

years of several Taxes upon the Lands of the Grandees and others as have not paid the same. The Duke of Harcourt, Ambassador of France, continues so extremely ill, that his Recovery is despaired of. The Count d'Estrees is arrived at Gibraltar, with 12 French Men of War, and is to be joined there by the Spanish Gallies which are taking in some Foot at Barcelona to be transported to Cadix. Monsieur Renaud, a French Engineer, is gone to Cadix, where he intends to make some new Works for the better Defence of that Place, provided this Court can supply him with the necessary Sums of Money for that purpose.

Vienna, May 21. Captain Longueval, whose Papers and Contention were the first Evidences of the late Conspiracy, was brought hither the 19th Instant from Lintz, and will in few days be sent to Newstadt, to be confronted with Prince Ragozzi, and others who are Prisoners there. The Imperial Forces in Transylvania are drawing together, and are to encamp this Summer for the Security of that Country; And all the Military Officers whose Regiments are in Hungary and Transylvania, are ordered to repair forthwith to their respective Commands. The Treaty with the King of Denmark, for his sending a Body of his Forces into the Emperor's Service, is in a fair way of conclusion, the most essential Points being already agreed on. The Imperial Army was, according to our last Advice, encamped on the Frontiers of Italy, not far from the French, who had done all they could to fortify themselves at Rivoli; The Germans had sent out several Parties to view the Passes and the Situation of the French Camp. The Letters say, there has been a great Dispute between the Spanish and French Troops about the Post of Honour, and that Marshal de Castinar had with much difficulty been prevailed with to give it to the Spaniards; And that he has writ to the French Court, that his Army is not strong enough, and therefore desires more Troops may be sent to him from France.

Frankfort, May 29. The Diet of the Circle of Bavaria is met, to consider about augmenting their Troops. The Diet of the Circle of the Upper Rhine is to meet next week for the same purpose.

Hamburg, May 31. The Duke of Holstein has agreed to put 3000 Men into the Service of the States-General, and Orders are given for sending them away forthwith to Holland. The Queen Dowager of Denmark set out from Altona this day, to continue her Journey to Cassel. Letters from Stockholm confirm the departure of a great Convoy with Soldiers and Ammunition from thence to Livonia, and add, that more Forces were ready to embark there, to be sent likewise to Livonia.

Brussels, June 3. The French Forces in this Country have Orders to leave their Quarters about the 10th of this month, and to encamp in several small Bodies. A great number of Wagons is sent to Namur, to carry from thence Provisions, and Ammunition to Dieff, Tirlemont, Venloo, Gelder, and the neighbouring Places. The Line which is making by the French on that Frontier, is already carried on as far as Lier. The new Works at Antwerp are in great forwardness, and 36 Pieces of Cannon more were brought thither some days ago from Ghent, where they have provided a great quantity of Hand-Granadoes, and of Instruments proper for a Siege. The Battalion of Bombardiers marched some days ago through Bonef, in their way to Guelderland; Twenty six Battalions more are shortly expected from the Rhine, and 14 from the French Conquests, from whence the French have drawn most of their Troops, and made up the Garrisons of their Towns with Militia. Monsieur Albergotti and Monsieur Puffiguer are lately arrived from France, and the rest of the Generals are daily expected. There happened lately a great Dispute between the French Officers and the Magistrates of Antwerp, about quartering two French Regiments of Horse that came thither late at night, which the Magistrates nor doing to their satisfaction, they provided for themselves.

Hague, June 3. N. S. The great Preparations the French make on the Frontiers of this State, giving us reason to apprehend a sudden Attack, the States have ordered the great Dyke of Heusden to be cut, whereby a very good Country is laid under water as far as Doffendaec. A Regiment of Foot lately put into the Service of the States by the Margrave of Anspach, is daily expected at Nimwegen. The Prince of Nassau Wittelborg, General of the Elector Palatine's Forces, intends to go in a day or two to Duffeldorp, and after a short stay there, to return hither. The Equipage which the Count de Briand, late Ambassador from France, left behind him, is sent home. The French make great Magazines of Provision and Ammunition in the Spanish Generalland.

Paris, June 4. N. S. The Duke of Popoli, Brother to Cardinal Cambrini, is come hither from Naples, and in a day or two will continue his Journey to Flanders, where he is to command as Lieutenant General of the Spanish Forces; He was very well received at this Court, and is made a Knight of the Order of the Holy

he is not yet installed. Yesterday Monsieur de Gassan, and Monsieur d'Usson, Lieutenant Generals, and Monsieur du Rasel, and Monsieur de l'Anion, Marshals de Camp, went from hence to Flanders. The great Sums of Money that are carried out of this Kingdom in Specie, occasions such a Scarcity of it here, that to remedy the same, an Edict is coming out, to oblige every body to bring into the Mint all their Plate, except a certain Quantity which each Person shall be allowed to retain for his own use according to his Quality. The last Letters from Madrid give an Account, that the King of Spain has continued the Prince of Vaudemont for 3 years in the Government of the Milanese; and has made the Count d'Esrees Lieutenant General of Spain at Sea, and Monsieur de Coetlogon Lieutenant General at Sea and Land in the Spanish West-Indies. The Patriarch of the Indies made great difficulty before he would take the Oath of Allegiance to the present King of Spain; but was at last prevailed upon.
