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Härwich, June 6.

**O**N Wednesday last His Highness the Prince of Tuscany was pleased to give a Visit to His Grace the Duke of Albemarle at Newhall, where he was received with all possible respect; and that the same Night he lodged at Cochester. On Thursday his said Highness arrived here, and having taken a View of the Town and Port, passed to Languard Fort, where Major Darre the Governor received him with all the Honour and Military Ceremony which could be given him in that place. On Friday His Highness set sail for Holland in the Yacht appointed for his Transportation.

Lubonne; May 25. The 18th instant Sir William Godolphin lately arrived here from England, had his Publick Audience from the Prince and Prince's, to which he was conducted in the Princes Coach by Don Lucas de Torzugal.

The King having reflected upon the inconveniences of his Confinement in the Pallace, and made choice of the City of Angra in the Island of Terceira, for the place of his abode, the more freely to divert himself in hunting, to which recreation he is much addicted, and to which his Physicians have encouraged him, as most conducing to his health; the Prince has in compliance with him ordered the Count de Prado (design'd Ambassador to the Court of Rome) to attend him to the said Island; with such numbers of his Dowelicks as are appointed to wait on him, and afterwards to pursue his Voyage in Order to his Embassie.

Legorne; May 27. Yesterday sailed hence the *Levant Merchants* for Cyprus and Scanderoon. The Dutch Convoiy may suddenly depart hence for Spain and Holland. A French ship some days since arriving from Smirna, informs that the General ships from Smirna are palled by, keeping the Barbary shoar on their return for London. That the Turks being highly sensible of the great alloy and small value of the Luigins, or 5 Solz Pieces, which have been in so great quantities vented amongst them, have at the last decried them, and that by adveting Bando or Proclamation against such persons as shall for the future presume to vent any more of that Coyne amongst them.

Dantzick; May 30. Letters of the 24th instant from Warsaw, inform us that the Duke Bogislaw Radzevil was there arrived with a Train of his own, consisting of about 2000 persons, to whom joyned upon the way above 3000 more, who all attended him into that City; the several other members of the State came likewise followed by great numbers, by reason whereof the City and all the Neighbourhood are exceedingly thronged, in so much as the price of all sorts of provisions is extremely raised, and that several Murthers, Robberies, and other Insolencies are daily committed both within and without the City; for remedy wherof several of the Vayvodes were to be chosen and to be joyned with the Members of the Council, to be a Court for the hearing of all Complaints, and to take care for the prevention of all disorders.

The same Letters inform us, that the Arrest formerly given against the late Lubomirsky Grand Marechal of Poland was revoked; and that the Nobles had resolved that no Ambassador or Publick Minister of Foreign Princes or

States, should be admitted to Audience, till they had first heard and redressed the Grievances proposed to their Consideration.

That no other Candidates appear for the Election, but only the Duke of Neubourgh and Prince of Lorrain; that little judgement can as yet be made of the strength of their respective interests; but that the Emperours Ambassaiour having privately endeavoured to advance that of the Prince of Lorrain, the Duke of Neubourgh's Ministers have dispatcht a Courier to Vienna, to complain to the Emperour of this partial procedure.

'Tis feared this Election will not pass without some trouble; which is the rather feared; in that they have intelligence that the Ambassadors from Moscow are drawing towards the Frontiers with a powerful Army. The Khan of Tartary, has also lately written to the Archbishop of Gnesne, the Primate of that Kingdom, that he cannot by his Authority restrain his Forces from making an incursion into Poland. They are also advised, that a considerable party of the Cossacks having united themselves to the Turks; intended to invade the Frontiers; that having submitted themselves to the protection and jurisdiction of the Grand Signior; they had commanded the Ecclesiastical Greeks in *Ukrania* to declare their submission; by praying in publick for the Grand Signior; which they refused to do, but all of them agreed to pray for the Great Duke of Moscow, as being of the same Faith and Religion with themselves.

Madrid; May 30. The Queen Regent has been lately much distempred with an extraordinary pain in her head; occasion'd by a window left open upon her in her retirements during whose indisposition the Marquis d'Aytona has kept a more then usual Guard about the Pallace.

The Council has for about a week together been solely employed in finding expedients for the giving of what satisfaction they may to Don Juan, and have agreed amongst other things upon these following points:

1. That Don Juan shall enjoy the Title of perpetual Governour of the Netherlands, and shall moreover be made Vicar General of the Kingdom of Arragon, and Governour of Catalonia, giving him the choice of Valencia, Surragosse or Barcelona for the holding of his Court, and 'tis believ'd he has made choice of the last.

2. That the extraordinary Taxes of the Crusade shall be laid aside; and the Revenues left free to be employ'd about the maritime affairs, of which his Highness shall have the Command.

3. That his Highness shall in few days be admitted to kiss the hand of the Queen Regent.

4. That as soon as the Regiment of Guards shall be compleated, it shall be ordered to march to such part of the Frontiers as shall be thought most to stand in need of their assistance.

The 28th instant, a Courier was dispatcht to Cadix with Orders that the Gallions should immediately put to sea from St. Lucar for the West Indies, under the Command of the General Don Manuel de Bagnuelos; but the last Letters from thence inform us, that they cannot be in readiness to depart thence till the middle of June.

The Arch-Bishop of Seville is lately deceased; in whose room 'tis believ'd there may succeed the Bishop of Malaga, a Natural Son to the late King.

The Bishop of the Canaries has late'y given up his Bishoprick into the hands of the Queen, who has conferred it upon a Son of the President of the *Harcina*.
