No. I Boiler Room of H.M.S. Saumarez was hit by an enemy shell. Stoker P.O. Yates, the sole survivor from the boiler room though badly burnt and in great pain at once shut the steam off from the oil fuel pump and heaters, and would not allow himself to be treated for his hurts until he had reported the damage. This most gallant action did much to limit the damage to his ship.

For gallantry, skill and devotion to duty whilst serving in H.M. Ships Saumarez, Venus, Verulam, Virago, Vigilant, Queen Elizabeth and Emperor on the East Indies Station, in operations which brought about the destruction of a Japanese heavy cruiser of the Nachi class and the probable destruction of a Japanese destroyer:
