Hampton-Court, June 28.

THE King was pleased this day to declare in Council, That the Publick Affairs requiring His Majesty's going over to Holland for a short time; He has appointed *Thomas Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, Sir Nathan Wright Kt. Lord Keeper of the Great Seal of England, Thomas Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery Lord President of the Council and First Lord Commissioner of the Admiralty, William Duke of Devonshire Lord Steward of His Majesty's Household, Charles Duke of Somerset, Edward Earl of Jersey Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, and Sidney Lord Golphin First Lord Commissioner of the Treasury,* to be Lords Justices of England for the Administration of the Government during His Majesty's Absence.

This day his Grace the Duke of Somerset was by His Majesty's Command Sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and accordingly took his Place at the Board.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Hon. *John Earl of Marlborough* to be his Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary for Negotiations at the Hague.

His Majesty has been pleased to constitute *Edward Southwell, Christopher Musgrave, and James Fox Junior, Esqs;* Commissioners for executing the Office of Keeper of His Majesty's Privy Seal, since by the Death of the Rt. Hon. *Ford late Earl of Sandwich*: And this day His Majesty was pleased to deliver the said Seal into their Custody.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint *Sir Thomas Trevor Kt.* his Attorney-General, to be Lord Chief Justice of the Common-Pleas, in the Place of *Sir George Treby* deceased; And *Edw. Norrhey, of the Middle-Temple, Esq;* to be Attorney-General.

This day the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen of London waited on His Majesty, and Mr. Recorder, in the Name of the City, did in a most respectful manner take Leave of His Majesty; His Majesty was graciously pleased to accept this Demonstration of their Loyalty and Affection, and conferred the Honour of Knighthood upon *Peter New Esq;* Alderman, and one of the Sheriffs Elect for the said City for the year ensuing; After which they were, by His Majesty's Command, entertained with a very splendid Dinner, and in the evening returned to London.

Madrid, June 17. N. S. The King of Spain has appointed the Marquis de *Castil Rodrigo* to go with the Character of his Ambassador Extraordinary to France in his Name the Princess of Savoy in Marriage, and to conduct her to Spain, and he set out for Turin the 13th Instant. 'Tis said, the King intends shortly to take a Journey through the Kingdoms of Arragon, Valencia, and Catalonia, to see his Queen at Barcelona. The King has granted into the Order of the Golden-Fleece, the Dukes of *Berry and Chartres*, and the Electoral Prince of *Bavaria*. Letters from *Cadix* give an Account, that the Ships commanded by the Count

d'Estrees were lately joined by six from *Brest* and one Bomb-Vessel, so that there are now 16 French Men of War in that Port, and they expect 8 Men of War more. The Marquis of *Leganez* has given Directions for building several Forts about *Cadix*, for the better Defence of that Place. The Forces which were drawn out of *Catalonia* to be posted on the Coasts of *Andalusia*, are all arrived in the Neighbourhood of *Gibraltar*, and are said to consist of 2000 Horse and 800 Foot. Publick Notice has been given at *Sevill*, that the Galeons will depart for the *West-Indies* in the beginning of August, but 'tis generally believed they will not fail before the arrival of the Flota from *New-Spain*, which are not expected till *September*.

From the Imperial Camp near St. Michael and St. Martins, June 17. The Body of Imperial Forces commanded by Count *Palffy* having made a Bridge of Boats over the *Adige*, at a Place called *l'Abbadia* below *Legnano*, betwixt 6 and 7000 of our Men pass'd the River and posted themselves on the other side, which does very much break the Measures of the French; our Army being now in a fair way of gaining a free Communication with the Duchies of *Parma* and *Modena*. Our whole Army is moving, in order to proceed either towards *Milan* or *Naples*, in both which Countries the Inhabitants shew a very great inclination to the Emperor's Interest. The French Army expect a Reinforcement from the Duke of *Sarroy*, and continue encamp'd at *Gossolingo* and *Rivoli*, to hinder our Army from advancing to the *Milanese*.

Verona, June 18. The Germans having fortified their Bridge on the *Adige* near *l'Abbadia*, a considerable Body of their Forces pass'd over the same without any opposition from the Enemy, and posted themselves on the other side. Yesterday the French made a Bridge of Boats on that River over-against *Pescantina* in order to pass the same, and cut off the Communication in between the Imperial Army and *Roveredo*; But Prince *Charles of Vandermont*, who commands in the Imperial Camp at *St. Michael*, (Prince *Eugene* and the Prince of *Commercy* being gone to *l'Abbadia*) march'd immediately to *Pescantina* with a Body of Forces to prevent them. The French Forces are much diminished by Sickness, and the number of their Sick is so great, that the Hospitals and Monasteries at *Manua, Guito, and Castiglione*, are not able to contain them.

Venice, June 24. Letters from *Verona* give an account, that part of the German Army has pass'd the River *Adige* near *l'Abbadia*, and the rest of the Forces would follow, as soon as all the Troops with the Artillery which they expect from *Germany* were arriv'd. The French continue on the other side the River, and change their Posts very often. The Imperial Ambassador had Audience this week of the Senate; He has lately received several Expresses from *Vienna*, one of which brought Letters from the Emperor to the Dukes of *Modena* and *Parma*. *Montieur de la Haye*, who has resided here 16 years with the Character of Ambassador from *France*, had Audience of Leave of the Senate last *Wednesday*, and prepares for his departure. A Reinforcement of about 400 Men is to be sent in a day or two from hence to *Verona*. Letters from *Rome* say, the Pope is making new Levies of Foot and Dragoons; and, to supply his present extraordinary occasions, he designs to take a considerable Sum of Money out of the Treasure deposited by Pope *Sixtus* the Fifth in the Castle of *St. Angelo*.

Warsaw, June 19. The General Diet of *Poland*, which has sat about 3 weeks, is broke up, without coming to any Resolution in the Matters refer'd to their Consideration; Since which the Senate has met, and the King has declared his Resolution of calling another Diet in *December* next. *FINIS*

King went yesterday to Dresden, where he had great Entertainment to day to the Great Generals of Poland and Lithuania, and to several other great Officers of the Crown. The Prince of Furstemberg, Governor of Saxony for the King of Poland, is daily expected here from Dresden.

Vienna, June 22. The States of the Lower Austria have granted the Supplies which the Emperor demanded of them, and are separated. The Regiments of Ravenslau and Lorraine, of 2500 Men each, which were intended to serve on the Rhine, are ordered to Italy. The Bishop of Wurzburg puts a Regiment of Foot into the Emperor's Service, and the Bishop of Osnabrug another. Count Buccellini, Chancellor of the Court, went from hence yesterday to Newstad, to be present at the Examination of Prince Ragozzi, and the other Persons who are imprisoned there on account of the late Conspiracy.

Frankfort, June 30. The States of the Circle of the Upper Rhine are assembled, to consider of augmenting their Forces. Two Companies of Foot of Sixe Companies each were yesterday for Holland, and the rest of the Regiment are daily expected here in their way thither. Letters from A face say, the French Forces are drawing together between Landau and Fort-Louis, where they are to encamp under the command of the Marshal de Villeroi, and Monsieur de Laubanie is to command a flying Camp near Heuningh. The French are getting together a good number of Boats to make a Bridge on the Rhine.

Cologne, July 1. The Regiment of Dragoons, and the Regiment of Foot, which the Margrave of Anspach has lately put into the Service of the States-General, passed by this Place the 29th and 30th of the last Month in Boats going down the Rhine towards Nimwegen.

Brussels, July 5. The Marquis of Bedmar is returned hither from viewing the Lines, and will shortly go to Brabant and Flanders to take a Review of the Forces in the Spanish Pay, which are to draw together. The Prince of Serclaes is made Lieutenant-General of the Spanish Forces in the Low-Countries. The Officers employed in managing the King of Spain's Revenues have given Notice, that they have Directions to let the same to Farm, and have since received several Proposals for that purpose. An Order is published, for suppressing divers Publick Offices; and there is a talk of selling all the Employments belonging to the several Towns in these Provinces for life, which occasions a great deal of murmuring, it being one of the chief Privileges of the Burghers to choose their own Magistrates and Officers. A good quantity of Artillery and Ammunition is come by water from Tournay to Antwerp. The Country People about Namur are ordered to furnish 3000 Wagons to carry Ammunition from thence to Guelderland.

Hague, July 5. The Centurion Man of War, and two other English Frigats, arrived in the Maase last Sunday, having on board a Battalion of the English Foot-Guards, who landed at Williamstad, and are marched to Breda. The Lord Raby arrived here yesterday from Berlin, where he has been to make the Compliments of Congratulation in the Name of His Majesty of Great Britain to the King of Prussia; and this day his Lordship went to Rotterdam, in order to embark for England. Don Bernardo de Quiros, Ambassador from Spain, is returned hither from Aix la Chapelle. The States of Holland and Westfriseland are to meet again the 13th Instant.

Paris, July 6. N. S. The last Advices from the French Camp in Italy say, the Germans have passed the Adige, and that the French have likewise made a Bridge at Gossalingo, between Rivole and Verona, and have posted Detachments on both sides of the River to guard the same. The French Army lies in small Bodies, which have Communication with each other, and extend from Gossalingo on the Adige to Ossiglia, a Town situate on the Po. Besides the several Detachments which are already ordered to Italy, Directions are newly given for sending thither 12 Battalions more, which, with the Forces already there, make
