From the Imperial Camp near St. Antonio,  
June 12. N. S.

ON the 8th Instant, about break of day, Prince Eugene of Savoy went from hence to view the Country, and Count Guido of Starckenberg was sent to view the River from this Place upwards as far as *la Chiufa*. The same day, half of Count Taaff's Regiment of Cuirassiers, and four new-raised Companies of Foot, which are to be added to Count Guido of Starckenberg's Regiment, arrived in our Camp. The French continue in their Post at *Rivole*, and make frequent Marches and Countermarches, and are continually alarmed by the Body of German Forces posted at *Hala*, under the Command of General *Guttenstein*. The 9th, Prince Eugene returned higher, having viewed the Country from Count Paissy's Camp as far as *Legnano*, and 10 or 12 Miles downwards as far as *Baggio* and *Casfel-Baldo*, and having also observed the Enemy's Posts on the other side the River. This day some of our Men and the French fired on each other from the Banks of the River, and several were killed and wounded. The French

give out, that in case the Germans pass the *Adige*, they will cut the Banks of that River, and put the Country under Water; whereupon Prince Eugene sent Count *Vicouisi* to represent to Proveditore-General *Molino*, who is at *Verona*, that the Imperialists could do the same, but would do nothing to prejudice the Country, and that 'tis contrary to the Neutrality to permit the French to put this Design in execution, and upon the whole to desire his speedy Answer, that he might take his Measures accordingly. The 10th, Major-General *Serini* marched from hence with a Regiment of Cuirassiers, to join Count Paissy. We have Intelligence, that the French are posted in several places on the other side the River, and have a Camp below *Legnano*, but often change their Post. The 11th, some Deserters came from the Enemy's Camp, who report, that greater numbers would come over to us, but that they are stopp'd at *Verona*, and sent back to their Camp. Proveditore-General *Molino* returned an Answer to Prince Eugene, concerning the French threatening to cut down the Banks of the *Adige*. That he had sent an Account of it by Express to the Senate, because no greater Security could be had of their forbearing to do it, than the Promise of the French and Spanish Ministers at *Venice*; to which Prince Eugene returned a second Message, That if things were brought to that Extremity, he could, in cutting the Banks, do the French as much Prejudice as they could do the Germans, and that the Venetians would be sure to suffer. Prince Eugene reviewed the Regiments of Cuirassiers of *Taaff* and *Lorissin*, and found them in a very good Condition; and we had Advice, that the last Battalion of *Mansfeld*, as well as the 6 Troops of *Comarici*, are arrived at *Riva*. This morning, by break of day, Prince Eugene went from hence several Miles downwards to view the River. We had Advice, that the French have got above 30 Boats in their Camp, which were brought up in Waggon from *Mantua*, to be made use of for making a Bridge over the *Adige*. 'Tis said, that the Troops of Savoy are arrived in the *Milanese*, and that to facilitate their March, the Duke has received 150000 Crowns. Advice came this day from Count *Guttenstein*, that he had sent out a Lieutenant-Colonel with 100 Men, to join the French Detachment at *Monte-Baldo*, who gave Notice thereof to the French Camp at *Rivole*, and two

Battalions were sent from thence to their Assistance, but the Germans had no Design to push the Matter farther. Count *Guttenstein* adds, that 25 Deserters came to his Camp by the way of *Tochale*, but brought no News, having left the French Army several days before; And several Deserters come over to us daily. The River is very much fallen within these few days.

*Venice*, June 17. Our last Letters from *Verona* give an Account, that the Imperial Army continued encamped near that Place, and Count Paissy near *Cologna*, where they expected more Forces from *Germany* by the way of *Bassano*, and in the mean time were gathering together a great number of Boats and a quantity of Timber, in order to make a Bridge over the *Adige*; And fresher Advices say, that 5000 Imperial Foot and 3000 Horse had already passed the River, about 15 Miles below *Legnano*. 'Tis said, the French are laying a Bridge over the *Adige* at *Gossolingo*. The French Soldiers having committed several Disorders in the *Venezueze*, the Prince of *Vaudemont* has been oblig'd to pay 2000 Crowns by way of Satisfaction to the Inhabitants. The Emperor's Ambassador had Audience yesterday of the Senate.

*Mittaw*, June 13. Advice being come, that a Body of Swedish Forces, under the command of General *Reinschold*, are advanced in the Neighborhood of *Cockenhausen*, Major-General *Robell* is gone from hence to command the Garrison there, and 5 Saxon Regiments are passed the *Dwina* in order to cover that Place. The rest of the Saxon Forces are preparing to pass that River, and they expect a considerable Reinforcement from *Muscovy*.

*Copenhagen*, June 18. A Treaty was signed the 11th Instant between the King of *Denmark* and the States-General of the United Provinces, whereby 14000 Danes are to be sent to the Assistance of the States; and in case *Denmark* shall be attacked, the States are to send back the said 14000 Men, and assist us with 14000 more, or else with a Squadron of Men of War. The King of *Denmark* went from hence the 15th Instant, to review his Troops in *Holftein*. The Forces that are to be sent to *Holland*, have received Orders to be in a readiness to march.

*Vitna*, June 15. The Emperor's Birth-day, who is entred into the 62d Year of his Age, was observed at *Luxemburgh* the 9th Instant with great Solemnity. The Imperial Court is since returned to the Palace at *Favorita*. Directions are given, for drawing together the Emperor's Forces upon the *Rhine*; with which are to join those of the Circles of *Swabia* and *Fraxonia*, and other Princes of the Empire. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* will command this Army; and under him, the Emperor has appointed the Count *de Seiffens*, Brother to Prince Eugene of Savoy, to be General of the Artillery, Baron *Zandt* to be Lieutenant-General of the Horse, and Count *Frise* to be Lieutenant-General of the Foot. The Employments of President of the Council of War, and of Governor of this City, vacant by the Death of Count *Starckenberg*, are not yet disposed of. General *Gronsfeld* is gone from hence to *Hungary*, to command the Imperial Forces in that Country. Several Persons have lately been seized there, and in this City, upon suspicion of being concerned in the late Conspiracy.
