the Abbey of St. Michael, part of the Garrison being in Arms in the Streets through which he passed. The next day he was Complimented by the Magistrates of this City; the same day in the afternoon he viewed the Line that is making round this City, and the other new Works. Yesterday he went to see the Fortifications of Sanduliez. This day he reviewed the Garrison, which was reinforced two days ago by the Regiment of Horse of Furstenberg, and he has given Directions for some Works to be added to the Fortifications of this Place.

Hague, May 3. There was yesterday a Conference between the Deputies of the States-General, and the Count d'Armaux Ambassador from France; but it is said, nothing more was offered by the Ambassador than what he had before declared to the Pensionary; and he gives out, that he has Orders to return home. A *Miral de Nemours* came hither some days ago, to receive his Last Instructions from the States, and returned yesterday to Amsterdam. There are now 14 Sail of Dutch Men of War in the Road of Flessing. The States of Holland and West-Friesland joined two days ago to the 11th Instant. The *Herzog* is gone to Zealand, to be present at the Assembly of the States of that Province. Monsieur Dyckvelt is gone to Utrecht. The last Letter from Cassel contains the Advice that came by the former Post, of the Death of the Princess of Hesse-Cassel.

Paris, May 4. N. S. The King has named the General Officers who are to command his Armies this Summer, viz. In Germany, the Duke of Burgundy, Generalissimo; the Marshal de Villeroi, General; The Marquis d'Uxelles, the Count de Tallard, the Marquis de Villars, who is to command the Horse; the Baron de Busca, Monsieur de Melac, the Marquis de Vins, the Marquis de Barbasteres, and the Marquis de Crequi, Lieutenant-Generals; and 15 Marshals de Camp. The Marquis de la Fresliere to command the Artillery, and the Marquis de Vandemil is to attend the Duke of Burgundy's Person. In Flanders. The Marshal de Boufflers, General; the Duke de Maine, Colonel-General of the Swiss; the Count de Thoulouse, General of the Horse; Monsieur Rose, Count Gassion, Monsr Morcourt, Monsr Chimenes, Monsr Darsagnan, Count Coigny, the Duke de Roquetaure, and Count Gass, Lieutenant-Generals; and 16 Marshals de Camp; Monsieur de Vigny is to command the Artillery, and the Duke de Guiche to command the Dragoons. In Italy, The Duke of Savoy, Generalissimo; Marshal de Casinat, General; the Count de Tesse, Captain-General; The Marquis de Crenau, the Count de Vaubecour, and the Chevalier de Tesse, Lieutenant-Generals; and 6 Marshals de Camp. An Express is arrived here from Madrid with an Account, That the King of Spain was Crowned the 14th of the last Month with great Solemnity. Another Courier who parted from thence the 22d has brought Advice, that the Duke de Harcourt, Ambassador from France, was suddenly taken very ill with a violent Fever, and was at the last Extremity when the Express came away. The Ambassador of Savoy received an Express the 2d Instant from Turin, with the News of the Dutchess of Savoy's being safely delivered of a Prince, upon which he went to Versailles, and notified the same to the King, and to the Duke and Dutchess of Burgundy, and the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans. The King having sometime ago appointed the Duke de Beauvilliers, Monsieur de Torci, Monsieur Ponchartrain, Monsieur Chamillart, and Monsieur Dangeau, to examine the Affairs so long depending with the City of Danzick, in relation to their refusing to receive the Prince of Conti into their City; they have reported their Opinion, That that City ought to pay 200000 Livres to the French for the Damages they sustain'd in that Expedition; which the Deputies of Danzick being made acquainted with, they answered, That they were sent only to make their Submission to the King; which they have accordingly done, but that they have no other Instructions, and they intend in 2 or 3 days to return home. A Tax is laid

upon Ice, upon the Credit of which, several Persons have already advanced 1100000 Livres. The King has given to the Count de Tallard the Arrears of the Government of Foix, which was vacant two years.

Plymouth, April 22. Yesterday came into this Port, the *New Exchange*, *And ew May*, *Matter*, from *Lugbara*; the *Grenada*, *Christopher Keble*, from *Malaga*; and the *Boffer Galley*, *James Peacock*, from *Alexandria*, all three bound to London; and the *Katherine* of *Leith*, *John Boone* Master, bound home from *Cadiz*.

Dale, April 25. Yesterday and this day came into the Downs, the *Smyrna* Master from *Zant*; the *Mary* Master from *Cadiz*, the *Friends* Master from the *Streights*, the *Concord* Galley, and the *Britannia*, both from *Gallicia*; the *Jacob* from *Scanderoon*, and divers other homeward-bound Merchant Ships.

Whitehall, April 26. The King has been pleased to appoint Sir George Rooke to be Admiral and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Fleet this Summer.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having issued their Orders to the respective Captains of His Majesty's Ships, and directed them to do the like to their Officers, to forbear Pressing any more Men, in regard the Fleet is now Mann'd; Their Lordships do hereby give Notice thereof, to the end that all Persons who serve may freely employ themselves on their lawful Occasions, without interruption; and their Lordships do strictly require all their Officers to take Notice thereof accordingly.
