Cadiz, June 21. N. S.

Publick Notice has been given, that the Galeons shall sail from hence by the latter end of September, though 'tis doubted by many they will not be ready so soon. The Count d'Esrees continues in this Port with 16 French Men of War; He fortifies the Entrance of the Port, and for that purpose is building a Fort there. There has happened a Difference between him and the Marquis of Leganes about the Command, which has been regulated, so as that the Count d'Esrees commands at Sea, and the Marquis at Land. Don Francisco Miguel del Puerto is declared Vice-Roy of Majorca. The Commerce is required to furnish a Supply of 150000 Crowns for the use of the French Squadrons in the West-Indies.

Turin, June 30. The Duke of Savoy's Life-Guards began their March to the Milanese this week, as did likewise divers of the Officers of his Household with his Equipage; but the time of his Royal Highness's departure is not yet fixed. The Marquis Pompeo Azzolino, and Don John de Gamboa, who came hither to complement the Duke and Dutchess of Savoy in the Name of the Vice-Roy of Naples, upon the intended Marriage of the King of Spain with the Princels of Savoy, are gone to Milan, and will return from thence to Naples. The Swiss Regiment of Rodin is to remain in Garrition here, it being stipulated with the Swiss Cantons, that this Regiment shall not be employed against the Emperor. Several French Regiments are marching through the Duke of Savoy's Territories to join the French and Spanish Army in the Milanese, and more are shortly to follow.

Venna, July 2. Two German Regiments of Horse are marching at present over the Mountains by a new way to join the Imperial Army, part of which lies at Castellbaldo, and the rest between the Adige and the Po.

Milan, July 3. The Inhabitants of this City continue in their good Disposition towards the Emperor; for which reason, our Governor has given Orders for putting the Castle into a Condition of Defence, the Garrison to be reinforced, and several Pieces of Cannon to be pointed against the Town; and an Oath of Allegiance is to be forthwith administered not only to all Persons that have any Publick Offices, but likewise to the Nobility, Magistrates, and Principal Inhabitants of the several Places within this Duchy.

Venna, July 9. A Courier arrived here two days ago from Prince Eugene, with Letters of the 15th Instant, which gave an Account, that the Germans passed the Adige the 27th past at Castellbaldo without any opposition from the French, and that they were preparing to pass the Po. 'Tis believed, the Duke of Modena will consent, that they shall have the Town of Bassoli for a Place of Arms. Several Regiments are ordered from Germany to join the Imperial Army in Italy, and are marching for that purpose through the Electorate

of Bavaria. Count Solari, and divers other Officers, are gone from hence to Italy, with a considerable Sum of Money for the Service of the Emperor's Forces. A Courier arrived here yesterday from Rome, with an Account, that the Pope has put off the receiving of the usual Tribute for the Kingdom of Naples, which is looked upon here as a Mark of his good Disposition to this Court.

Dresden, July 8. Two Saxon Regiments of Foot are come into the Neighbourhood of this Place from the Lower Lusatia, and 6000 Men of the Danish Forces quartered in these Parts, are shortly to march towards the Rhine, an Agreement being concluded between the Emperor and the King of Denmark for their entering into his Imperial Majesty's Service.

Breda, July 22. The King left the Hague on Wednesday morning, and came in the evening to this Place, being attended by the Prince of Nassau Stadholder of Friseland, the Earls of Marlborough, Carlise, and Romney, with other Persons of Quality, and General Officers of the Army. Yesterday His Majesty reviewed the Battalion of English Foot-Guards, with several Dutch Regiments of Horse and Foot; and this morning His Majesty reviewed the rest of this Garrison, which consists of 4 Regiments of Horse, and 9 of Foot, 3 of the last English, viz. the Guards, Colonel Webb's, and Sir Bevil Granville's; After which, His Majesty went to visit the Lines that are making for the Security of these Parts. To-morrow His Majesty continues his Progress to Bergenopzoom, in his way to Flanders. The Duke of Norfolk is come hither to wait upon the King, and this morning kissed His Majesty's Hand.

Hague, July 22. The States of Holland and West-Friseland are adjourned till the 29th Instant. The Count of Nassau is gone from hence to his Government of Newguen. Engineer General Coehoorn is gone to Bergenopzoom, intending, after a short stay there, to go to his Government of Sluce. The French continue to work on their Lines on the Frontiers of the Spanish Netherlands, and to make great Magazines of Provisions and Ammunition in Gelderland. Their Forces have not yet begun to encamp. Our Letters from France give an Account, that on the 9th Instant Prince Eugene of Savoy, with a Detachment of the Imperial Army, attacked a Body of French Forces, consisting of a Regiment of Horse, 4 of Dragoons, and 2 Regiments of Foot, who were strongly intrenched at a Place called Carpi near the Adige, and after a Fight of 3 hours, the Germans made themselves Masters of that Post, and of all the Enemy's Cannon and Baggage; In this Action, the Chevalier d'Albret, Son to the Duke of Chevreuse, Brigadier-General Chaumont, and a great number of Officers and Soldiers, were killed on the side of the French. Prince Eugene was slightly wounded in the Knee, and the Loss of the Germans was inconsiderable; The two Armies were so near, that we expect to hear of a Battle.

From the French Camp at St. Pietro de Legnano, July 2. On the 13th past, the greatest part of the French and Spanish Army encamped near this Place. The Marshal de Catinar being informed, that the Germans had made a Bridge over the Adige at Castellbaldo, he detached Monsieur de St. Fremont Marshal de Camp, with a Regiment of Horse, 4 of Dragoons, and 3000 Foot, with several Pieces of Cannon, to observe them, who posted themselves at Carpi, in a Defilee between a great Marsh and the River Adige, which Place 'twas thought the Germans designed to possess themselves of; Moun-
