As captain, navigator and second pilot of aircraft respectively, these officers and this airman have completed many operational missions. The results obtained are a splendid testimony to their outstanding qualities of skill, fortitude and deter mination. On one occasion they successfully completed a sortie in the face of extremely adverse weather. At one stage of the flight a severe tropical storm was encountered. Turbulent conditions and fierce rain made the aircraft almost unconcal storm was encountered. Nevertheless, Flying Officer Ridgway well supported by Flight Lieutenant Smith and Flight Sergeant Sellars, flew back to base and effected a safe landing.

Distinguished Service Order.

Flying Officer Keith Vernon Panter (162949), R.A.F.V.R.

This officer has completed a very large number of sorties against a wide variety of targets. Whilst attacking the airfield at Landau his aircraft was engaged by a superior force of enemy fighters and sustained very severe damage. A little later the aircraft was hit by fire from the ground defences. It became necessary to abandon the aircraft. The navigator had apparently been hit and was dazed. In most difficult circumstances Flying Officer Panter coolly assisted his comrade to leave the aircraft before jumping himself. Flying Officer Panter came down safely in enemy country and was captured. He was released when Frankfurt was captured by the allies. On this occasion his

example of courage and resolution were well in keeping with that which he had shown throughout his tour of operational duty.

This officer has completed much operational flying at night. He has participated in a large number of patrols including many against the flying bomb raids on this country.
