Madrid, July 13. N. S.

THE King's Journey to Arragon, and from thence to Barcelona, to meet his Queen, is fixed for the 16th of the next month; His Equipage will be very small, and few of the Grandees are to attend him on this occasion, to save Expence at a time that Money is so scarce here. The Duke of Najera, who was General of the Gallies of Spain, and on account of that Command was to be obeyed by all the Spanish Sea-Commanders, finding the Count d'Estrees had a Commission to command him, he quitted his Employment, and thereupon received Orders not to come within 30 leagues of the Court; and no body is yet appointed to succeed him. The Count d'Estrees continues with his Squadron at Cadix; and a French Man is made Vice-Admiral of Spain. The Duke of Harcourt, Ambassador of France, is at one of the King's Houses about 2 leagues from hence, for the Recovery of his Health.

Rome, July 9. An Express arrived here the 3d Instant from Cardinal Astalli Legate of Ferrara, who brought Advice, that the Imperial Forces were entred into the Territory of Ferrara. Count Lamberg, the Emperor's Ambassador, had Audience the next day of the Pope, and assured him, That the said Forces would only pass through that Country, and that great Care would be taken that they should observe a strict Discipline, and pay for every thing they had from the Country People; He delivered a Letter from Prince Eugene to the same effect, and the Pope was very well satisfied. Cardinal Jansen had Audience this week of the Pope, and complained of the Delays that are used here to grant the King of Spain the Investiture of Naples, and that the Imperial Forces are permitted to furnish themselves with Provisions out of the Territories belonging to the Ecclesiastical State. The 6th Instant the Pope held a Congregation of State, and Orders were given for sending 3 Troops of Horse more to reinforce the Garrison of Ferrara. The Venetian Ambassador has had Audience of the Pope, and has notified to him the Conclusion of the Treaty for confirming the Peace between the Republick of Venice and the Grand Signior.

Genoa, July 9. The Duke of Escalona being appointed Vice-Roy of Sicily in the room of the Duke of Veragua, arrived here the first Instant from Barcelona; He has been complimented by a Gentleman dispatched hither on purpose from Milan by the Prince of Vaudemont, and intends forthwith to proceed on his Voyage. Two Gallies are fitting out to attend Signior Antonio Imperiale, who goes Envoy Extraordinary from this Republick to the Court of Spain. Signior Negrone Risarola, appointed to go in the Quality to the Court of France, began his

Journey thither some days ago. The Gallies of Maltha which lately came into this Port, sailed again from hence 3 days ago in their return home.

Florence, July 15. The People of Italy are generally very much pleased with the good Success of the Germans, who, by the Defeat of the French Forces at Carpi, are become entire Masters of the River Adige, and have a free Communication with the Country of Tirol; After this Action, the Imperial Army marched towards the River Mincio, and 'tis hoped they will be soon in the Milanese. They write from Naples, that on the first Instant in the night, Mount Vesuvius began to through out Fire in a very violent manner, and that a Torrent of Fire continued to run down the North-side of that Mountain, and 'twas much feared this Eruption would be very Prejudicial to the Country.

Warsaw, July 8. The Cardinal Primate has taken his leave of the King, intending to return in few days to Lowitz; He has published an Account of the Endeavours which the Commissioners appointed by the King have used, to reconcile the Differences between the House of Sapiaha and the Confederated Nobility of Lithuania, and lays the blame of their ill Success on the latter, who, when Matters were almost brought to a conclusion, made new Demands, which occasioned the breaking up the Confederates at that time. Since this, another Meeting is appointed of the Deputies of both Parties, to be held in the Presence of the Commissioners at Wilna the 22d Instant; and if the Confederated Nobility do not then come to an Agreement, 'tis said, the Army of Poland will march to Lithuania to force them to a Compliance. Since the breaking up of the General Diet, the Palatinates of the Greater Poland have held a Provincial Diet, and have appointed Deputies to make fresh Applications to the King of Poland, that he would make a Peace with Sweden, and send home his Saxon Forces. Deputies are come hither from Courland, to make Complaint to the King of Damages sustained by the Inhabitants of that Duchy, from the Saxon Forces who were quartered there during the last Winter. An Account is come from Livonia, that the said Saxon Forces, under the Command of General Steynau, have passed the Dwina, and are intrenched near Kockenhausen to cover that Place, which 'tis said the Swedes intend to Besiege. The King of Poland had lately a fall from his Horse, and was much hurt in his left Shoulder, which has obliged him to put off for some days his Journey to Livonia to command his Army, which is to be joined by a Body of Muscovites.

the morning attacked the French Forces at *Casagnare* and *Carpi*, and after a Dispute of several hours, gained those Posts, and defeated Three Regiments of Dragoons, Two of Horse, and several Companies of Granadiers, who were entrenched in the last of these Places. Of the Enemy several Officers of Note were killed, and their whole Loss is computed at above 1000 Men, and of the Germans 40 or 50 were killed. The taking of these Places was of great Advantage to the Imperialists, who intended to continue their March towards the River *Minio*.

Frankfort, July 23. The Queen Dowager of Denmark went from hence the 21st Instant to *Cassel*. The States of the *Upper-Rhine* are now assembled here, and have adjusted several Matters relating to their Forces which are to serve on the *Rhine*, in conjunction with those of *Swabia* and *Franconia*, under the Command of Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*.

Hamburg, July 22. The Duke of *Holstein Gotorp* arrived the 19th Instant at *Stralsund*, and the next day took a Review of several Swedish Regiments which were drawn together near that Place; His Highness intended to review the rest of the Swedish Forces in *Pomerania*, and then to go to *Stockholm*. Letters from *Livonia* give an Account, That the King of *Sweden* began his March from *Dorpat* the 27th past, with a Body of 18000 Men towards *Riga*, to attack the *Saxons* in that Country.

Bavaria, July 29. There is to be a General Review of the Spanish Cavalry on the first of the next month at *Chasteau*, about a league and half on this side *Mons*, though they are not yet compleat. All the French Infantry are quartered at present near their Lines. The Count of *Talard* is marching to the Dutchy of *Limburgh* with a Body of 10 or 11000 Men, who were quartered on the *Miselle*. Marshal *de Villeroi* is also marching to the said Dutchy with 18000 Men. The Circle of *Westphalia* have resolved forthwith to reinforce the Garrison of *Cologne* with 4500 Men, and a Body of the Forces of the Princes on the *Lower Rhine* are going to draw together near *Cologne*. They write from *Heilbron*, that the Troops of the Circle of *Franconia* are encamped in the Neighbourhood of that Place, and those of the Circle of *Swabia* are drawing together in order to join them; and that Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is shortly expected there.

Paris, July 30. N. S. We have no fresher Letters from *Italy* than those of the 19th Instant (mentioned in our last) which give an Account, of the two Armies being the 15th in sight of each other in the Plains of *Verona*, and of Marshal *Catinat's* retiring the 16th to *Golds* on the River *Minio*; It appears of what Consequence the taking the Post at *Carpi* was, and Prince *Eugene's* Conduct slightly commended as in that Action, for in his March afterwards to *Villa-Franca* in the Plains of *Venice*, where he drew up his Army in such a manner, that the French could not attack him without great Disadvantage, and had they staid much longer in the Camp where they were, Prince *Eugene* would have paid the *Minio* before them. 'Tis believed, he intends to march directly towards the *Milanese*, so we expect every day to hear of a Battel. In the Action at *Carpi*, Prince *Eugene* received a slight Wound, and had two Horses killed under him; All the German Troops that pass'd the *Po*, have rejoined his Army, and he ordered the Bridge they made over that River to be broken, though the Boats are still kept together, to be ready in case there may be occasion. Prince *Eugene* sent a Compliment to the Cardinal Legate at *Verona*, expressing the great Concern he had in being oblig'd to pass into the Ecclesiastical State; but the moment there was no farther occasion he order'd his Troops to retire, leaving all the Preference and Duty imaginable to the *Pope*, which has pleas'd extremely at the Court of *Rome*. We have an Account from *Turin*, that the Marquis de *Castel-Rambis*, Ambassador from *Spain*, arriv'd there the 28th; And that the Contract of Marriage between the King of *Spain* and the Princess of *Saragossa* is signed with the usual Ceremony, the Duke of *Or-*

say went from *Turin* the 24th to the French Army. The King of *Spain's* Liveries are to be made here, like to those of this King's. Monsieur *d'Asoux*, Ambassador from *France*, is recalled from *Holland*. 'Tis said, that several French Officers are to be sent from hence to serve in *Portugal*.

Portsmouth, July 22. Vice-Admiral *Hobson* arriv'd at *Spithead* the 19th Instant, with the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships under his Command, from the Coast of *Holland*.
