Westminster, June 24.

THE King came this day to the House of Peers, attended with the usual Solemnity, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne, the Commons were sent for up by Mr. Aston Deputy Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, and attended His Majesty accordingly, His Majesty gave the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting to His Majesty an Aid for defraying the Expence of His Navy, Garrisons, and Garrisons for one Year, and for other necessary Occasions.

An Act for granting to His Majesty several Duties upon several Sorts of Spirits of the first Extraction, and continuing several Additional Duties upon Coffee, Tea, Crocodile, and Peaches, and certain Impositions upon Hawkers, and Petty-Chappmen, and the Duty of Fifteen Pounds a Cent upon Musins, and for Improving the Duties upon Linnen and Linnen Goods, and for continuing the same Duty, for the several Terms and Purposes therein expressed.

An Act for Appropriating Three thousand seven hundred Pounds Weekly out of certain Branches of Excise for Publick Use, and for making a Provision for the Service of His Majesty's Household and Family, and of her His necessary Expence.

An Act to Enable His Majesty to make Leases and Concessions of Offices, Lands, and Hereditaments, parcel of His Majesty of Cornwall, or annexed to the same, and for the Revision of Leases already made.

And five Private Acts.

At which, His Majesty made a most Gracious Speech to both Houses, which follows:

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Session being now come to a Conclusion, I must return you my hearty Thanks for the great Zeal you have shewn for the Publick Service, and your ready Compliance with those things which I Recommended to you at the Opening of this Parliament: And I must thank a Gentleman of the House of Commons, in Particular, for your Dispatch of those Necessary Supplies which you have Granted for the Publick Occasions, and the Encouragements you have given Me to enter into Measures for the Preservation of the Liberty of Europe, and the Support of the Confederacy, in which, as it shall be my Care, not to put the Nation to any Unnecessary Expence, so I make no doubt, that whatsoever shall be done, for your Relief, for the Advantage of the Common Interest, will have your Approbation at our Meeting again in the Winter.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I shall conclude with Recommending to you all, the Discharge of your Duties in your respective Countries, that the Peace of the Kingdom may be secured by your Vigilance and Care in your several Stations.

And afterwards the Lord Keeper (by His Majesty's Command) Prorogued the Parliament till Thursday the 10th of August next.

At London, June 15. N. S. The Council of State here have taken several Resolutions, to consider how to raise the Money necessary for supplying the present extraordi-

nary Occasions, and have resolved to borrow a considerable Sum of the Republick of Genoua. The last Advices from our Camp say, that the Germans made Preparations to pass the Adige, and that the Prince de Vaudemont and Marshal de Carinas had posted their Troops at several Places on this side the River, in order to oppose them.

Verona, June 15. The Imperial Army has been encamped several days near this Place, and have paid ready Money for the Forage and Provisions which they had from the Country People. On the 13th Instant, part of the German Horse decamped from the Neighbourhood of St. Martins and St. Michael, and marched to Castel-Baldo, where they are making a Bridge over the Adige, and yesterday part of the Foot marched the same way, leaving about 6000 Men in their Camp near this Place, who are shortly to be joined by several Regiments which are marching hither from Germany by the way of Schio. The French and Spanish Forces do often change their Posts; Their main Body is now at Cbiesa di David, where the Prince of Vandemont and Marshal de Carinas have their Quarters; Monsieur Arvelli is encamped with a strong Body of French at St. Giovanni; Monsieur Creman with another Body of Forces at Rivole, and the Count de Tesse is marched with a considerable Detachment and a Train of Artillery towards Canal Bianco. The French are making a Bridge of Boats over the Adige near Gufolingo.

Venice, June 17. The last Advices from the Imperial Army give an Account, that after having made several Attempts to keep the French in suspense where they would pass the Adige, they laid a Bridge over that River near Castel-Baldo; That on the 13th and 14th Instant, greatest part of the Imperial Horse and Foot which were encamped in the Plain of St. Michael near Verona, marched from thence towards Castel-Baldo, and the Bridge being finished the 16th, about 7000 Germans passed the River, and posted themselves on the other side. Several Regiments of Horse and Foot are shortly expected from Germany, to join the Imperial Army, and particularly that of Mansfeld, which conveys the Train of heavy Artillery. The French and Spanish Army continue encamped in several Bodies on the other side the Adige. 'Tis generally said, that they are in an ill Condition, and much weakened by Desertion.

Vienna, June 18. Prince Lewis of Baden is declared General of all the Imperial Forces in Germany, and will shortly go from Nuremberg to the Rhine. The Bishop of Osnaburg, who has been here about 3 months, is gone to his Bishoprick of Osnaburg, intending, after a short stay there, to go to Osnaburg; He has agreed to put into the Emperor's Service a Regiment of Foot of 2500 Men he has lately raised, and part thereof are already marching towards Friburg. Baron Fuchs is come hither from the Bishop of Wurtzburg, with a Commission to treat about the said Bishop's sending some Forces into the Emperor's Service. The new Levies for recruiting the Imperial Forces, are continued with all possible diligence. 'Tis said, that Count Mansfeld will be made President of the Council of War, in the room of the late Field-Marshal Staremberg. Count Paar is returned from Berlin, where he has been to make the Compliments of Congratulation in the Emperor's Name to the King of Prussia. The Ambassador of Savoy is on his departure home.

Hannu, June 26. A Regiment of Foot and another of Dragons of the Forces of the Margrave of Brandenburg Anspach, passed by here yesterday in their march to Holland. A Body of the Forces of the Duke of Saxe Gotha
