

ger. The Loss of the Saxons is computed at 1000 killed, and 1500 wounded, and 600 taken Prisoners, with all their Tents and Baggage. The King of Sweden sent afterwards a Detachment to attack the Kober Fort; But upon their Approach the Saxons abandoned the said Fort. About the same time Colonel *Kielmes* with another Swedish Detachment attacked 300 Muscovites, who were posted in a Retrenchment at a Place called *Lutzenholme*, which the Swedes took, with the Loss of their Commander, and some other Officers, and about 50 common Soldiers: All the Muscovites were killed except 17, who laid down their Arms and desired quarter. The 21st, the King having received Advice, that the Saxons were rallying at *Tomssdorp* about 5 Miles from this Place, he sent out Major-General *Morner* with a Body of 3000 Men to *Mittaw*, and marched with the rest of his forces towards the Enemy, but they retired to *Kockenhausen*. The *Dunamunder* Fort holds out still, being garrisoned by 700 Muscovites and 300 Saxons, but 'tis block'd up by 3000 Swedes, and 'tis believed the Garrison will soon be forced to surrender for want of Provisions. The King of Sweden marches towards *Kockenhausen* to attack the Saxons and Muscovites who are entrenched near that Place.

Mittaw, July 29. The 22d Instant, a Body of Swedish Forces commanded by Major-General *Morner* came before this Town, and desired Admittance, saying, *They came not as Enemies, but as Friends, and had not the least intention to do any Prejudice to the Inhabitants of this Place, but only to possess themselves of what belonged to the Saxons*; And after some difficulty, the Gates were opened to them. They found here 1500 Saxons wounded in the late Engagement, a great Magazine of Arms, Provisions and Ammunition, and other Booty, amounting in the whole to the value of 300000 Dollars. The Swedes have put into this Place a Garrison of 1500 Dragoons, and have made an Agreement with the Magistrates concerning their Subsistence. The Country People are ordered to provide 3000 Horses for the Service of the Swedish Artillery, and Directions are given for preparing Magazines or Provisions for an Army of 30000 Men. We have Advice, that the Saxons and Muscovites have demolished the Fortifications of *Kockenhausen*, and are retired to *Birzen* in *Lithuania*. The wounded Saxons are to be forthwith removed from hence.

Vienna, July 30. The Marquis de *Villars*, Envoy from France, set out from hence the 28th Instant on his return home; A Present was made him of the Emperor's Picture set with Diamonds; He is to call at the Court of the Elector of *Bavaria*. The Bishop of *Raab* went this morning to *Cologne*. The Treaty with the Bishop of *Wurtzburg*, for his putting 4000 Men into the Emperor's Service, is concluded. Two Imperial Regiments, making together 5000 Men, are sent from Germany to join the Emperor's Army in Italy. 'Tis said, that Prince *Ragotski* is, among other things, accused of having held a Correspondence with the Court of France, in order to make himself Prince of *Transylvania*.

Cologne, Aug. 10. The Count of *Leiningen* and Count *Nassau Weilburg*, Generals of the Elector Palatine's Forces, came hither yesterday from *Duffelaarp* and went to *Juliers*, near which Place his Electoral Highness's Forces are ordered to draw together.

Brussels, Aug. 12. There has been a Meeting of Marshal *Villeroi* and Marshal *Boufflers* at *Liege*; The French Forces under the Command of Marshal *Villeroi*, are part of them advanced into the Duchy of *Limburgh*, and some of them are cantoned in the Country of *Liege*. Marshal *Boufflers* went yesterday to *Ghent*, and it's said a Body of French Forces are ordered to encamp near *Antwerp*. They write from *Madrid*, that there has lately been a great Dispute between the Pope's Nuncio and Cardinal *Portocarrero*, about the Banishment of the Inquisitor-General, and that very high Words passed between them on that Subject.

Hague, August 12. The Courier Count d'*Avaux* the French Ambassador sent to the Court of France with the Answer of the States-General to his last Memorial, returned the 10th Instant, and the Ambassador has since notified to the States, that he has received the King's Orders for his Departure from hence; He has desired a Pass for his Equipage, which was granted, and Part thereof was sent away this day; He has taken his Leave of the Publick Ministers, and 'tis said he intends to go from hence to-morrow. His Secretary is to continue here. The Heer *Tib* is made Lieutenant-General of Horse, and the Count of *Eastfrisia* and Brigadier *Roy* Major-Generals of Horse, and the Heer *Egel* and Brigadier *Dern* Major-Generals of Foot, in the Service of the States. The Princess-Dowager of *Eastfrisia* went from hence the 6th Instant to her Residence at *Leeward*. The States of *Holland* and *Westfrisia* are adjourned for a few days. Baron *Lalieroot*, Ambassador from Sweden, has received Letters from the Swedish Camp, which confirm the News of the King of Sweden's having passed the *Duna*, and defeated several Saxon Regiments near *Riga*, and that a Detachment of his Forces had taken Possession of *Mittaw*, and were Masters of all

Courland. The Dutch Forces which are to encamp on the *Mookerheyde* near *Nemegum*, are ordered to be there by the 14th Instant; And another Camp is forming near *Bria*.

Dieren, August 12. His Majesty was yesterday 1 or 4 Hours upon the Heath, and finds himself much eased this morning of the Pain His Majesty had in his Knee, and the Swelling is likewise very much abated. The Earl of *Mariborough* is come hither from the *Hague*. Monsieur d'*Auverkerke*, who is appointed General of the Dutch Horse, left this Place yesterday, in order to go to the *Hague* and take the usual Oaths for that Command. The Count de *Guldenleew*, Admiral of Denmark, is going to England, to be a Volunteer on Board the Fleet.

Paris, August 13. N. S. The Letters from the French Army in Italy of the 5th Instant confirm the Account that has been already given, of the Imperial Army's having passed the *Mincio*, and of their marching with great diligence towards the *Milaneze*. The French were much surpris'd at this expeditious March of the Germans, and instead of following them towards *Briscia*, the Duke of Savoy and Marshal *Catinat* march'd with the greatest precipitation towards *Cremona*, and having pass'd the *Oglio* at that place, were encamp'd the 5th Instant at *Castelfranco* and *Isola* in the *Cremonese*; Prince *Vaussemer* and Count *Thoffe* were advanced to *Picighione*, in order to pass the *Adda* there. When Prince *Eugene* pass'd the *Mincio*, the Duke of Savoy sent out a Party of 150000 *voyards*, and Marshal *Catinat* 350 French, to get intelligence, both which Parties fell in among the Germans, and were cut in pieces, without Quarter; and in this confusion Monsieur *Larar* a French Colonel was killed. We hear, that two Couriers arriv'd yesterday from Italy, but what they brought is not known. The Dutchess of *Burgundy* has been ill of a Fever these 5 or 6 days, but is now much better. The Emperor's Envoy is to have his Audience of Leave at *Versailles* on Tuesday next.
