of the Turks invading that Country this Summer ; that the. Turks had indeed gotten together 16 or 20 thousand men, but of these a great part were immediately disbanded, and of these no small numbers dileased and unfit for fervice suche reft by an express order from the Grand Segnior, commanded to march into Mores, and deligned to be transported thence into tandia, but that their Commanders had but little confidence of any great fervice that could be expected from them, they being men pick'd up by accident, the dregs of the people, or fuch as were forced into the way but none of them experienced foldiers.

From the Levant we are told, that the Vilier being grown very apprehensive of the succors expected from le veral parts of the Christian world, was refolved to use all his Aris upon the places and was preparing to give another general affault to the Forts Sabionera, St. Andre, and Santo Spirito, for which he had ordered his Army (which exceeds not the number of 24 thouland men) to be drawn up in three bodies against the respective places, and to make their way the more easie, had from several batteries played for many days upon the Town, and especially upon the Jews Quarter, upon which they had done fome execution.

From the fame parts we are informed, that Father Otto-.man the Dominican fome time fince fent by the Pope into Turky, was lately arrived in Morea, and was there acknowledged and honourably received by the Greeks, and particularly by those of Epirus, hoping in little time to draw some numbers to his party, to which the prefent diflempers through the whole Empire, and effect. Ily the great distractions at Confantinople, would not a little conduce, from whence we are adviled, that the Janilaries with their leaders were divided into two factions, though both of them concurring in the lame opinion of the necessity of -chooling fome other perfon to fucceed in the room of the pre'ent Sultan.

The Noble Francisco Duodo, who is to command the Convoy of 12 thips, that lie ready to fail for the relief of Candia, has taken his leave of the Senate, and is embarked, intending to fail with the first fair wind.

On Monday last were master'd and entred into pay feveral of our new raifed Companies, and afterwards fent aboard the Convoy designed for Candia

Bruffels, June 11. On Friday next the Constable of Ga-Mille intends to begin his journey from hence to Antwerp, and from thence to take a view of the Forts and Garrifons under his Government.

We talk here of a reformation of feveral abuses of this Government, according to the method already legan at Madrid.

The Commonalty or Affembly of nine Nations have had frequent conferences about the Conftables demands, but have not yet relolved any thing to his fatisfaction ; they feem to prefs much for the liberty of the place, and that they may be freed from the Spanish Garrison, and left to their own defence.

Paris, June 12. The Fleet of men of War deligned for Candia are not to put to fea till the 15th inftant, when 'cis believed they may fet fail, notwithstanding the doubts made by some perfons to the contrary, upon the account that the Spaniardshave exculed themfelves from the fervice, and have found other employment for the foldiers defigned for this expedition.

The Drums are daily beating here and in other places of this Kingdom for foldiers, which are not to pals under the notion of new Levies, but only of Recruits

Some bodies of Horle and Foot are marching towards the three Bishopricks of Mets, Touland Verdun upon the Frontlers of Lorrain, where they fometimes are guilty of fome dilorders; and thereby give the Lorrainers fome occasion of " jealoufie.

The Bishop of Merz-formerly Arch-Bishop of Ambrun, Ambaffador to Madrid, has lately in a Letter complained to His Majesty, that making a Visit within his Diocels, he was forbid by the Protestants to enter into leveral of their Town.

On Friday last, an Order was font into Flanders to pue a ftop to the felling of Wood upon the Effate of iu.h perfons as were confilcated for refuling to live upon their faid Effates lying within the jurifdiction of His most Christian Maietty

His Maje being unwilling to break up his Camp at the Fort St. Sebajlian near St. Germains, though much vifited with feveral difeales and diftempers, has commanded that all the fick foldiers be removed thence to luch places where they may be attended and recovered, but tis believed the heats of Summer encreasing, will also augment the maladies and conftrain him to difmils them.

From Madrid we are advised by the Ordinary, that Don Faan is not yet fatisfied with the new Regiment of Guards which is much advanced, and had written to the Queen Rcgent upon that fubject.

Laudr Leuers arriving by an Extraordinary, bearing date the r inftant inform us that fome commotion had lately happened in that City, the people flewing themfelves much, inclined to favour the interest of Don Juan, but were in litti e time appealed.

This week strived five fail of French' Rhips and four of this place, laden with Sal, as also a Fink of this p ace from the Streights, the Matter of her informing, that on his return homewards, he met with an Algier man of War which Treated him civilly, but had taken two Genouele Prizes; with which he was retuining for Algier.

whitehall, June 5. Upon feveral complaints made to His Majefty in Council, of many Carriers, Waggoners, Coachmen, Higlers and other perfons carrying Letters from place to place contrary to the Act of Parliament in that Cafe made and provided, and the great detriment of the Revenue thereby established, His Majesty was pleased to Order that His Proclamation be speedily illued out to reinforce the faid Act of Parliament, to the intent that no perfon or perfons but fuch as are deputed by the Post-master-General shall prepare and provide horfes and furniture to let to hire or e. and that no Carrier Inall carry Letters but what import their Goods, and go along with their packs and Waggons respectively; as also that no Stage Coach, Higler, Foot or Horfe-polt, or any not being a known Carrier of Goods, shall collect. receive or carry Letters, except what are in the faid Act excepted; that all fhips-Letters be delivered at the first post-stage they arrive ar; likewife declaring, that whatfoever Letters shall be fent by clandefline and indirect ways and perfons not authorifed by the faid Act, shallbe lookt upon as dangerous in their Contents to His Majeflies fervice and the Kingdoms quiet, and as fuch shall be opened and inspected by His Majesties principal Secretaries of State, or by fome one or more of His Majesties most Honourable Privy Council; and the perfons conveying them proceeded against according to Law, with several other (lauses, as will by the Proclamation it felf more full appear.
