From the Imperial Camp near Castel-Gulielmo, June 29. N. S.

ON the 23d Instant, (our Army being then encamp- ed near *Castelbaldo*), Prince *Eugene* received an Account from Prince *Charles* of *Vaudemont*, who was posted with a Detachment of Imperial Forces at *St. Michael's* near *Verona*, that he designed to have sur- prised the *French* Advanced Guards at *Ranco* and *Abvare*; and for that purpose ordered a Party of Soldiers to pass the *Adige* in 4 Boats; but 2. of them sinking, by reason of their being over-laden, the other two which were left over, came back again without putting their Design in execution; And the Men that were in the 2 Boats which sunk, had the good fortune to get ashore without any loss. The 24th, Advice came from Prince *Charles* of *Vaudemont*, that the Enemy being very much alarmed with the Attempt he made the day before to send a Party over the *Adige*, had posted 2000 Men near *Oplano*, and kept a constant Patrol of Horse and Foot along the River. Five Deserters came over to us, one of whom a *Piedmontese*, reported, that 4 Regiments of the Duke of *Savoy's* Forces were arrived in the *French* Camp; and that 2 more were on their March thither. The Enemy attempted again to make a Bridge on the *Adige* over against *Pescantina*, but could not effect it. The 25th, more Deserters came, who gave an Account, that the Enemy were still posted in several Bodies near *Osia*, *Piumolino*, *San Pietro di Legnano*, and all along the River *Adige*. Advice came also, that a Body of French Horse had been seen at *Stellata* on the other side the *Po*. We were told, that *Carpi* (where a Body of *French* are posted) was deserted by most of its Inhabitants, the *French* behaving themselves in the Country more like Enemies than Friends; and that the *French* had taken divers Ferries and other Boats in the River. The 26th, two Deserters came from the Enemy, who reported, that their Horse were in a readiness to march, as was not known whither; And Advice came, that the *French* Horse which were seen the day before at *Stellata* on the other side the *Po*, were marched thence. Count *Gutenstein* sent an Account from *Osia*, that the Enemy had got together several Chains and Cables, to be made use of in building their intended bridge on the *Adige* over against *Pescantina*; That he had ordered the Major of the Regiment of *Daini* to march with 300 Foot to the Valley of *Polyfella*, the better to observe the Enemy, and encourage the Country People, who seemed very unwilling that the *French* should come over to their side; That our Artillery was sent to *Rotterado*, and would march the next day by the new way over the Mountains towards the *Vicentine*; And that the Regiment of *Darmstadt*, in case they came to time enough, would march with the Artillery to join the Army; And the Regiment of *Nieubourg* would march by the way of the *Val di Freatta*. The 27th, Prince *Charles* of *Vaudemont* sent hither a Spanish Ensign and a Corporal of Grenadiers, who deserted from the Enemy, and reported, that they had sunk 2 great Boats at *Vazara* belonging to some Merchants. Letters came from the Marquis of *Visconti* at *Verona*, with an Account, that all the *French* Troops were marched on towards *Verona*, none but the Spanish Forces being left to guard their Posts at *Zevio*, *San David*, *Vicenza*, and *Rivolo*. The same day, about 10 in the evening, a Bridge which our Men had begun the night before upon the River *Malpensa*, being finished, Baron *de* *Adjutant-General*, was sent out with a Party to the Intelligence, and the Regiments of Foot of *Old* *Savoy* and *Bagni*, with several Troops of Horse, went the *Adige* near *Castelbaldo*, and over the *Malpensa* had advanced to the Canal *Bianco* near *Castel-Gulielmo*, where it was ordered immediately to send some Men on, to take Post on the other side, and cover the Bridge to be made there, which was presently begun, and being finished, they made a Fence with Wagons for the security, till more Troops were come over. Several Parties with Soldiers were ordered to Patrol on the *Adige*, to hinder the Enemy's attempting any thing to hinder our Bridge by Water; and Parties were sent in several ways to get Intelligence; who brought back

no other Account, than that about 240 *French* Horse were posted at *Quadrilla*. The 28th, at break of day, Prince *Eugene*, with the Prince of *Commerci*, came to *Castel-Gulielmo*, and caused 2 Regiments of Foot, with 10 Field-pieces, immediately to pass over our Bridge on the Canal *Bianco*, and they were followed by 1000 Horse. All the Regiments that were posted between *Verona* and *Castelbaldo* in several Bodies, had Orders to join together in their March towards the Bridge at *Castelbaldo*; And as soon as Prince *Eugene* had disposed Matters at *Castel-Gulielmo*, and provided for the Security of our Bridge there, he sent Major-General *Vauborne* with 1000 Horse (which were privately command- ed for that purpose some days before) to the *Po*, with Orders to pass immediately over that River by the two Ferries at *Lago Osuro* and *Palantone*, which was accordingly done, and before night almost half of them were ferried over; Prince *Eugene* went out with a strong Party to view the Country; but could get no Intelligence of the Enemy. The 29th, early in the morning, *Vauborne's* Detachment were all got over the *Po*. The same day 6 Regiments of Imperial Horse, and 2 of Foot, passed the *Adige* at *Castelbaldo*, and continuing their March, encamped in the Territory of *Ferrara*. The Marquis *Davila*, who was sent by Prince *Eugene* to the Cardinal Legate at *Ferrara*, returned with a Com- munity appointed by the Cardinal to be with the Army in their March, and give Directions for their being sup- plied with Forage and Provisions at the Rates to be agreed on. The two Regiments of *Vaudemont* and *Visconti* are come, the first to *Castelbaldo*, and the last to *Bevilacqua*. We have no other News from the Enemy, than that all their Troops which were posted near the Canal *Bianco*, are returned to their Camp at *Carpi*, ex- cept one Detachment which remain near the Place where the said Canal falls into the *Adige*. Letters from Count *Gutenstein* give an Account, that on the 26th he gave a great Alarm to the Enemy's Troops posted at *La Ferrara*, whose Advanced Guards, upon the approach of our Men, retired in great haste and disorder to their Retrenchments, and that there was great firing between them, but without any loss on our side; Upon which the Enemy doubled the number of their Troops at *La Ferrara*; That Deserters come over to him daily from the Enemy, insomuch, that above 300 were come to his Camp in 3 weeks time; And that the *French* had begun again to make a Bridge over against *Pescantina*, and had joined together 12 Boats for that purpose; but that in the night, the River was so much swelled, that the violence of the Stream carried off and sunk 6 of them. Venice, July 8. Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy*, according to our freshest Advices, was encamped with 16000 *Germans* between the Canal *Bianco* and the *Po*, and 2000 *Ger- mans* had passed over the *Po* into the Plains of *Ferrara*; and a small Party advanced as far as the River *Po*, near in the State of *Modena* to view the Country; A Party of *French*, commanded by Monsieur *Preconal*, were posted on the other side; and a Skirmish happened be- tween them, in which 33 of the *French*, (3 of them Officers of Note) were killed, and about 30 taken; The *Germans* lost only 2 Men, and had 10 wounded, and they carried off 60 Horses out of the Territories of the Duke of *Milan*. The *German* Artillery, consisting of 50 Pieces of Cannon, with a great number of Wagons laden with Ammunition, under Convey of 2000 Horses and Foot, are expected this day at *Castelbaldo*, near which Place about 10000 *Germans* are posted, to guard their Bridge over the *Adige*. It is computed, that all the *German* Forces now in *Italy* may amount to 30000 effective Men; And 'tis said, 4000 *Germans* more, most of them *Hussars*, are coming down from the Mountains to join Prince *Eugene*. The Bridge which the Imperia- lists are building over the *Po*, is very near finished, and joins to the Island of *Bonella* in the middle of the River, where they intend to build a Fort, and raise several Batteries for the Security of their Bridge; The *French* have likewise laid two Bridges over the *Po*, one at *Offiza*, and the other at *Borge Forte* in the Dutchy of *Mantua*; Marfial de *Casimat* has his head Quarters at *San Pietro* near *Legnora*, and has two strong Detachments at *Offiza*.

will shortly cover the Duchy of Mantua. Baron Mitrini, Comitiary-General of the Emperor's Army in Italy, Count Berka, the Imperial Ambassador here, and Count Castellbarco, went from hence this week to the Imperial Camp; but the Ambassador is since returned to this Place. Letters from Rome of the 2d Instant give an Account, that the Pope had caused two Briefs to be published, declaring, That the Congregation appointed by him to examine the Pretensions of the Emperor and the King of Spain to the Kingdom of Naples, not having yet come to any Determination in that Matter, he had therefore put off the Ceremony of receiving the usual Tribute, without Prejudice to his own Rights, or those of either Party; Notwithstanding which, the Spanish Agent on St. Peter's Eve presented a white Horse to be driven into the Court of the Pope's Palace, as it were by accident, and then covered it with rich Tappings, which he had provided for that purpose; After which, the Agent, with a Spanish Notary, went with the Horse to the Apostolick Chamber of Accounts, and presented the same with the Schedule of 7000 Ducars, the usual Tribute; An Agent came also from the Imperial Ambassador, and offered to pay the usual Tribute for the Kingdom of Naples; But the Pope's Officers would not take notice of either of them, saying, The Pope had put off the receiving this Tribute, till the Congregation should have decided to whom the Investiture is to be given. The Duke of Turin returned to Naples the 28th past with the Squadron of Gallies under his Command, and after he had conferred with the Vice-Roy, he immediately departed for Sicily. They are apprehensive of Troubles in both those Kingdoms, and experienced Officers are sent thither to Discipline the Militia, and to keep all things quiet.

Vienna, July 6. The Emperor has given Directions for a considerable Sum of Money to be sent to Italy, for the Service of his Forces there. Prince Lewis of Baden has sent hither an Express, to acquaint the Emperor, that he was going from Nuremberg to draw together the Imperial Army on the Rhine. Commissioners are appointed to go to the Frontiers of Saxony, to receive the 6000 Danes lately put into the Emperor's Service, who are to serve on the Rhine.

Hamburg, July 15. The King of Denmark goes back this day from *Galuckstad* to *Rensburgh*. The Ratifications of the Agreement lately concluded between him and the Duke of *Holfstein*, for adjusting several Matters which were left undecided by the Treaty of *Truvendahl*, were exchanged yesterday, and the King's Ministers have begun to pay to his Highness the 26000 Dollars he is to receive for Damages. They write from *Mittaw*, that the Saxons before *Riga* have begun to raise some Batteries against the Town, and that the *Muscovites*, who lately arrived at *Kokenhusen*, were marching to reinforce them; And from *Revel* of the 27th past there is an Account, that the King of Sweden was marching to the Relief of *Riga* with a strong Body of his Forces, having divided the rest of his Army in two Bodies, which are to act separately against the *Muscovites*, under the Command of Lieutenant-General *Frolig*, and Major-General *Kronihult*.

Brussels, July 19. The Review of the Spanish Forces in these Provinces is fixed for the 25th Instant, and Orders are given for their drawing together for that purpose. The Prince of *Serclaus* returned hither the 16th from *Bon*, where he has been to confer with the Elector of *Cologne*, whose Forces 'tis said he is to command. Twelve small Barks of 2 Guns each are sent from *Quent* to *Awerp*, for the better Security of that City; and the new Fortifications there are carried on with all possible Diligence. 'Tis said, that the Dutch Forces are going to form a Camp near *Breda*.

Hague, July 19. The King reviewed yesterday the Regiment of Horse-Guards, and the Battalion of Dutch Foot-Guards in Garrison here, to whom His Majesty presented the Count de *Nassau* as their Colonel, in the place of the late Duke of *Wurtemberg*. His Majesty will be going to-morrow to *Breda*, and on Friday to *Bergopzoom*; from whence His Majesty intends to go in His Yachts to visit *Sluice*, and the other Dutch Garrisons in *Flanders*, and afterwards to return hither for a few days. Vice-Admiral *Hobson*, with the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships under his Command, having on board the Regiments from *Ireland*, arrived last Sunday at *Helvoetsluis*, where they were put into Boats provided for that purpose, and sent to their respective Garrisons. Sixteen homeward-bound East-India Ships are arrived on our Coasts richly laden, 3 of which are come into the *Texel*.

Paris, July 20. N. S. A Courier arrived here the 18th Instant from the Marshal de *Catinat*, with an Account, that there had passed a considerable Action between the Germans and the French at *Carpi*, where Monsieur de *Frenoy* was posted with 4 Regiments of Dragoons, one of Horse, and one of Granadiers, making together 3000 Men. On the 3th, there was a small Skirmish on the Canal *Bravo* or *Caada*; And on the 9th, Prince *Eugen*, who passed two Rivers with extraordinary diligence,

strongly fortified; The Action lasted from 6 in the morning till 9, by which time the French were entirely defeated; The Chevalier *Abbat*, Son of the Duke of *Chevrouse*, and Monsieur *Caroubat* Brigadier-General, with 40 French Officers more, were killed, and all their Cannon and Baggage taken; Prince *Eugen* was slightly wounded in the Knee. Marshal de *Catinat* was then at *Offiglia* passing his Troops over the *Po*; The Count de *Tesse* came to this Action at the latter end, having notice thereof only by the noise of the Cannon; Prince *Eugen*, as all agree, performed on this occasion the part of a Great General; And having made himself Master of this considerable Post, there is nothing now between him and Marshal de *Catinat*; so that we daily expect to hear of a Battle. Marshal de *Catinat* had ordered all his Forces to draw together at *Negara*. The Venetian Ambassador had Audience yesterday of the King, the Dukes of *Berry* and *Orleans*, and the Dutchess of *Burgundy*, to Condole with them upon the Death of the Duke of *Orleans*. The Envoy of *Moscow* had his Audience of Leave the same day. The Court goes to *Mary* this afternoon, to continue there 10 days, and will go to *Fontainebleau* the 22d of September. The Marquis de *Castel dos Rios*, Ambassador from Spain at this Court, is made a Grandee of Spain.

Windsor, July 10. This Day his Grace James Duke of *Queensberry* in Scotland, Lord Privy-Seal of that Kingdom, One of the Lords of His Majesty's Bed-Chamber and lately His Majesty's High-Commissioner in Scotland, was Initiated Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, in the Royal Chapel of St. George within the Castle of Windsor, by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of *Rochester*, and his Grace the Duke of *Ormond*, Knights of the said Order, Commissioned thereto by the Sovereign under the Great Seal of the Order. The Achievements of the Three last deceased Knights, viz. His Highness the Duke of *Gloucester*, the Duke of *Beauford*, and the Duke of *Northfolke*, were added up; and the other Ceremonies were performed in the usual manner; After which, the Knights, with the Nobility, and other Persons of Quality, together with the Officers of the Order, were splendidly entertained at Dinner in the King's great Guard-Chamber; and other Tables were provided for the Ladies, who accompanied her Grace the Dutchess of *Queensberry*. And the whole Solemnity was performed with great Order and Magnificence.
