

Forces are marching from Courland in order to re-pass that River, and to reinforce the Blockade of Riga.

Brussels, June 10. The French and Spanish Forces have Orders to leave their Quarters by the 20th Instant, and to form several Camps on the Frontiers of Holland. About 700 Pioneers, part of the 15000 who are ordered to Gelderland from the French Conquests, are passed near this Place in their way to Dieff, and the rest will follow in few days; The French say, they are only designed to work on their Lines, though others think they are intended for some Siege, and the rather, because a great Train of heavy Cannon is making ready at Douay, to be sent to Gelderland. 'Tis said, the Duke of Burgundy will come shortly into this Country; And that Marshal de Villerois is to command between the Saar and the Meuse. The Line from St. Donat towards Blankenberg, at a small distance from Slujce, is quite finished, and the French are making another before Bruges, to cover that Place and the Country of Waes. They work likewise with great diligence to carry on their Line in Brabant, from Liege to the Sambre.

Hague, June 10. The Advices we have from Flanders say, the French Troops have Orders to be in a readiness to march, and that they are sending a great number of Pioneers to Gelderland. The Duke of Wirttemberg died at Slujce the 7th Instant of an Apoplexy; He was General of the Dutch Foot, Colonel of the Regiment of Foot-Guards, and Governor of Slujce. Admiral Guldenleew is arrived here from Denmark. Don Quiros, Ambassador of Spain, is gone from hence to Aix la Chapelle. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland met again yesterday. Vice-Admiral Callembourg is appointed to command a Squadron of 10 or 12 Dutch Men of War, to observe the French Ships sitting out at Dunkirk.

Paris, June 11. N. S. On the 8th Instant in the evening, the Duke of Orleans was seized with an Apoplexy at St. Cloud; The King being informed of it, went from Marly about two the next morning, with the Dauphin, and the Duke and Duchess of Burgundy, to see his Royal Highness, who died that day about noon. He was the King's only Brother, and Duke of Orleans, Valois, Nemours, Chartres, and Montpensier; was born the 23^d of September, 1640. He married in March, 1661. the Princess Henrietta, Daughter of Charles the First, King of Great-Britain, who died the 29th of June, 1670. And in September, 1671. he married the Princess Charlotte Elizabeth of Bavaria, Daughter of the Elector Palatine. Philip Duke of Chartres, his only Son, succeeds him in all his Honours and Revenues, except the distinguishing Title of Monsieur, and the Privilege of keeping Guards. On the 13th, the Court goes into close Mourning for 6 months, and all Opera's, Plays, and other Publick Diversions, are forbid for 6 weeks. The French Academy have put off the Solemnity of admitting new Members till this day sevenight, that they may have time to take notice of this Accident in the Speeches they make upon that occasion. Letters from the French Camp at Rivoli, and other Places in Italy, bring Advice, that the Imperial Army had passed the Mountains on the side of Schio, and were entered into the Country of Vicenza, belonging to the Republick of Venice; That the French intended to dispute their Passage over the Adige, and to that end Marshal de Catinat intended to march on this side the River to observe them; And by Letters from Venice of the first Instant we have an Account, that Prince Eugene was advanced with 3500 Horse and 9000 Foot, as far as the Town of Vicenza, in his March towards Verona, situated on the River Adige, and that the rest of his Army followed with the Artillery. Orders are given for 17 French Battalions or Troop to march from the Franche Comte to reinforce our Troops in Italy, and 7 Battalions which are now on the Borders of Spain, are ordered the same way.

Portsmouth, June 3. Vice-Admiral Hobson sailed from Spithead last Saturday in the Afternoon, with a Squadron of His Majesties Ships to Ireland, to Transport the Forces that are to be sent from thence to Holland.

Whitehall, June 2. This day the Baron of Spanheim, Minister of State of the King of Prussia and his Envoy Extraordinary, had Publick Audience of their Royal Highnesses the Princess and Prince of Denmark; being conducted in the usual manner by Sir Charles Cotrel, Master of the Ceremonies.
